Bond Set For Ray Smith Held In Abney Stabbing

Lewis Abney dies at Berea Hospital after fight at Maple Grove Church on New Year's Eve.

Rockcastle County soldiers scheduled for overseas duty, Pfc. Ray Smith, 19, of Orlando was released on \$2,500 bond Wednesday after appearing for examining trial here for the slaying of Lewis Abney, also of Orlando. The bond was set by County Judge, Walter Swisher.

Abney died at 6:15 A. M. Saturday at Berea Hospital. He was admitted to the hospital Friday night after a fight with Smith at the Maple Grove Church.

An ice pick was produced in court as the weapon used in inflicting wounds which led to Abney's death. The ice pick was surrendered by Smith at the time of his arrest, and Dr. Hubert C. Jones, Berea physician and surgeon on duty at Berea Hospital when Abney died, stated that the wound could have been the instrument used in inflicting two small wounds on the forehead of the abdomen. Dr. Jones stated that Abney died from a blood clot in a ruptured artery in the forehead, both between 3 1/2 and 4 1/2 inches in depth.

The fight between Abney and Smith occurred Friday night across the road from the church, according to the testimony of a witness, James Donald Bullock, also of Orlando. Bullock stated that he was arguing over some old trouble, but had agreed to drop their differences and be friends when Abney came back at Smith.

According to the witness testimony, Lewis had walked away from the scene of the argument, but changed his mind and came back and hit "Ray right in the nose."

"Ray came up on top of him," Bullock stated, "and Lewis made a run for the churchhouse, saying he'd been with a knife when Abney did not die until the next morning."

Smith was brought in for investigation only after the report of Abney's death, and according to officers, made no attempt to conceal his role in the slaying.

Abney was the son of Squire and Fannie Abney of Orlando and is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Daisy and Mrs. Gladys England of Hartwell, Ohio, one brother, Roy Abney of Hamilton, Ohio, and a grandmother, Mrs. Dave Stewart of Orlando, two nieces, four nephews and several other relatives.

One sister, Beulah, and two brothers, Emanuel and Monroe, predeceased him in death. Abney was 20 years old and employed by the Bridge Department of the L. & N. Railroad. Funeral services were held at 2:00 P. M. Monday at the Johnetta Cemetery, with Bro. Ballard Rader as officiating minister. The Cox Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Smith is the son of Mrs. Carrie Smith and has been serving with the Armed Forces since the past year. He was at home on leave from March Air Force Base, Riverside, Calif., and was to report to Camp Klemmer, N. Y., for overseas duty.

Fishing Limits Removed In State Lakes, Streams

All size limits on fish in Kentucky's lakes, ponds and streams are being removed effective January 1, 1955, according to the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife Resources Commission. The recommendation was made by Minor Clark, assistant commissioner and director of Fisheries Division. The creel limits that were in effect will remain on, as it pointed out by the commission.

In explaining the reason for the size limit removal, Clark told the commissioners that the majority of the lakes, ponds and streams are heavily populated, but the amount of food available. By allowing the public to remove fish of all sizes, Clark says fisheries experts believe a response will be available more food and will reach larger sizes. Also, he pointed out that the spawning potential of fish is kept down by larger populations and many of the spawn do not reach eatable size because of the lack of food. Removing the creel limits smaller than 10 inch bass, for instance, Clark claims that more spawn will remain to grow to market size and to reach a larger size.

The commission also was reminded that as an experiment, the creel limit on bass in Lake Cumberland has been removed for two years, and that during that time Fisheries men have seen the size of the bass increase from under 10 inches to well over that size. He also pointed out that other states have removed the size limit and have experienced better fishing as a result. Clark declared that an abundant food supply bass will grow to the 10 inch size in one year, and that the varied size of bass may result to the fishermen, with the removal of the size limit.

A discussion of the removal of the creel limits was held, but the commission decided that since the game fish were the most sought after, the creel limits should remain to encourage fishing for non-game species.

The commission also made it clear that residents of the state under 16 years of age are not required to have a fishing license. Size limits which will be in effect until January 1, but which will be removed on that date are: Black bass, 10 inches; jack salmon or walleye, 13 inches; sauger, 10 inches; northern pike, 18 inches; and muskellunge, 18 inches. Daily creel limits which will remain in effect are black bass, 10; rock bass or zoogie eye, 15; crappie or yellow perch, 13; jack salmon or walleye, 10; and muskellunge, 5.

County Agent Notes

Declaration of Estimated Income Tax By Farmers

The new Kentucky Income Tax Law passed by the General Assembly in January, 1954 requires that an individual file a declaration of estimated 1954 tax if his gross income for the year can reasonably be expected to exceed \$1,900 and his income from sources other than wages subject to withholding can reasonably be expected to exceed \$1,000. A person meeting any one of these requirements must file a declaration of estimated tax on Revenue Form 740-ES. This form is very similar to the federal form used for making a declaration of the estimated federal income tax.

