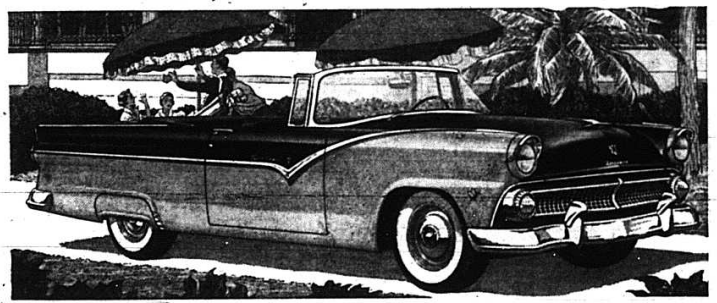

Sam Cox Acquitted Here For Calvin Mason Murder

Jury returns verdict of not guilty after defendant claims self-defense.

A Rockcastle Circuit Court jury of nine men and three women Wednesday afternoon returned a verdict of "Not Guilty" in the case of Sam Cox, on trial here for willful murder of Calvin Mason.

Mason, the father of three little girls, with his wife expecting a fourth child in August, was shot during a scuffle at the Climax Holiness Church and was pronounced dead on arrival at Berea Hospital the same night.

Cox told the jury that he shot Mason in self-defense, stating that both he and Mason had their hands on the gun and that he knew that if Mason got the gun he (Mason) would carry out what he had been intending to do.

The gun, Cox told the jury, was behind the sun visor of his car when Mason reached for it. Mason had examined the gun earlier in the evening, but Cox stated that he had unloaded the gun at that time.

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Cox's attorney was James W. Lambert of Mt. Vernon, assisted by Fritz Krueger of Somerset.

At the end of the trail the officers found a 40-gallon copper still and two barrels of mash, which were destroyed. No arrests were made.

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Injunctions Denied Here In Strike Hearing

The Judge denied the railroad an injunction against striking unions and also refused to grant the request of the unions that L. & N. guards be restrained. The union asked for a court order in a counterclaim filed after the L. & N. petition.

The counterclaim also asked for five million dollars damages, with an additional \$50,000 for each day the L. & N. employees are not restrained, but a hearing date has not been set in the claim for damages.

Judge Tartar denied the injunctions for lack of evidence. The hearing was held Friday.

With L. & N. attorneys announcing that they would appeal the decision handed down in their behalf.

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Ed Denney Announces For Gubernatorial Race

Ed Denney, a Republican candidate for governor of Kentucky, with Mr. Denney as his wife, the former Ellisor Kundert daughter Suzanne, 12, and son Joe Ed, 8.

Edwin R. Denney of Mt. Vernon and Lexington this week formally announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor of Kentucky.

The announcement, which came Tuesday, had been expected since his resignation April 1 as U. S. District Attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky.

Denney, with his wife and two children, had made his home in Mt. Vernon until 18 months ago when he moved to Lexington to take over the district attorney's post. He formerly had served as state representative from this county, having been elected to that seat in 1945, and in 1946 served as minority floor leader in the Kentucky House of Representatives.

In 1948 he was appointed Circuit Judge for the 28th Judicial District, including Wayne, Clinton, Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties. As Circuit Judge he succeeded John Sherman Cooper, who resigned to enter the race for United States Senator, which he won that year.

Denney returned to private law practice in Mt. Vernon at the end of his term as judge in 1947. He did not seek reelection as Circuit Judge.

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Rockcastle Children Receive First Polio Inoculations

The Salk polio vaccine has arrived in Rockcastle County and first and second grade school-children of the county whose parents requested they be inoculated already have been given their first shot of the vaccine.

The program was started in Mt. Vernon Tuesday when 73 children were inoculated at the Mt. Vernon School. The shots at Mt. Vernon School were given by Dr. George Griffith and Miss Lillie Phillips, a 25-year-old nurse. An additional 25 children were inoculated in Mt. Vernon Wednesday as they reported to the county health officer.

Brodhead and Livingston were given Wednesday, with Dr. Walker Owens, county health officer, and Dr. J. F. Pennington giving the shots at Brodhead and Dr. R. G. Webb at Livingston. The private doctors in the program as volunteers.

