Education

This is the first in a series of articles by the Department of Classroom Teachers of the Kentucky Education Association.—Ed.

"If a nation expects to be ignorant and free in a state of civilization it expects to be a never was and never will be." Thomas Jefferson said.

As a freedom-loving people we are concerned with retain-

ing the freedoms we possess. We cannot afford to overlook the fact that our power to hold freedom depends upon the extent of our education. We have learned more than once that preparedness is important in a world where freedom is forever threatened by tyranny. But somehow we have not learned that an educated public must be a necessary part of our preparedness.

The popular idea is that power to overcome the forces

which threaten our freedom lies in guns, planes, bombs, and all the mechanical gadgets which accompany modern warfare. Therefore, to strengthen our defenses, we concentrate on building these.

These are the things we will need for the defense of our freedoms. But are they all we need? Are we not neglecting education . . . the greatest weapon of all? Examine Jefferson's statement again, and then note these

facts about Kentucky's education picture:

1. Of every 100 schools in Kentucky, 54 are one-room schools attended by 15 per cent of Kentucky's pupils.
2. Kentucky has approximately 2400 teachers whose qualifications are below legal standards.
3. Of every 100 pupils who enter the first grade in Kentucky, only 14 graduate from high school.
4. The level of white adult education in Kentucky is the lowest in the nation.
5. The average salary of classroom teachers in Kentucky is \$2280 a year, while the national average is \$3605.

Joseph said he saw in a dream that his wheat stood still in the place where he deposited it, and their sheaves hastened to bow down to it as servants bow down to their master. But, in opposition to them, they did not inform Joseph of the interpretation as if the dream was not understood, but they prayed that no part of their expected meaning would come to pass; and they bore still a greater hatred to him on that account.

Now God, on account of their envy, saw that Joseph dreamed a second dream which was more wonderful than the former one; for it seemed to him that the sun took with it, the moon and the other stars and came down to the earth and bowed down to him. He told the vision to his father and as not expecting any hatred from his brethren. His brethren were when Joseph told the vision to Jacob and asked him for his interpretation.

Now, Jacob was pleased with the dream and considered the interpretation a good and shrewdly and wisely gave the meaning of the dream and rejoiced at the great things signified because it declared the future happiness of his much loved son; and by the blessings of God, these things would come to him and his posterity, the sun and moon signified Jacob and Rachel, and the stars his brethren as was there the eleven stars that sit in with the

eleven brethren.

This dream gave much joy to Jacob but caused much hatred toward Joseph by his brethren, and they treated him as an enemy and a stranger rather than a brother and were anxious that they should partake of the good things that were signalled to Joseph.

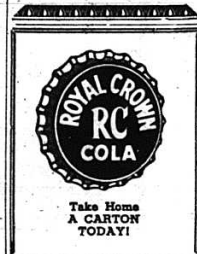

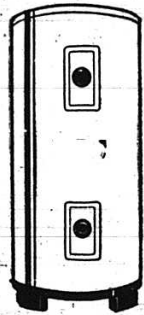

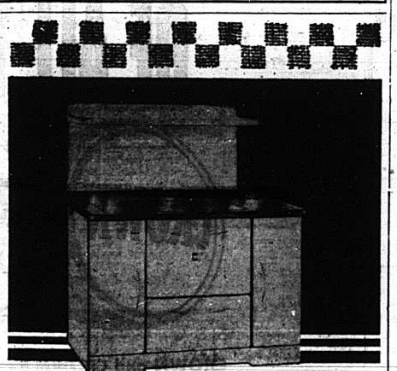

U. K. SCIENTIST WINS GRANT Dr. J. G. Redgum, assistant professor at the University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, has been awarded a \$10,000 research grant by the Rockefeller Foundation. The contract, administered by the Kentucky Research Foundation, calls for two years of study on the effects of insecticides and fertilizers upon a certain type of plant-feeding mite known as "red spiders."

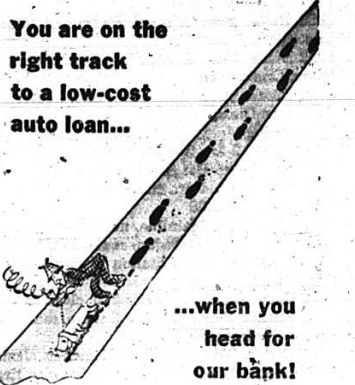
