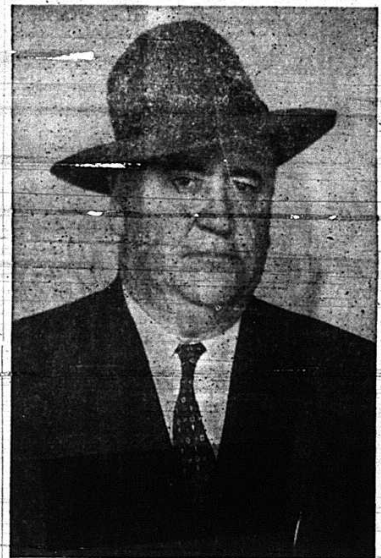

This week of fun and education is very enlightening and a joy for any boy or girl. **Canning Equipment Should Be Checked**

It's time to check on canning equipment if you want rows of good tasting foods this winter, says Miss Florence Over, food specialist at the University of Kentucky. Careful canning means foods that are rich in flavor, minerals and vitamins.

Both a boiling water bath canner and a steam pressure canner are needed for home canning. The boiling water bath

canner supplies enough heat to destroy molds, yeast and bacteria that cause spoilage of fruits and tomatoes. The canner should be deep enough to cover the tops of the jars with water by 2 inches without boiling over. A lard can is often used. The jars should be set on a rack open in a metal basket to keep them from touching the bottom of the can, and the cover should be placed on top.

The steam pressure canner has a few holes punched in it should always be used for canning corn, peas, beans and all other vegetables. It is also used for meats and poultry. The heavy steel canner has a cover which may be clamped tight to make it steam tight. It is fitted with a safety valve, pressure gauge and a dial pressure gauge. The cover should be checked by the home demonstration agents at least once a year.

Oven canning is not recommended by Miss Inlay. Jars may explode in the oven or jar may spoil because of under pressure.

Canning may be more easily and quickly done with these pieces of equipment in hand: wire basket, rolander, sieve or strainer, food mill and chopper, funnel, ladle with lip and jar lifter to remove jars.

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## Council To Be Organized For Industrial Development

Plans for the organization of a council for association to promote the improvement and development of industry, agriculture, education and recreation in Rockcastle County were made Tuesday night at a meeting of the county's leading business and professional men and women.

A motion was made that the Junior Chamber of Commerce adopt the project and set up operational procedure.

The meeting was held at the County School Administration Building. Present for advice and counsel were J. C. Zimmerman, director of Industrial Development for the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce; Barney A. Tucker, of London, first vice-president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Pat W. Wear of Berea College.

The local committee included C. H. Hilton, president of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce; Floyd Owens, president of the Jaycees, and Bradley Saylor, secretary of the Farm Bureau.

Plans were made for a community meeting on July 14, with Mr. Owens appearing as temporary chairman. At the community meeting organization of the council will be set up and officers elected.

All business men and interested citizens are invited and urged to attend the July meeting.

## Willie Foster Dies At The Age Of 71

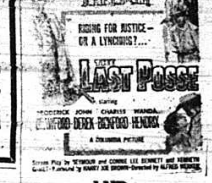

## EDITORIAL

### RENFRO VALLEY AND TV

Reprinted from the Renfro Valley Bugle.

Visitors and correspondents are constantly asking "Why isn't Renfro Valley on TV?" Maybe we can answer your question by explaining that in order to get on television programs on the screen in all their natural surroundings it would be necessary to bring in complete movie equipment and make a film for TV, which would be very, very expensive. Some time ago we could have easily gotten a television station and put on a live show in front of their cameras. This we have not wanted to do, as we would lose all the charm of the Valley and be just another TV program, with painted scenery and artificial sets and the like. This is no disparagement of present-day TV programs, but we have long hoped to be able to do for TV what we have done for radio, produce a show in its rightful surroundings and under normal, everyday living conditions.

Now it seems that we may have to sacrifice some of our ideas and ideals and make a try for regular TV through some outlet already in operation. The telephone line that carries our radio program into WHAS at Louisville cannot do as much for us in TV. The laying of cables and installation of proper equipment and the cost of the question for us to have any hope of doing live TV shows direct from Renfro Valley.

