## Mt. Vernon Wins First Tournament Game 80-61

### All-state candidate Ken Cornelius scores 46 points as Red Devils knock off Hustonville.

The Mt. Vernon Red Devils defeated Hustonville 80-61 Wednesday night in district tournament play at Liberty, with all-state candidate Ken Cornelius scoring 46 of the points.

Broadhead lost to Liberty 65-58 Tuesday night, pairing Liberty against Livingston in a game scheduled for tonight, and Memorial defeated McKinney 71-57. The Middleburg team, which like Livingston will play its first game tonight, will vie with Memorial in a 7:30 match for 8:30 and the Livingston-Liberty game will be played at 7:00.

Crab Orchard bowed to Stanford 80-60 in the first game played Wednesday night, leaving Stanford to play the winner of the Livingston-Liberty tilt and Mt. Vernon to play the winner of the Memorial-Middleburg battle.

Mt. Vernon went to the tournament with a season's record of 20 wins and five losses, the same record as the 1952 state tournament team. In the last game of the regular season, the Red Devils came out the victor by a score of 69-63.

Cornelius ended the regular season with a 30.2 average, having scored 756 points in 24 games. Season finale in the tournament will be played Friday night, the Stanford pairing at 7:00 and the Mt. Vernon game at 8:30. The final game of the tournament has been scheduled for 7:30 p. m. Saturday.

## Job Cash Of Ottawa Is Claimed By Death

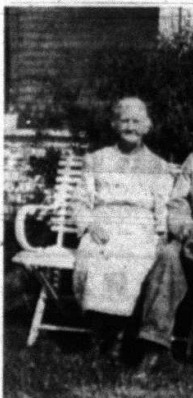

## 100 Per Cent Participation Reported In Tourist Program

Rockcastle County has gone all out in participating in the tourist promotion test program now in operation by the Tourist and Travel Council of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

The Rockcastle County Jaycees Monday morning reported 100 per cent participation from business firms contacted to raise the quota assigned to this county, money to be used to promote the area.

In fact, Rockcastle business men went over the quota. One resident of the county alone contributed \$500, this amount coming from M. G. Albright, owner of Belly Acre, restaur-

ant, motel and service station. Others were anxious to give as much as \$25.00 to the fund, with a total of \$630.00 raised by the time the Jaycees all reported to count the contributions. The county's quota for promotion by the state was \$600.00. The remaining \$230.00 collected here will be used in the county for furtherance of the project in this immediate vicinity. The area also will be promoted by John Lutz over the Renfro Valley Barnyard radio broadcasts, heard over the CBS network, and members of the bandstand troupe will entertain at a "kick-off" banquet in Somerset tonight. The banquet will officially launch the test area program, putting Rockcastle County on the map as a part of the Scenic Cumberland of Kentucky. ## 1955 License Plates Continue In Demand

The deadline for getting without 1955 auto and truck licenses already has passed, but still the County Clerk's office is swamped with late purchasers. Monday, February 28, was the deadline for driving with 1954 licenses. On that day County Clerk Clarence Carter, assisted by his wife, Mrs. Louise Carter, issued a total of 347 licenses and by Wednesday the Carters were still rushed. Only half the license plates had been issued by Saturday, with several hundred still to be called for. The county has registrations for 1900 cars, 500 farm trucks and 350 commercial trucks. Up to Wednesday, 1,595 license combinations for cars, 400 for farm trucks and 350 for commercial trucks. This year's license plates are blue with white lettering, while last years were white with blue letters. The motto for 1955 is "Tour Kentucky." The license plates went on sale December 1, 1954.

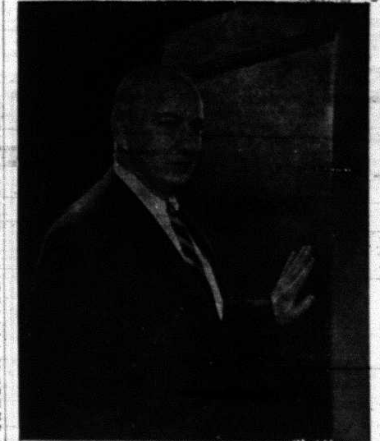

All persons over fifteen years of age are urged to make sure they do not have tuberculosis by having a chest x-ray. The service is being made available through the cooperation of the Kentucky State Department of health, the Rockcastle County Health Department and the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association.

