Rockcastle Growers Finding Strawberries Big Business

Crop produced here being marketed at Somerset and London as well as at home.

Previously most strawberry plants cultivated in this county were being shipped in from Tennessee. 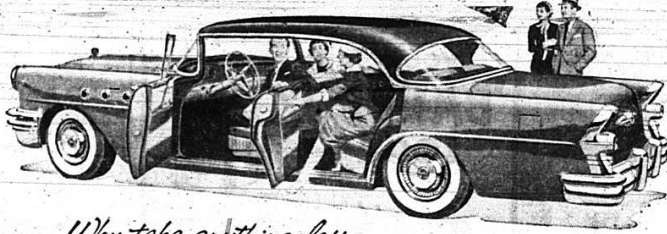

HEALTH NEWS

Every mother should make sure that her child builds good eating habits, stresses Dr. Walter Owens, director of the Rockcastle County Health Department. "Liking food is a habit that is vital to a child's health," Dr. Owens says, "and with some assistance from a mother, the child can easily like wholesome foods."

The health director listed the following ideas to help teach children the value of good eating habits:

1. Begin early to teach a child to like foods that are important to health.
2. Begin with a small serving of a food that is different or new to the child. Make the servings larger as he learns to like the new food.
3. Do not give up if a child rejects a new food. Wait several days before serving it again. Give a new or less liked food at the beginning of a meal or before a well liked food.
4. Be sure the food tastes right and looks appealing.
5. Parents should set the right example by eating the same foods the child is expected to eat.
6. Act as if everyone likes and eats all the foods prepared.
7. Let the child have a part in preparing and serving food; this increases interest.
8. Decide where your child eats the best—away from distractions of the family table or with another child who has a good appetite.
9. Avoid giving "tastes" of sweets and other foods that are not good for children.

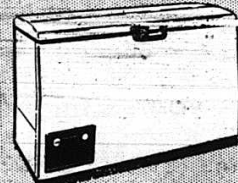
