Conny Hospital Bonds Sold To Cincinnati Companies

Interest rate will average less than three per cent over 17-year period.

The bid of Charles A. Hinch & Company, Inc. and Hill & Company of Cincinnati was accepted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday for the purchase of \$148,000 in County Hospital Bonds.

The interest rate offered by the bidders averaged 2.94 per cent, with a rate of 2 and 3/4 per cent for bonds maturing from 1955-63 and 3 1/4 per cent from 1964-71.

Also bidding on the bonds was the Bankers Bond Company of Louisville, which offered 3 1/4 per cent interest on bonds maturing in 1955, 2 and 3/4 per cent from 1956-63 and 4 1/4 per cent from 1964-71.

As soon as the money being provided by the bonding commission is placed in the Mt. Vernon Bank, steps will be taken to secure the deed to the hospital site, a three-acre tract located on Newcomb Avenue.

The preliminary plans which sketches already have been approved and a total of \$138,500 in federal funds has been allocated for the hospital here.

The \$7,500 cost of the lot will be deducted from the bond money, leaving a total of \$141,000 to build the 20-bed hospital designed by Architect Howard McClure of Cincinnati. Construction bids will be taken as completed. The architect has announced that the blue prints should be ready for signing in February.

According to Hospital Committee Chairman O. V. Hilton, construction should get under way by the Spring of 1956.

The overall size of the hospital will be 148 x 141 1/2 ft., with 12,282 sq. ft. of floor area. In addition to the 20 beds, nine bassinets will be provided.

The hospital will be divided into two wings, with patients quarters and the nursery in the east wing, facing north and west to eliminate street noise. Isolation quarters and the pharmacy also will be located in the right wing.

The left wing will house the operating room, doctors' and nurses' quarters, the delivery room, sterilization room, emergency room, X-ray and dark room, kitchen, dining room and office.

The main entrance to the hospital will face Newcomb Avenue with the right wing designed to allow for future expansion.

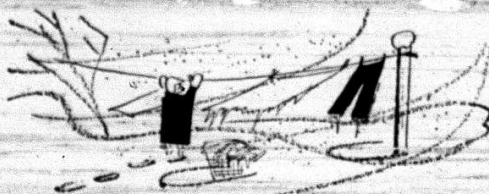

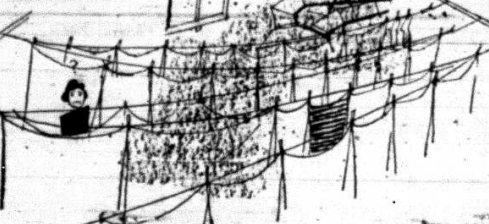

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

By DR. KENNETH I. FOREMAN

The Son of God

Lesson for January 19, 1955.

THE churches composing the World Council have set on one theological condition for membership, and in spite of efforts to induce them to change, they have insisted that "do not acknowledge Jesus Christ" as "God and Saviour." Now when Jesus is called God our right, the church is saying a something the Bible rarely says. Furthermore, it is refusing to say that the church universal, the church universal, Dr. Foreman has never made any statement that Jesus is all the God there is, or that Jesus is identical with God. For God exists in three persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and Christ is only one person. Christ is not God and man, but God is not man, and Jesus is not God universal, and churches in particular, cling to the statement "Jesus is God," partly because they are afraid to say that Jesus is not God, and partly because this does express their real conviction.

Equal With God

Laying all technical theology aside, and speaking as plain as possible, the Bible can be said about Christ, which the Bible teaches, and which the church believes, and which the church professes, where the church stands on the deity of Christ. First, Jesus himself called himself regularly "Son of God" and ever his enemies called him that meant just as much as "equal with God." Paul in the New Testament says of the invisible God: "He has said he has seen the very image of God, and he has said he has seen Christ in our true picture of God, not best way of knowing what God is like. Now we are told that Jesus said 'I am equal with God' and that he should expect the church to worship him - and so it does. Prayers are offered to him directly as well as to the Father, and he is called 'Father, Son and Holy Ghost,' and many other hymns and songs are actually addressed to him as God, as in the following: 'Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost.' 'Rock of Ages.' 'More love to Thee, O Christ.' 'Make me a captive, Lord.' 'I have loved thee, O God, and any reader can think of many more.)

The Mind of God

Second, Jesus himself spoke of his own God, but not his own but those of the Father who sent him. This was a vivid way of saying that he was equal with God, for God's mind, he knew God's attitudes and intentions, how God felt and what he planned to do. Now we are told that Jesus said 'I am equal with God' and that he should expect the church to worship him - and so it does. The Authority of Christ
