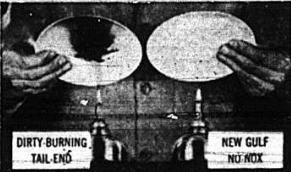

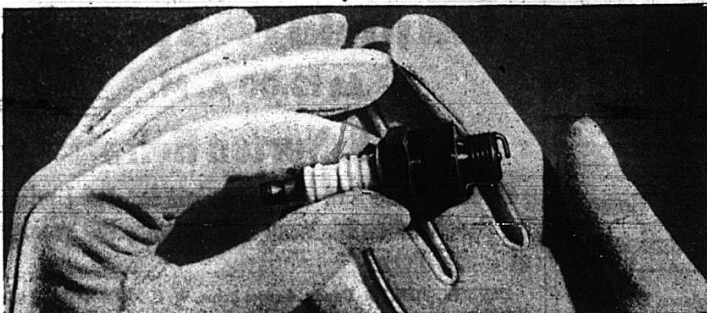

## Court Sets Aside April 25 For Mason Murder Trial

Ray Smith will be tried for ice pick stabbing of Lewis Abney on Monday, April 4.

A Rockcastle Grand Jury has returned a murder indictment against Sam Cox for the fatal shooting of Calvin Mason, with the trial set for April 25. Cox is being held on \$5,000 bond.

A Circuit Court Jury this week found Joe Hillard of Livingston guilty of possessing liquor, with the fine set for \$100.00 and both Joe and Jackie Hillard were fined \$50.00 and given 30 days in jail for giving liquor. Cecil Jordan of Wildie was given 30 days for petit larceny.

The Grand Jury remained in session throughout the week but no cases were set down for Wednesday or Thursday. Cases set down for Friday include a housebreaking charge against Johnny Reynolds and a grand larceny charge against Raymond, Ernest Cotton, Delbert Russell and Billy Brock. Reynolds will be tried for bringing into the Bullock Bros. Service Station and with the other three for the Kentucky Stone Company Robbery. Abney died on New Years Day following a fight with Smith in the Maple Grove Church. During the fight Abney was stabbed with an ice pick.

Cox will be tried for shooting Mason last Saturday night at the Climax Holiness Church for Mason, the father of three young children and a tenant on the Nathan Mullins farm, was on arrival at Berea Hospital a short time after the shooting.

The Murt Adams case, set down for Tuesday, was continued until Friday. Adams has been indicted for housebreaking.

## Illinois Woman Injured In Station Wagon Wreck

An Illinois woman was treated at Berea Hospital Sunday for injuries received when the station wagon in which she was a passenger was wrecked at the Junction of 150 and Highway 461. The woman, Mrs. Dorothy Bogdan of New Lenx, Ill. received head lacerations in the accident, and the station wagon, driven by her husband, Ted C. Bagdan, was reported a total loss.

According to State Trooper Dale Bray, the wreck occurred when a 1950 Pontiac convertible driven by Arthur G. Carty of Louisville, cut over in front of the Bogdan vehicle to avoid hitting another car. The station wagon was a 1955 Plymouth. Damage to the Carty car was estimated at \$300.00.

Another station wagon, a 1955 Ford driven by Edward R. Gehrke of St. Paul, Minn. was involved in a wreck at 10:00 A. M. Monday at Conway. The Gehrke vehicle hit a 1951 Chevrolet pick-up truck driven by William Moore of Conway. Trooper Bray reported that the Conway accident occurred when Moore stopped to pick up a pedestrian. No one was injured in the latter wreck.

Mr. Rudolph Burdette, Rockcastle native who in June will be graduated from the School of Veterinary Medicine at Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Auburn, Ala., has returned to Kentucky to intern.

Mr. Burdette is interning under Dr. O. M. Lackey of Somerset, and with his wife and children, Mrs. Sue Burdette, Rudy and Karen Kay, is living in Kenro Valley with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bradley Burdette, to intern.

The Burdettes arrived in this county two weeks ago and have many friends who hope they will make their home here permanently. Mr. Burdette, 31, is a graduate of the Mt. Vernon High School, attended Eastern State College at Richmond, and has a B. S. degree from the University of Kentucky. The Burdettes have been in Alabama four years.

## Announcement Day Near For Polio Vaccine

The time is growing near for the big polio announcement. Sometime this coming month it will be known whether or not the new vaccine prevents paralytic polio.

Already requests have been sent to parents throughout the county for permission to inoculate their children. It is very important that parents return the slips as soon as possible. The vaccine will be inoculated without the parent's permission.

The requests were sent out to the rural schools through the cooperation of Mrs. Neurel Miracle, county school superintendent, and the rural teachers. Mr. Vernon Superintendent Clyde Linville and principals at Brodhead and Livingston have seen that the request slips were distributed in their schools.

The vaccine will be provided through the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and is the same vaccine that was given to 440,000 children last Spring. Now tests are being made to make sure the vaccine is effective before starting the mass inoculations throughout the country, with schools from coast to coast setting up programs to start inoculating as soon as the go-ahead is given.