At Brodhead 145 first and second graders were inoculated, while 45 reported to the Livingston school for their shots. Children who attend the rural schools, which already have closed for the year, were brought to one of the three town schools.

The vaccine given here was developed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, with Mrs. Earl Hammons, county chapter chairman, reporting that the program was an outgrowth from the Pittman (Continued on page 4)

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County Agriculture Council Maps Plans For Coming Year

Plans for the coming year were made by the Rockcastle County Agriculture Council at its last Monday night in Mt. Vernon.

The council is composed of agriculture leaders of the county, including the Farm Bureau president, machinery dealers, lending agencies and farmer representatives.

The purpose of the organization is to keep members informed as to developments in agriculture and to further agricultural improvements in the county.

The council already has sponsored the Rockcastle County Livestock Improvement Association and has outlined the following programs for the future:

(1) To promote the Blackley vaccination program in the county.

(2) Promote Bang's disease control program and calfhood vaccination.

(3) Complete list of farmers desiring Bang testing and assist local veterinarian and farmers.

(4) Encourage cattle grub control program.

Encourage contact nearby counties on possibilities of having joint feeder calf sale and furnish better market for farmer's feeder calves.

The council also has been encouraging greater use of strawberries as a source of cash income for farmers and offering encouragement for better woodlot production and management for a greater source of income from Rockcastle County woodlands. The council will solicit the cooperation of banks, business men and sawmill operators in promoting this program.

Another goal is fire protection through the cooperation of the Fiscal Court and the State Division of Forestry.

The research forest project leader and the national forest warden from Berea will be invited to the next council meeting on May 16.

Those two vaccinations are necessary to give immunity from birth. If young cattle are purchased they should be vaccinated as well as those raised on your farm.

Blackleg causes great loss in Kentucky each year. However, the vaccine is so effective that if it were widely used, the loss could be entirely prevented. Recommendations on Using Antibiotics on Straws

For First Year Plants
No. 1 After the plants have been set, they should be covered with a fine layer of soil to the depth of 1/2 inch.

No. 2 There are two methods of spraying this material with a low pressure sprayer. One is to spray the row only. The other is to cover the entire area. The latter method is more satisfactory although it will require more labor and material.

No. 3 For the row method mix 1 pound of powder in 1 gallon of water. Make sure this is thoroughly mixed. Add this mixture to a barrel, stirring as it is added. The garden sprayer is now ready to be loaded and directed to the plants.

For second year plants and other information see instructions on the Herbicide container.

Brucellosis and Tuberculosis Campaign
Your attention is being called to the testing work carried on in Kentucky, especially the test for Brucellosis and Tuberculosis now being carried on by the supervision of the Kentucky State Board of Agriculture in cooperation with the Agricultural Research Service.

Indemnities for reactors will be paid by the Agricultural Research Service. In order that we may assist a veterinarian coming into the county to test cattle for Bangs and, in arranging a definite schedule of time and place, call on the County Agents or attempt to compile a list of all cattle raisers who are interested in having this work done.

County Agent Notes
Blackleg of Cattle
Because young cattle are liable to develop a disease, commonly called Blackleg, all young animals must be vaccinated. Calves and young cattle are susceptible to the disease from birth to 2 1/2 to 3 years of age. While Blackleg may not occur at any season, it generally occurs in spring or fall in pasture cattle, and it may occur in the winter in barnyard lots. The cause of blackleg is a microorganism that produces spores that may lie dormant in the soil for several years. Under favorable conditions are favorable they may germinate and produce the disease. Swellings are the most characteristic symptoms of the disease and may develop in the muscles of the shoulder, hip, chest, back or flank and never below the knee.

The most effective way to prevent blackleg is to make it a practice to vaccinate all young calves at the time of birth with Blackleg Bacterin when they are one to four weeks of age, this gives them immunity which they retain for life. These calves should be re-vaccinated with Blackleg Bacterin again when they are six months old to give immunity for life.

Mr. Stacey will show the proper method of picking berries, grading berries, filling cups, etc.

All berries sold through an association must be inspected and graded up to them. Since a package of U. S. No. 1 berries brings more than No. 2's or unclassified berries, it is important that all who are planning to market berries this year or who have been in the market should attend one of the meetings and find out more about the marketing phase of strawberry production.
