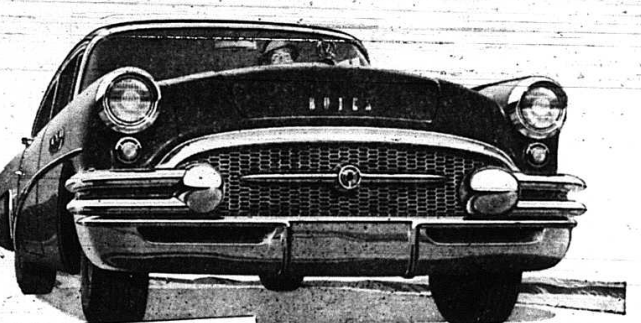

\$2,582,626 Spent Here On Highway Construction

Over 115 miles of highways constructed or improved since 1948.

Over 115,577 miles of Rockcastle County highways have been constructed or improved during the past seven and one-half years at a cost of \$2,582,626.89, it was revealed this week in a report to Governor Wetherby by Highway Commissioner Mitchell Tinder.

A total of 28 projects have been executed in Rockcastle County by the Department of Highways since January 1, 1948 until June 1, 1955. Commissioner Tinder reported a total of 16,368 miles of construction and improvements have been made in Kentucky's 120 counties at a cost of \$233,422,847.

During the period from January 1, 1948 to June 1, 1955, the Department of Highways, after taking competitive bids, let to the lowest bidder contracts for the greatest volume of work that has ever been undertaken during any comparable period of time.

In addition to letting contracts covering approximately 6,368 miles of grade and drainage, bituminous surfacing and reconstruction at a cost of approximately \$434,422,847.60 the Department has not only maintained the 10,579 miles of road under State Maintenance as of January 1, 1948 but has added 717 miles to the State System of roads for maintenance. Also, the Department in its aid to county program

currently maintaining 12,636 miles of county roads and constructing 330 miles. These figures do not include any part of the Louisville-Elizabeth town Turnpike.

The Rockcastle County projects executed during the period from January 1, 1948 are:

- London-Mt. Vernon, 456 miles, substructure and approaches, \$100,000.00
- London-Mt. Vernon, 81 eel superstructure and floor, \$1,703.06
- Brodhead-Eubank (Ky. 70) 4,222 miles, bituminous road mix, \$22,345.44
- Mt. Vernon-Berea, 6,226 miles, grade, drain and bituminous concrete, \$329,690.40
- Quail-London County Line, 3,460 miles, grade, drain and traffic bound, \$30,031.65
- Burr-Salt Pines Caves, 9,069 miles, grade, drain and traffic bound, \$11,160.00
- Mt. Vernon-Somerset, 3,216 miles, grade, drain and traffic bound, \$71,160.00
- Mt. Vernon-Stanford, 4,583 miles, bituminous concrete, \$42.83

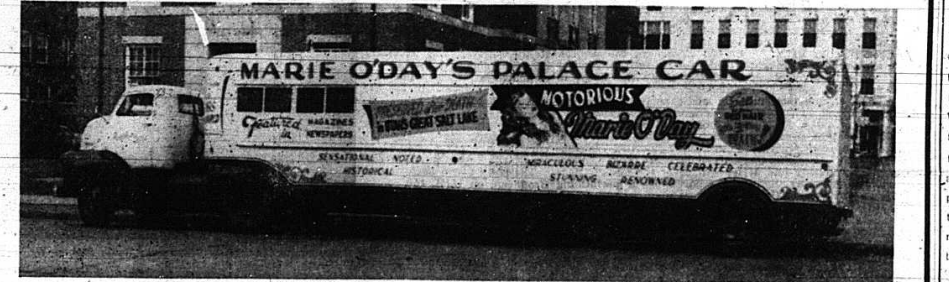

In cases of death of the former prisoner of war, claims may be filed by the surviving widow, husband, children or parents.

Payment is authorized to be

made at the rate of \$2.50 per day for each day of imprisonment.

Any members of the United States Armed Forces presently held as prisoners of war as a result of the Korean hostilities will be eligible to file their claims within one year after returning to American Military Control.

Survivors of prisoners of war who have not returned to the jurisdiction of the A. R. M. C. Forces of the United States may file not later than one year from the date the Department of Defense makes a determination that the prisoner of war has actually died or is presumed dead.
