A History of Rockcastle County will be given by L. D. Bryant, secretary of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, and the need for the hospital will be outlined by George W. Murphy, circuit court clerk.

The Mt. Vernon School Band will present two numbers, "America" and "My Old Kentucky Home." The benediction will be given by the Rev. Howard Ray, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Christian Church.

The public is invited to attend the ceremonies.

Ed Denney Files Declaration For Nomination As Governor

Ed Denney has now formally entered the race for Republican nomination for governor of Kentucky.

The former Mt. Vernon attorney is the third man to file a candidacy declaration for the nomination in the August 6 primary. Filing earlier were James L. Clay, 43, Lexington, attorney, and James R. Shaw, 69, Richmond, business man.

Denney's declaration was signed by Rockcastle County Attorney T. J. Nicely, N. M. Smock, president of the Mt. Vernon Bank, E. H. Fuller, former Fayette county sheriff and state director of securities, and Eldon S. Dummitt, former 1947 nominee for governor who attorney general and the GOP's lost to Earle C. Clements, Democrat, now a U. S. Senator.

The contest for Democratic gubernatorial nomination also includes former Gov. A. B. Chandler, 56, Versailles, former Appellate Judge Bert T. Combs, 47, Prestonburg, and Jesse N. R. Cecil, 51, of Louisville.

Denney, 51, resigned April 1 as editor of the Star for Eastern Kentucky to make the gubernatorial race, announcing his candidacy. He had served in the federal government following appointment by President Eisenhower as successor to Democrat Claude P. Stephens of Prestonsburg.

Denney's only other race for public office was successful. He was elected state representative from this county in 1946 and served as House minority leader in 1946, during Republican Gov. Simon Willis administration.

Denney then was appointed circuit judge by Willis, succeeding India Ambassador John Sherman Cooper following the Somerset Republican primary election to the U. S. Senate in 1946. Instead of seeking election to the 28th Judicial District post, Denney returned to Mt. Vernon to practice law.

He was chairman of the Republican State Committee from 1952 until 1954 and active in church and civic affairs while living in Mt. Vernon.

The Denneys now make their home in Lexington, but return to Mt. Vernon for frequent visits.

Bullen received his Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Kentucky.

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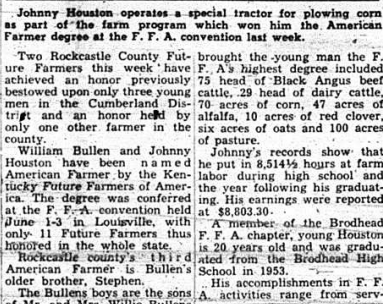
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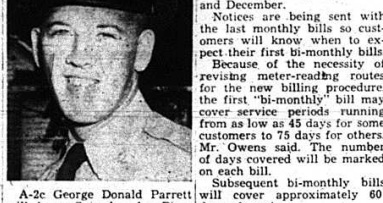
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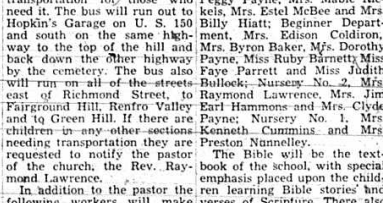

County Agent Notes
Care Of Strawberries
After Sneeze's Harvest
There are naturally several ways of handling a strawberry field after harvest, but the following described procedure is our recommendation.

Immediately after the picking season, remove the field with a common farm mower, or in case of a garden patch, a scythe will do just as well. The mowed straw should be done so that the strawberry crown is not disturbed, simply removing as many as possible of the old stalks. This will naturally stimulate the crown such that new foliage will appear which in the next season, may be the fruiting row.

Apply 500 to 800 pounds per acre of complete fertilizer, (for example, a 5-10-10 or 6-12-12) broadcast, making special effort to get a greater part of the fertilizer directly on top of the fruiting row.

After the mowed area has had a couple of days sunshine so as to dry, if the volume of dried material is too thick to allow cultivation, the entire patch may be raked by using a hay rake, hauling off the surplus dried material, piling it in shocks adjacent to the patch so it can be used for a mulch again this fall.

By means of whatever tools you have available, start cultivation on the space between the rows. An ideal tool is a rototiller, but a double shovel or ractus can be used instead. The first trip between the rows may bring up many clods and it may be desirable after a couple of rounds between the rows to drag a log to crush up the shovels until the dirt is thoroughly pulverized. Most growers prefer to leave the old rows of plants 18-20 inches wide. In former years, many growers have left only a 6-8 inch row, however, if we should have a reasonably dry season in July or August, you can expect that a better picking will be had in a row of old plants is left than in a new one.

Assuming that there are certain weeds like dock, wild lettuce, pigweed and other common weeds, it would be desirable to go over the patch and remove these weed clusters with a hoe.

Working the middles between the rows through July, August and early September or even up into October such that the runner plants which are quite sure to develop during a rainy season are allowed to fill in the space between the rows for this is sure to greatly interfere with berry harvesting during 1956. It is quite important that sufficient working is given at the time the first cultivation starts after harvest, so that the ground is aerated and the soil level, otherwise there is sure to be a shortage of moisture due to the ground drying out where it is left rough.

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Indian Visitor Speaks at Christian Church

An enlightening talk by Rockcastle County's visitor from India, Miss Pushpa Mitra, was the highlight of the Berean class meeting and chow mein dinner, held Tuesday night at the Christian Church.

Miss Mitra talked informally to the young women of the church, drawing a word picture of life in India which at times delighted her audience and at other times awed her listeners.

In India, the women work side by side with their men, but also prepare the meals, which, in Miss Mitra's phrasing, "is a job not so simple."

Miss Mitra was amazed at the speed and efficiency with which we prepare our meals here in America and Rockcastle County. Especially did she see the value of the time saved here, time which can be devoted to earning a livelihood.

The visitor also has been greatly impressed by our system of social security. There is no social security in India, she pointed out. A widow woman must support herself and her children by means of handicraft and needlecraft and go from door to door selling her goods.

Up until a few years ago a widow woman could not even remarry in India. Miss Mitra explained, but the law now has changed, although still not entirely accepted.

The Indians do have a good family life, though, the visitor pointed out. In India when a son marries he brings his wife to his father's house and when a daughter marries she joins her husband's family. The young women are with their parents and uncles and aunts in harmony.

There is no arguing and conflict in the Indian family, the young Indian woman told her audience. And the Indians have a very poor idea of American family life. To the Indian family life in America is divorce and unhappy and broken homes.

Miss Mitra told her American sisters she will be happy to take back to India. In fact, she added, in her opinion American family life is good. The American family is not so large, but the home life is nice.

Miss Mitra was accompanied to the meeting by her Rockcastle County hostess, Mrs. Bradley Taylor, with both she and Mrs. Saylor enjoying a chow mein dinner with members of the class.
