### Car Wreck Claims Lives Of Mother And Daughter

#### Three members of Lee Lambdin family critically injured but reported improving.

The heart of Mt. Vernon went out this week to the Lee Lambdin family as the 27-year-old mother and only daughter lost their lives as a result of a car wreck which sent the father, a seven-year-old son and a week-old baby boy to the hospital for treatment of critical injuries.

Eight-year-old Janice Lambdin was killed instantly by the family car was hit by a tractor truck Saturday afternoon South of Livingston. Mrs. Lambdin, mother of four young children, died about an hour later at the London Hospital.

Lee Lambdin, six-year-old Tommy Lee and the baby, William Harry, are reported to be improving from injuries received in the accident, but still in serious condition. The Lambdins' two-year-old son, Jimmy, was left of home with his grandmother, Mrs. Loretta Houston.

The accident occurred at 1:00 P. M. Saturday about a mile South of Livingston. According to a report by Trooper Frederick Hedges of the Kentucky State Police, the Lambdin car, a 1952 Dodge Sedan, was headed south and was hit by a 1947 International truck after a pickup truck in front of the Lambdins made a left turn. The truck hit the car and then turned over. The trooper's report continued, but the driver, William F. McCoy of Louisville, escaped unharmed.

The Lambdin baby, born only a week before the accident, first was believed not to have been seriously injured, but later was discovered to have received internal injuries.

Lee Lambdin suffered chest injuries and young Tommy Lee a broken arm and leg. According to Deputy Coroner Ralph Bowling, Mrs. Lambdin suffered a skull fracture, deep face lacerations, a broken jaw, crushed chest and both legs and one arm were broken. Little Janice's right arm was severed, both legs were broken and the child's head was crushed under the tractor of the truck.

In addition to her father, brothers and a maternal grandfather, Mrs. Sam Lambdin. Both Janie and her mother were sadly missed by all who knew and loved them.

County Agent Notes

Use of Streptomycin on Tobacco Plant blebs to control Wildfire. For material that contains 15 percent Active-Ingredients, the following procedure is suggested:

When Used For Prevention. Start when the plants are no larger than the size of a dime. Use two tablespoons (4 x 1 l.) (Rounded spoons after the material has been shaken in the bottle to make as large a volume as possible) in five gallons of water per 100 square yards of bed.

When Used For Eradication. Double the amount of water and double the amount of Streptomycin listed above. Remove the canvas and apply this material with a pressure spray. Use weekly until plants are ready to set.

Cutworms. The clay backed cutworm is now prevalent and has caused damage and apprehension in the south-central and western parts of the state. This insect is simple brooded and the winter is passed in the immature larval stage. Most of the worms will pupate within the next two weeks and there should be no further reat from this insect this year.

Where tobacco is involved it is suggested that Endrin Emulsion Concentrate be used at the rate of 0.2 pound actual per

acre or in case of plant beds one tablespoonful on a bed 9' x 10'.

In all other instances where it is advisable to treat, use toxaphene at the rate of 2 pounds actual per acre.

This cutworm siege should not be confused with the spring armyworms which may appear later. Watch for them.

Potato Insects. The Colorado potato beetle, flea beetle, leafhopper and potato aphid all attack potatoes. DDT will control all of these insects with the exception of potato aphid.

Spray: Use one to one and a half pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT per 100 gallon of water or three and one half level table-spoons in three gallons of water. For biggest control, combine the

DDT with bordeaux in a 4-4-50 formula.

Apply first mixture when the Colorado potato beetle appears or when potatoes are two or four inches high. Repeat two or four times at 10 day to two week intervals until the tops begin to die.

Dust: Use 3 percent DDT dust. For flight control use DDT in combination with one of the fixed Coppers; a commercially mixed dust is recommended. Apply it 3 to 5 times at intervals of 10 days.
