County Agent Notes

Grasshopper Control

Grasshoppers usually start their development in meadows along road sides or other grassy place. The best way therefore, to provide damage to gardens and field crops is to destroy the pests in the fields where they originate.

Several insecticides are recommended for use against grasshoppers, some of which are listed here with the amount of active ingredient per acre when used as a spray: Dieldrin—1 1/2 ounces for grasshoppers in all stages of development; Aldrin—2 ounces for young grasshoppers - 4 ounces for old ones.

Toxaphene - 1 1/2 pounds for young grasshoppers - 2 pounds for old ones.

The emulsion form of the insecticide is best adapted to the weed-sprayer type of applicator. If wettable powders are used continuous agitation of the liquid in the tank must be provided.

If dusts are used the dosage recommended for sprays should be increased by 50%.

Poisoned baits can be used effectively in many instances. They are most effective against young grasshoppers that are found in short vegetation or in open spaces. They are not so effective in tall, rank, and dense vegetation.

Poisoned, wet bait should be broadcast by hand at the rate of 20 pounds per acre. The best time to make application is early in the morning from about 5 to 8 A. M. The formula for the preparation of the bait is as follows:

Bran - 100 pounds for 25 pounds of bran and 3 1/2 bushels of sawdust mixed well)

Aldrin - 2 ounces actual from the emulsion concentrate, or Dieldrin - 1 1/2 ounces actual from the emulsion concentrate, or

Chlordane - 1/2 pound actual from the emulsion concentrate, or Toxaphene - 1 pound actual from the emulsion concentrate

Water, enough to make a moist crumbly mash - 4 to 10 gallons depending upon moisture in bran or sawdust.

Blackstrap Molasses - 1 gallon Dieldrin - 1 1/2 ounces actual the 1/2 poison concentrate

should be stirred thoroughly into the water and molasses. The poisoned water should then be mixed well with the carrier.

Corn and tobacco can be protected by treating the margins of the fields and adjacent fields of small grain, bluegrass, alfalfa, clover and weed patches.

Forage treated with Aldrin, Dieldrin, Chlordane or Toxaphene should not be fed to dairy animals or to animals being finished for slaughter. Animals should be kept off treated pastures for a period of, at least two weeks, following the application of the insecticide. If the insecticides are used on vegetables or fruits, they should not be applied to the parts of the plants that will be eaten or marketed unless residues of these insecticides can be removed by washing, stripping or peeling.

UK REPORTS HIGHER SUMMER ENROLLMENT

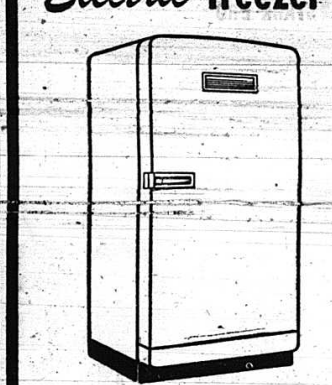

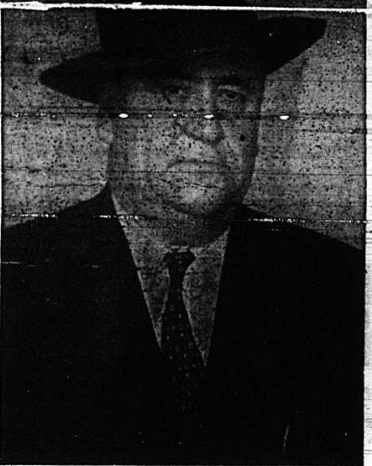

Installment Is Due On Estimated Tax
Approximately 35,000 Kentuckians have been mailed notices that the second installment is due on their 1955 estimated income tax. In announcing this, Commissioner of Revenue Robert H. Alphin stated that most of these taxpayers are self-employed persons, who use this pay-as-you-go method, just as wage earners have state income taxes withheld from their paychecks.
Alphin pointed out that the

reverse side of the installment notice contains a schedule for an amended declaration of estimated taxes. This schedule is for taxpayers whose estimated 1955 income has changed substantially since they filed their original declaration at the beginning of the year. The income tax installment payments are due July 15.

Wreck At Pine Hill Fatal To Ohio Father Of Eight

Driver of transfer truck dies after being burned over 98 per cent of the body.

The Pine Hill curve south of Mt. Vernon has claimed another victim. A 35-year-old father of eight children is dead this week as a result of third degree burns received when his truck overturned and caught fire on the curve Tuesday night.

The man, Aaron Perry of Cincinnati, Ohio, died Wednesday morning at Berea Hospital and was brought to the Spaulding Parental Home in Mt. Vernon where the body was prepared for burial.