Local plans are being made for clinics in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston. Mrs. Earl Hammons, county polio chapter chairman, and Dr. Walker Owens, county health officer, are working with the schools to have everything ready when the time comes.

It is important that the parental request forms be in the hands of officials here as soon as possible so as to inform the National Foundation as to the amount of vaccine needed in this county.

## Kenneth Price Killed In Week End Wreck

A tragic week-end accident claimed the life of one of Mt. Vernon's best known young men, Marvin Kenneth Price. Kenneth, or "Speedy," as he was more commonly known, was killed in a car wreck Saturday night on Highway 80 near Somerset. A companion in the car, Kermit Norton, miraculously escaped a t e crash with only cuts and bruises, although knocked unconscious at the time of the wreck.

Price, only son of Sherman and Edna Price, was driving a 1953 Ford when he was killed. From reports received here, the young man lost control of the car when blinded by lights from an oncoming vehicle. The car was reported to have left the road and then hit a parked car.

It is believed that Price's body was thrown against a crib and then against a binder wheel near the crib. The young man suffered a crushed skull, crushed chest and internal injuries, according to W. H. Cox, who handled arrangements for the funeral.

The accident occurred about 11:00 P. M. Saturday a mile and a half this side of Somerset. A resident of the community told officials that Price was the sixth person to die in a car wreck on Highway 80 in the past two years.

A native of this county, Price was born September 22, 1934, and died at the age of 20. He had spent most of his life in this county and attended school at Sand Springs and in Mt. Vernon. He had been employed by the State Highway Department for the past two years.

In addition to his parents, the young man is survived by his step-grandmother, Mrs. Lizzie Price of Sand Springs; his grandmother, Mrs. Nora McKinney of Mt. Vernon; four aunts, Mrs. Dorothy Mize and Mrs. Margie Whittaker of Mt. Vernon; Mrs. Ruth Doan of Sand Springs; two uncles, W. H. Venable of Lockland, Ohio; two great uncles, Millard Renner of Reading, Ohio, and Mitchell

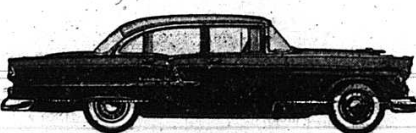

Vernon High School. Convenient Cleaning Storage Better, faster and easier ways to clean, that's what many families are interested in, especially now as spring cleaning time approaches. Though the housewife may be most concerned, cleaning in many households is a cooperative affair in which older children lend a hand and the men folk help with the heavy work. State surveys show that cleaning takes a considerable slice of the house wife's time and indicates that both time and labor could be pared down by more efficient organization of methods and utensils. A first step in this direction might be the convenient "Cleaning Closet" with utensils and supplies assembled near where most of the cleaning is done. In some homes with children it may be the room where the

children play. Other specialists suggest having cleaning equipment both upstairs and down to save stair climbing. Some advise that in new homes the utility room may be the best place, or that the vacuum cleaner and duster utensils be stored near the living area of the house while brooms, mops and brushes in or near the kitchen. The study showed that a wide, shallow closet of the wardrobe type was more convenient than the deep, narrow broom closet. The depth of the closet should be not more than 20 inches—all items are to be in easy reach and sight. A tier of shelves in the center back instead of one high-shelf makes supplies and equipment easy to get at. The sides of the closet provide wall space for hanging brooms, brushes, etc. The opening should be as wide as the closet. HEALTH NEWS

"Congratulations on that new baby," Dr. Walker Owens, registrar of births and deaths for the Rockcastle County Health Department, says, "but remember in all the excitement of the new family-addition to see that a birth certificate is filed for your child." The Vital Statistics Law of 1910 requires that every birth be registered. The family physician or midwife should file a certificate with Dr. Owens at the County Health Department within ten days after the baby's birth. Every child will need a certified copy of a birth certificate at some time in his life. Birth certificates are needed to prove the fact of birth; for proving parentage, for inheritance of property, for settlement of insurance, for establishing identity and other vital purposes. Proof of the date of birth is often necessary for entrance to school, for a first work permit, for an automobile license, for the rights to vote or marry, to enter civil service or the military service and for social security benefits. Birth certificates also help to prove the place of birth needed for passports and for establishing citizenship. Certified copies of birth certificates are available upon application and payment of a \$1.00 fee from the Kentucky State Department of Health. For further information about the registration of births, see your County Health Department.

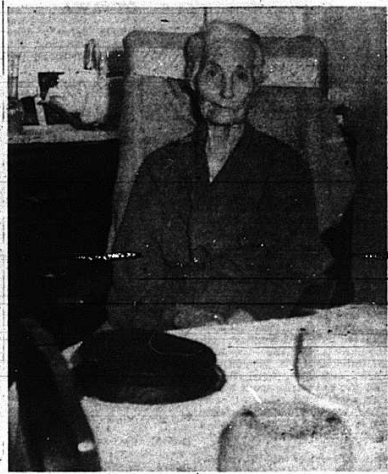