Special provisions for making a declaration of the Kentucky income tax apply when the gross income is from farming. A farmer may choose one of three methods of reporting his income:

METHOD 1—For the year before, file a declaration on or before APRIL 15, 1955, with one-third of the estimated tax paid at that time, one-third paid not later than July 15, 1955, and one-third paid not later than November 15, 1955.

METHOD 2—File a declaration on or before FEBRUARY 15, 1955, pay the estimated tax for 1954, and file a final return on or before APRIL 15, 1955.

METHOD 3—File a final return and pay the tax in full on or before FEBRUARY 28, 1955. If a farmer elects to follow this method, the provisions of the law concerning declarations and payments of estimated tax to the federal form used may be ignored.

The same rules are applicable to individuals on a fiscal year basis by substituting "The income of the taxable year" for "The year" and filing accordingly.

Forms for filing a declaration of estimated tax will be made available by the Department of Revenue and may be obtained by collectors from the Department in Frankfort, one at a time. The remainder one-half must be paid in the county tax commissioner's office in the county where the final return is filed.

on or before APRIL 15, 1955. For the year 1955, the declaration must be filed on or before April 15, 1955, with one-third of the estimated tax paid at that time, one-third paid not later than July 15, 1955, and one-third paid not later than November 15, 1955.

METHOD 2—File a declaration on or before FEBRUARY 15, 1955, pay the estimated tax for 1954, and file a final return on or before APRIL 15, 1955.

METHOD 3—File a final return and pay the tax in full on or before FEBRUARY 28, 1955. If a farmer elects to follow this method, the provisions of the law concerning declarations and payments of estimated tax to the federal form used may be ignored.

The same rules are applicable to individuals on a fiscal year basis by substituting "The income of the taxable year" for "The year" and filing accordingly.

Forms for filing a declaration of estimated tax will be made available by the Department of Revenue and may be obtained by collectors from the Department in Frankfort, one at a time. The remainder one-half must be paid in the county tax commissioner's office in the county where the final return is filed.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: Genesis 1:1; Exodus 2:24; 10:1-11; 12:34, 10:30; Acts 17:22-31

Devotional Reading: Psalm 88

The Living God

Lesson for January 9, 1955

FOR the next three months the Sunday school lessons will go into the great Christian doctrines. Christian churches are basically agreed about these doctrines. You can go into a church and hear a sermon about the Living God or about the Holy Spirit, or about Christ, and hardly be able to tell what the denomination of the minister is, from the sermon. Various churches have written creeds. Dr. Foreman shows that the official interpretation of Scripture. But since these lessons to come are concerned with the Bible rather than with formal creeds, which we all hold in common and which we derive from the revelation we find in the Scripture.

The Living God

The Bible nowhere tries to prove that God exists. If I were talking to you or writing you a letter I would assume that you know I exist. I tell you that I am a real person. So the Word of God simply assumes that God IS. But that is not nearly enough for a vital faith. Suppose God just IS like the law of gravitation or the binomial theorem in algebra—quite real but completely blind and unfeeling? Suppose he just IS like the other side of the moon, always there but never seen? Suppose God IS like a block of granite which can be worked on but never does any work? No—by no means! The God of the Bible is the Living God, the one who does things! He'd for example the first book in the Bible Genesis. Who is the primal character? Not Adam, not Noah, not Abraham or Joseph but God. The story of the Bible is the story of the mighty acts of God. Only the living God can help living men.

God is Spirit

The Greek of John 4:24 can be translated just as correctly "God is spirit as God is a spirit," and scholars mostly believe the first translation better conveys the meaning. This does not mean you can turn the sentence around and say "Spirit is God." You are spirit but you are not God. The great dividing line in existence is not between spirit and matter. It is between the one, the only, Creator Spirit, God, on the one side, and created spirit and created matter, on the other side. As Creator Spirit, we can be sure of some facts about God. One is that he is not and does not have a physical body. If he had a body he would (like all bodies) have to be in only one place at one time. If he had a body he would be limited by his body as we all are. But being Spirit he can be, and is, everywhere. Because he is Spirit, Paul can say he is not far from each one of us... in him we live and move and are.

God is Father


The Old Testament tells us much about God, but the New Testament tells us more. It is only rarely that God is called "Father" in the Old Testament, but in the New, we find Jesus using the word "Father" about God more than any other one word. There is a sense in which God is Father of all men—a more intimate sense in which God is Father of Christ and of Christians. Consider the words which would have given great ease to us in beginning the Lord's Prayer: O creator, O Lord of all things, Almighty God, King of Kings... Judge of all the earth... But Jesus passes by all those and teaches us to say simply "Our Father" when we speak to the Almighty.

The Father and I are One

Most important, most distinctive Christian of all truths that we know about God in the Bible, is summed up in Jesus' words: "The Father and I are one." The original Greek shows that Jesus did not mean to say he and his Father are one person, one indivisible, but he did mean to say that if we want to see God we must look into the face and into the mind and heart of Jesus. As Paul later said, we see the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. Christians who have given great thought to these things are agreed that any idea of God, any notion we may have about him, must be brought to the test of Jesus Christ. The least we can say is that God is Christlike.
