## MY 4-H STORY

I joined the Fairview 4-H Club in 1948 and took gardening as my project. That year I was in the blue ribbon group at county achievement day. The next year I decided to take poultry as my project so I started out with 50 baby chicks as we didn't have so much room at that time. **Work With Flowers Begins This Month**  
Discussing March work with flowers, roses, shrubs and evergreens, Prof. N. R. Elliott of the University of Kentucky makes the following suggestions:

Trash and dead leaves in and around irises should be removed. A little bonemeal scattered around the plants at this time will be helpful.

Now is the time to remove grass and weeds around clumps of peonies. This circular area should be at least 20 inches across. After this area has been cleaned, one of two tablespoons of high to medium fertilizer will be helpful.

Such blooming bulbs as tulips and jonquils are already through the ground and there is nothing to do to them other than to remove bunches of hay or straw that may cause the shoots to be twisted. Crusted soil may need breaking up to assist the young shoots in getting started.

Application of fertilizer on 50 square feet of bed or a table-spoonful to each plant will increase the length of bloom stem and size of the flower. Scatter fertilizer around the bulbs and apply water to wash off the young leaves. Lift muck off other flowering perennials by March 20 in the western part of Kentucky and by April 15 in the northern part of the state.

Home-makers are urged to plant around their homes, in pastures, around fences, and around farm buildings. Many good trees are native of and adaptable to Kentucky. Sugar maple, red, white, and pin oaks, black walnut, linden, sweet gum, ash, tulip poplar and sycamore are good trees.

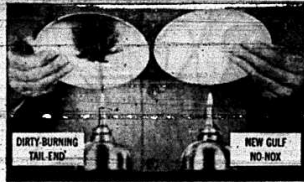

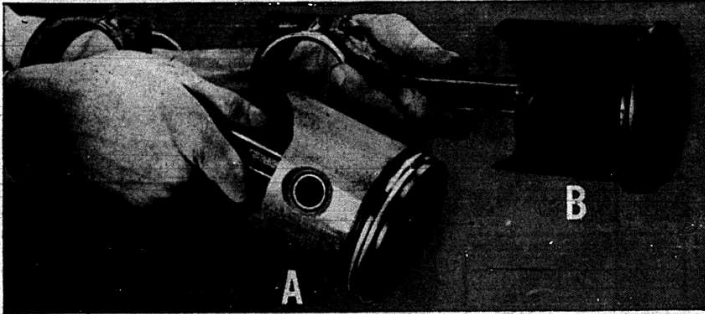

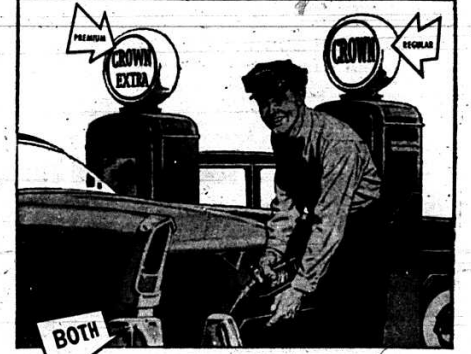