We have not lost faith in radio, but apparently a great many sponsors have and have gone over to the newer medium almost entirely. We may have to follow suit. Some of us may have to leave the Valley and go into TV until there is the expected return to radio. Maybe it will work out so that some of us can stay and carry radio along while others work in television. We'd like to do it that way. We know that the Renfro Valley "Gethers" and the Renfro Valley Band are welcome visitors in many homes where television is not yet possible. If we got out of radio we'd feel like we were letting our friends in such homes down.

But the world does change. Maybe we'll have to change with it. Maybe Renfro Valley is the only place "where time stands still." Anyway, we're looking around for a connection and maybe you'll be seeing us on your set some day.

### Post Office Starts New Mail Service

Acting Postmaster Ethel H. Griffin announced that a new type of mail service, Certified Mail, went into effect here last week when the new 15c Certified Mail Stamp was placed on sale.

The new service provides for proof of delivery at a cheaper rate than registered mail and will be easier for the post office to handle. The new service eliminates the "no indemnity" registered mail, which cost 30 cents plus regular postage charges.

Certified mail provides a receipt for the sender and a record will be kept at the office at which the mail is first handled. The new mail service is handled through ordinary mail channels and no insurance coverage is provided.

Certified mail service will be applicable only to first-class and air-mail having no monetary value. The 15c certified mail fee will be in addition to the regular postage.

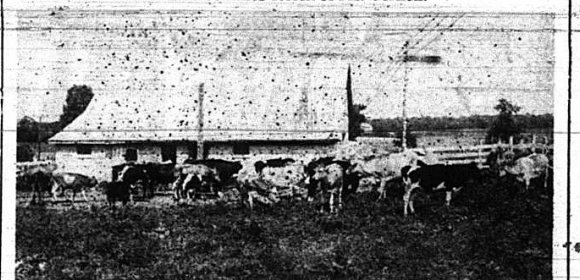

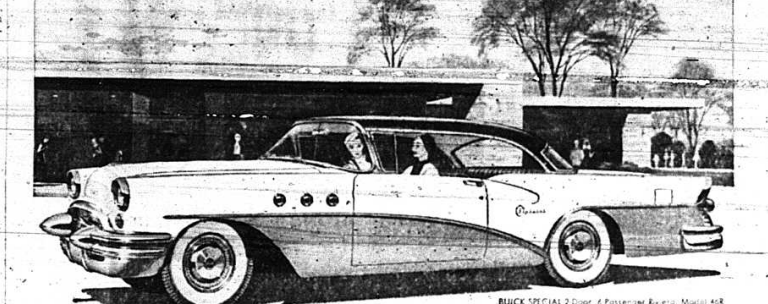

through Bi-Monthly Billing

Residential, rural and most commercial customers of Kentucky Utilities Company in this district will soon start receiving electric bills every other month instead of monthly. About half our customers will receive their electric bills in January, March, May, July, September, and November. The others will receive them in February, April, June, August, October, and December. Notices are being sent with the last monthly bills so that all customers will know when to expect their first bi-monthly bills. Since conversion to bi-monthly billing will make some changes necessary in meter-reading dates, the first bi-monthly bills will cover electric service for a period of between 45 and 75 days. The actual number of days covered will be marked on the bill. After this first bi-monthly bill, your future bills will be for approximately 60 days of service. Rate Schedules Not Changed There is no change in present rate schedules. They will be adapted to bi-monthly billing. All industrial, commercial and other customers using more than 2,000 kilowatt hours a month will continue to receive bills monthly. Many customers, we believe, will find this new billing

arrangement a convenience, since only half as many trips to the KU office need be made or half as many checks written to pay your electric bill. Bi-Monthly Billing Helps Reduce Costs During the last 12 or 15 years, the cost of just about everything that goes into supplying electric service has increased tremendously. We have had to pay much more for fuel, equipment and labor. Our taxes are much higher. To meet these increased expenses and still supply the best electric service at low price we have had to search constantly for ways to cut costs. We have initiated many technical improvements and operating efficiencies to reduce expenses. Bi-monthly billing is designed to reduce costs. It will mean savings in meter-reading, postage, mailing, paper, envelopes, printing and collection costs. It is the latest of many methods that help us keep on supplying your electricity at its present price which is actually lower than before World War II. Budget Payments Accepted There may be a few customers who want to continue to make payments each month. We shall be glad to accept their budget payments and credit the payments to their accounts.
