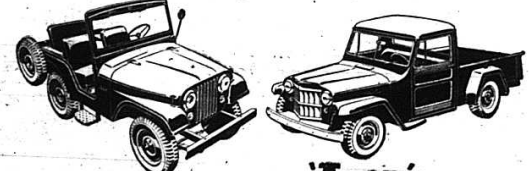

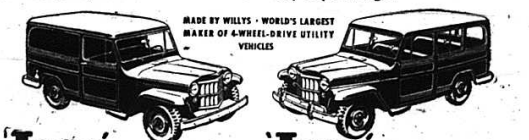

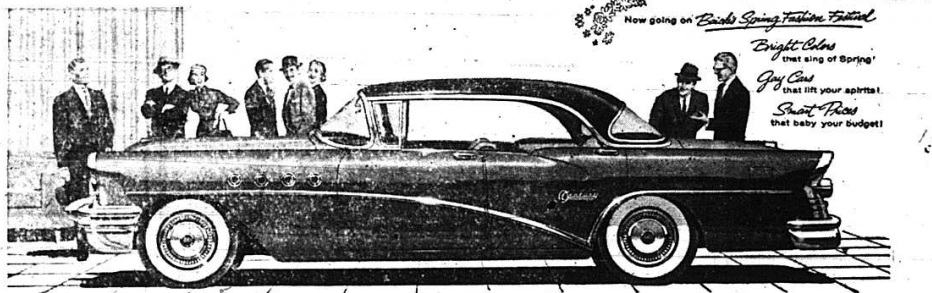

Smith Murder Trial Ends Tuesday With Hung Jury

Soldier will be tried again during July term of court, with the trial set for the 12th.

The murder trial of Pfc. Ray Smith, of the 2nd Army Air Corps, stationed at Fort Knox, ended this week with a hung jury. Smith went on trial here Monday, charged with wilful murder in connection with the fatal ice pick stabbing of Lewis Abney, 20, last New Years Eve at the Maple Grove Church. Abney died at Berea Hospital a few hours after the stabbing, with Dr. Hubert C. Jones, Berea surgeon, testifying during the trial that cause of death was a blow to the head which he believed was formed as a result of wounds or irritation.

Abney was stabbed twice during a fight with Smith. Smith testified that he was holding the ice pick in his right hand when attacked by Abney and struck back only after Abney had hit him twice.

Several witnesses for the defense testified that Abney had a bad reputation as far as maintaining peace and order were concerned, but Prosecuting Attorney Russell Jones used in his argument the fact that Abney was not armed when he attacked Smith while his blows were retaliated with a deadly weapon.

When questioned as to why he was holding the ice pick at the time he was attacked, Smith answered that he did not know, stating that he reached for the ice pick at the same time he hunted out a can opener and a can of beer.

Witnesses stated that Abney also had been drinking beer and Dr. Jones testified that the patient told him that he had been drinking whiskey before the fight. Dr. Jones also stated that Lewis Abney reacted in a highly volatile and serious enough to have caused death had it not been for the irritation leading to the formation of the blood clot. Death from wounds such as those he examined is very rare, the doctor testified.

Abney was taken to the hospital at 11:30 P. M. December 31, and died about 5:30 A. M. January 1. Smith was home on leave when the fight took place and had already had one run-in with Abney before the fatal altercation.

Sage Grass Fire Claims Life of Aunt Polly Owens

An attempt to save her house from a fire that broke out on Monday at 11:00 o'clock Monday morning with Aunt Polly fighting the flames alone and drawing the attention of neighbors who were sleeping when the fire broke out. The fire was extinguished, but only after Aunt Polly had received fatal burns. She was a young woman from India post-grandson and from there to the Berea Hospital in the Sparks Ambulance.

A niece, Mrs. Bodie VanWinkle, reports that Aunt Polly was able to talk up until a short time before she died, but Berea physicians held little hope for her from the start. It is reported that over 90 per cent of her body had been burned in the fire.

Aunt Polly was the wife of Nelson Owens, who survives, and the daughter of the late Sarah and Charlie Mullins. She was born January 24, 1881, in this county and was married to Mr. Owens on September 19, 1904.

She was a member of the Church of God and Helping Hand Council No. 42, Daughters of America, and the Berea. An only daughter, Velma Welch, preceded her mother in death on October 19, 1950, but plans for the arrangements with Charles D. Welch, had made their home with their grandparents. A granddaughter, Mrs. Louise McCormick, makes her home in Covington.

Also surviving are two brothers, B. C. Mullins of Latonia and Fred Mullins of Livingston, as well as a number of other relatives, friends and neighbors who mourn her passing.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 P. M. Wednesday at the Pine Hill Church of God, with Rev. A. S. Stokes officiating. Burial was in Elmwood Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Disney Middleton, Ollie Mullins, Fred Mullins, Johnny Mize, Vernon Griffin and Irvin McCormick. Sparks Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements with Aunt Polly's Daughters of America Council participating in the services.

Final Thirty Is Written For Albert Christian Schumacher

This week a sad task has befallen the Signal staff. Only a little more than two months have passed since we wrote thirty to the newspaper writer Albert Christian Schumacher and now a final thirty is being written for an editor who in only three short years grew to know and love the people of Rockcastle County.

Mr. Schumacher passed away last Friday at the age of 71, only two months and a few days after announcing to the people of Rockcastle County that he would be associated with the Signal. He had a heart attack in August of last year and had been away from the county for several months but was able to come back to Mt. Vernon for short periods before his retirement. Now, those who know him like to believe that he has gone on to a permanent editorship, one from which there will be no retirement.

Although trained for the ministry in his early years, Albert Schumacher spent the mature years of his life as an editor, serving the Berea Citizen in that capacity for 29 years before coming to Mt. Vernon. He served as editor and co-owner of the Signal for three years and considered as among the best of his experience of his lifetime the associations he made in this county.

Albert Schumacher loved life and lived with a family, with knowledge that the last week before he became ill had been one of the happiest weeks of his life. He never believed to have been caused by a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mr. Schumacher became ill on Monday of last week and was taken to Berea Hospital on Tuesday. He was transferred to Central Baptist Hospital, Lexington, on Wednesday and died Friday.

The son of Regina Steiner and Christian Peter Schumacher, he was born September 25, 1883, at Bluffton, Ohio, and came to Berea in 1923. He held bachelor-of-arts and bachelor-of-divinity degrees from Oberlin College and had a pastorate in Pandora, Ohio.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Sarah Weida Schumacher; two daughters, Mrs. Betty Dickerson of Berea and Mrs. Janet O'Brien of New York City; two sons, Mark Schumacher of Phoenix, Ariz., and Lt.
