This was a very successful event. Chlordane For Ants

Autumn is the season when many houses and yards are invaded by troops of ants. To get rid of them, the first step is to find their nests and then treat them with an insecticide.

Outdoors the nests are usually easy to see. Small mounds of soil on the ground, near flagstones and sidewalks, in decaying tree trunks, near foundations.

Indoors is a difficult problem. Usually the best you can do is to watch the trails of the ants, trace them to a baseboard or door frame and apply insecticide.

The most effective insecticide in the home is a 2 percent oil base chlordane solution, applied with a paint brush or sprayer as near a possible to where the nest may be located.

Water base chlordane sprays are also effective. Paint or spray along baseboards, cracks in floors, door and window frames, sinks.

This way you can check ants before they get into foods and on tables.

Chlordane has a long lasting effect and it is usually not necessary to spray more than once every one to three months.

A good preventive measure against ants is to keep all containers of food, flour canisters and bread bins tightly covered and to keep ants from entering the house, apply chlordane along the outside walls from the ground up to the windows.

Chlordane is poisonous to people and pets, as well as ants. A few simple precautions are necessary when using it or around the home. Keep it away from children, foods, dishes and cooking utensils; be certain not

to inhale the spray mist. If chlordane gets onto the skin, wash it off immediately with soap and water.

**Winter Storage of Vegetables**

Some means must be at hand for keeping vegetables that can be held fresh, as well as those that were canned. Two kinds of storage places are needed, warm and cool.

The "warm" vegetables, sweet potatoes, cushaws and squashes, grow best in high temperature and need a storing temperature of 50 degrees and dry atmosphere. Such conditions also suit canned vegetables admirably safe as to freezing and by virtue of the dry air, less rusting of metal jar caps.

The "Cool" vegetables are white potatoes, cabbage and root crops. They need only to be kept from freezing (but 40 degrees is a standard temperature).

All of the above apply only moist to keep the vegetables plump.

An excellent place for the "warm" vegetables is a room in which a fire is kept at least daytimes. The best location is at the ceiling where the warmest and driest air tends to gather. Or corners of that room may be used, the warmed walls bridging quite severe nights even though no fire is kept. Or

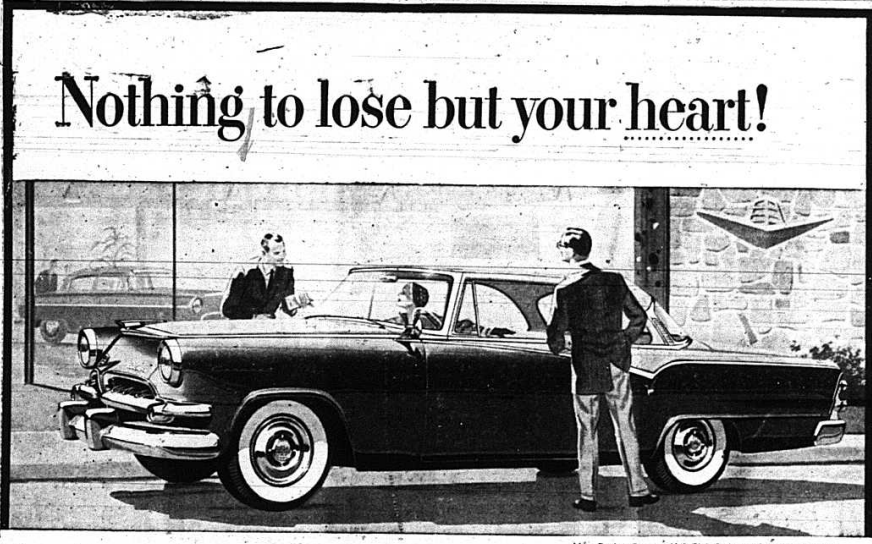