Nearly three-fourths of all new cases of tuberculosis in Kentucky are being discovered through these mass x-ray survey programs. The units tour throughout the state and approximately 300,000 persons get chest x-rays annually under the program.

Persons under fifteen years are x-rayed only if they are known to have been in direct contact with persons who have tuberculosis or upon a physician's referral. The tuberculosis case rate among this younger group is quite low. All teachers and food handlers are required to have an x-ray made.

## County Agent Notes

Egg Production May Exceed 1954  
Unless there is a future sell in golf hens, spring egg production may exceed that of last year by 2 to 3 percent, says John B. Roberts, an economist at the University of Kentucky. Under these circumstances, feed price relationships would continue unfavorable.

If farmers should reduce the number of hens in their flocks and fail to make early replacements, higher egg prices might prevail next fall and early winter, Roberts said. The low price of eggs and poor returns this winter have reduced the demand for broiler chickens.

Unfavorable returns have forced some broiler producers out of business and supplies of broiler meat have been reduced. However, broiler housing may be expected to refill, according to this economist, and some further expansion of the industry take place.

It is noted that farm production costs are not likely to be much different than in 1954. Equipment will cost about the same. Some farmers may be able to shade costs. Feed may decline some in price, but no big drop is expected.

Prof. Roberts advised egg producers to buy chicks early, cull flocks closely and sell all hens not producing and paying for their feed, and feed and manage flocks for production.

Off-Flavor Milk Should Be Avoided  
People dislike milk with an off-flavor, even though they know milk is a good food, full of vitamins and minerals, points out Edward C. Troutman of the University of Kentucky Dairy Section.

Off-flavor cannot be removed from milk, he says, but it can be prevented from getting into the milk. Following are some facts set out by Mr. Troutman. Most feed flavors come from roughage. It is best to feed hay and silage after milking rather than before. Take cows off pasture or green feed at least three hours before milking. Change feeds gradually. Keep cows from breathing odors from strong feeds.

Whenever possible, keep cows off onion-infested pastures. Spraying pastures to kill weeds. Remove cows from pasture at least three hours before milking. Avoid weedy hay and silage.

Keep barn clean and well ventilated. Cows should be kept clean, with their flanks clipped. Keep all milking equipment thoroughly clean. Dirty utensils cause odors and off-flavors. Remove milk from the barn after milking.

Cheek milk from each cow by using a strip cup and don't use milk from an infected udder. Cool milk rapidly after milking. Avoid changes in temperature of milk.

Provide good ventilation so cows don't breathe foul air in the barn. Don't wash utensils with soap; instead use a dairy washing powder with a wetting agent. Avoid strong smelling substances around the dairy barn. Foreign matter and manure are serious causes of off-flavors and every precaution should be made to keep them out.

rheumatic fever is a serious chronic disease that especially strikes children and young people. Dr. Owens reported that in 1953, 43 Kentuckians died from this disease. Many others suffered from heart damage as rheumatic fever always affects the heart.

Children between the ages of five and sixteen seem to be particularly prone to rheumatic fever. The disease usually hits following a streptococcal infection of the throat, tonsillitis or scarlet fever. "But," Dr. Owens said, "all people who get 'strep' infections do not get rheumatic fever."

Nevertheless, he pointed out, "care should be taken to protect a child against colds, sore throats, infections or an inflammation of the inner ear should not be neglected."

Unlike a case of measles, an attack of rheumatic fever does not provide protection against recurrence of the disease. The health director warned that if slight rheumatic fever symptoms should occur—loss of appetite, failure to gain weight, fever, repeated nosebleeds and pain in the joints, the family physician should be consulted immediately.