Perry was a driver for the Tompkins Reynolds Transfer Company of Cincinnati. The truck, a 1955 Ford COE, was wrecked and caught fire after the bed fell off and scooted 77 steps down the highway. A hitch hiker passenger, James Taylor of Johnson City, Ala., escaped death. He was treated at Berea Hospital for first and second degree burns and internal injuries. Perry, 35, was the third degree burns over 98 per cent of his body and died 10 hours after the accident.

The accident occurred at about 11:00 P. M. Tuesday night. The body of the driver has been taken to the Crowley Funeral Home for funeral services and burial set for Friday in Johnson City, the man's former home.

Perry was the husband of Mrs. Claudia Perry. The couple had been married 17 years. The surviving children include four boys and four girls.

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At the age of 82, Mrs. M. Saylor of Brindle Ridge still comes to the Mt. Vernon Cannery each year to do her canning. With Mrs. Saylor is the above picture is one of her daughters, Mrs. Dirl Mink of Mt. Vernon.

The canning season in Rockcastle County is officially underway. The canning champion of the county has paid her first visit to the Mt. Vernon Cannery, which opened last week.

The canning champion, in this case, is Mrs. M. C. Saylor of Brindle Ridge. At the age of 82, Mrs. Saylor is still making her annual trips to Mt. Vernon to put up vegetables, fruits and meats for the winter months.

Mrs. Saylor has been coming to the cannery since it first opened back in the 1930's. She remembers what it was like to can beans in the old building and enjoys the conveniences of the new, located in back of the Mt. Vernon School.

Edna Saylor is the mother of 10 children, all living, and has 48 grandchildren and 37 great grandchildren. She came to this county 40 years ago from Bell County and still has her own home and does her own housework. Her husband has been dead 14 years.

The Saylor children are Mrs. Dirl Mink and Mrs. W. A. Ponder of Mt. Vernon; Mrs. Walter Hyscutt and Mr. Carlo Saylor of Brodhead; Leamon and Morgan Saylor of Crab Orchard; Mrs. Rachel McCollum and Edna Saylor of Berea; Homan Saylor of Louisville; and J. B. Saylor of Detroit, Mich.

In addition to being a pioneer in the canning field, Mrs. Saylor also has a record in the field of church work. She has helped build three churches over the years, donating land on her farm each time a new building site was needed.

Like other women of the county, Mrs. Saylor is assisted in her work at the cannery by Mrs. Margaret DeJarnett, who is on hand each day to supervise the work.

Operations were in full swing this week at the green bean crop reached its peak in the county. The beans are being brought in in bushel baskets and piled high in wash tubs, broken up and ready for the steaming hot water and pressure which through the cannery process strips the outer covering of natural flavor and freshness.

The cannery opens each morning at 8:00 A. M., with patrons continuing to bring in their produce as late as 2:00 P. M. A charge of eight cents a quart is made to cover expense, including the tin cans furnished by the cannery.

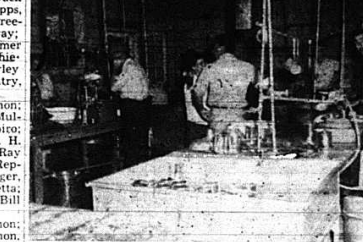
While beans are the main item being brought in now, some peas, beets and carrots have been put up. Corn will be next on the list, followed by meat when the butchering season arrives.

Fruits usually are much in evidence, but Mrs. DeJarnett reports that the fruit crop has been light so far this year. An average day sees 300 to 1,000 cans of food leave the cannery, ready for the home shelves. Twenty-five to 30 homemakers of the county make use of the facilities each day, with even an occasional male braving the female chatter to see that his food shelves will be well stocked this season.

The cannery is open to all residents of the community and visitors who might be here to help harvest the garden of a friend or relative.

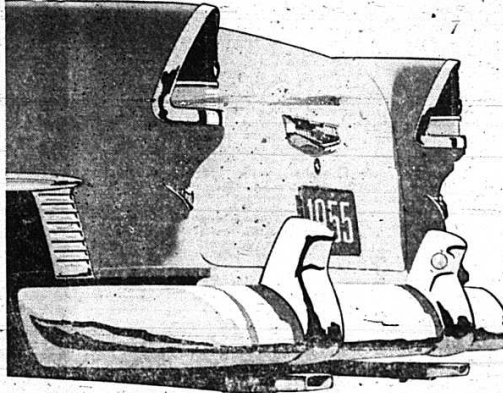
