Corn Champion "Pours On" Nutrients for Prize Yields

WILLARD C. KIRK, America's new Corn King, says that good soil structure, plenty of organic matter and a "pantry" full of plant nutrients were decisive factors in helping him produce his championship corn. Kirk, who farms 35 acres near Jeffersonville, Ohio, won the corn crown at the recent International Hay and Grain Show of the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago.

The new champion builds and maintains his soil's fertility level by a "put-back" replenishment program. This includes regularly feeding the soil a well-balanced supply of nitrogen, phosphate and potash fertilizer. It includes liming at least every three years.

The program also involves returning all the manure from Duroc hogs, sheep and a herd
