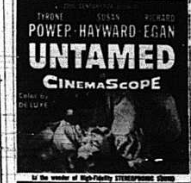

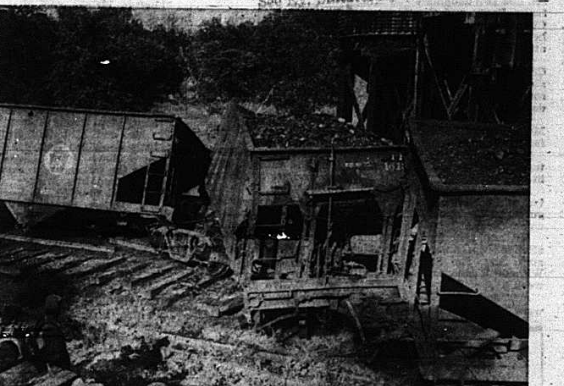
### Buckeye Homecoming Draws Crowd Of 200

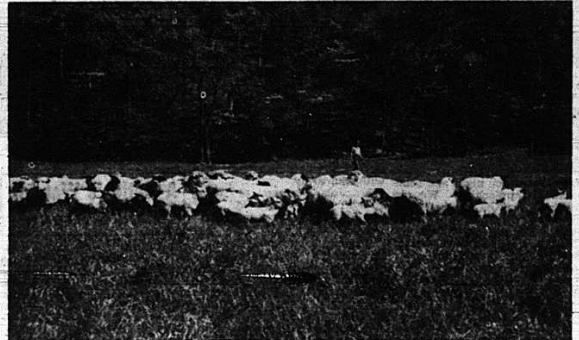

We, the members of the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau take pride in welcoming a native son home, a young man who has prepared himself for a lifetime of service. Dr. K. R. Burdette is a graduate of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute School of Veterinary Medicine, one of the finest schools of its kind in the country. He was graduated with Highest Honor and received the E. A. Davis Award for being the outstanding clinician in both large and Small Animal Clinics. Dr. Burdette knows Rockcastle County and the people of the county. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Bradley Burdette of Renfro Valley, he was graduated from the Mt. Vernon High School and attended Eastern State College at Richmond for two years. He also taught for a while in one of the county's one-room school houses, at Beech Grove. After serving as a sergeant with the U. S. Marines during World War II, Dr. Burdette enrolled at the University of Kentucky, where he earned a B. S. degree in the School of Agriculture. Cows and hogs alike are brought to Dr. Burdette's office on Perciful Street when they can be moved and many a pig or hog is brought in for treatment. Chickens also are treated in large numbers. Although his practice is primarily in Rockcastle County, Dr. Burdette also has been called out of the county, serving Rockcastle neighbors in Madison, Jackson, Garrard and Lincoln Counties.
