



Rockcastle County Farm Bureau WELCOMES Dr. K. R. Burdette To Rockcastle County We, the members of the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau take pride in welcoming a native son home, a young man who has prepared himself for a lifetime of service.

Dr. K. R. Burdette is a graduate of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute School of Veterinary Medicine, one of the finest schools of its kind in the country. He was graduated with Highest Honor and received the E. A. Davis Award for being the outstanding clinician in both large and Small Animal Clinics.

Dr. Burdette knows Rockcastle County and the people of the county. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Bradley Burdette of Renfro Valley, he was graduated from the Mt. Vernon High School and attended Extern State Col-lege at Richmond for two years. He also taught for a while in one of the county's one-room school houses, at Beech

After serving as a sergeant with the U. S. Marines during World War II, Dr. Burdette enrolled at the University of Kentucky, where he earned a B. S. degree in the School of Agriculture. He then taught agriculture at the Mt. Vernon High School for three years.

Dr. Burdette was graduated from Alabama Polytechnic this past June and has been busy ever since serving the farmers of Rockcastle County. He interned with Dr. O. M. Lackey, Somerset veterinarian.

Dr. Burdette is planning a large and small animal hospital, but now does most of his work on the farm. He usually is called on delivery cases only when complications arise, like the time he was called to the Jahn Heuston farm at Brodhead: One of Houston's prize Holsteins gave birth to premature twins. Even a doctor wayn't able to save the calves, as one of them was already dead when born, but Dr. Burdette was able to save the cow, a good milk producer and the mother of other healthy calves.




