The Story Of Joseph

Chapter XXIV
Concerning The Death Of Jacob and Family.

Now, when Jacob had resided in Heliopolis of Egypt for seventy years, Joseph being 17 years old when sold to the Ishmaelites, and had his father brought to Egypt 17 years after he was sold; and when Jacob had lived in Egypt this amount of years, he died in the presence of his sons; but not till he had blessed all of his sons as well as Joseph's sons, Ephraim and Manasse.

And, when he had foretold to them prophetically, how each of them were to reside in Canaan, he praised Joseph and commended him for not remembering the evil things his brethren had done to him as Joseph forgave them of all this evil. On

the contrary, he was kind to them and bestowed on them many benefits that seldom are bestowed on men's benefactors.

He then commanded his sons to receive Joseph's sons into their number and to give them their share in the land of Canaan; however, he made a request that he himself might be buried in Hebron.

So he died when he had lived a full one hundred and forty seven years, having not been behind any of his ancestors in their toward God; and Joseph, by permission of Pharaoh, carried his father's remains to Hebron and there buried it in the place where he himself had spent his boyhood days, and all at a great expense.

Now, his brethren were at first unwilling to return to the land of Canaan because of the evil deed they had done to Joseph; lest he should revenge himself on them when his father had died. But, he persuaded them to fear no harm and to have no suspicion of any revenge from him. So he brought them back to Egypt and gave them great possessions, and did not forsake his particular concern for them.

Now Joseph also died when he had lived a hundred and ten years; having lived a moral, virtuous life, and conducted all his affairs by the rules of reason; and used his authority with moderation which was the cause of his such felicity among the Egyptians, even when other men from another country and of another nationality.

At a time, his brethren died after they had lived happily in Egypt, and the sons of these brethren carried their fathers to Hebron and buried them there as Joseph had done to his father Jacob; but as to the bones of the body of Joseph, they carried them into the land of Canaan according as he had instructed them before his death. And this happened when the Hebrews left Egypt for Canaan at the time of the Exodus for so did Joseph have them to promise him on oath.

And it is proper to relate what happened to the Hebrews after the death of Joseph.

Now, when the successors of the king who had honored Joseph had died there grew up a Pharaoh who knew not Joseph, and the Egyptians began to hate the Israelites who they once loved; they were cruel to them and on account of the large increase of the Hebrews, would some day overcome them in battle and before the increase grew to such number to give the Egyptians fear, they made slaves of them and gave them tasks too heavy to bear by any common Hebrew; and the Pharaoh who knew not Joseph, gave orders for all the Israelites sons born, should be cast into the waters of the Nile River at birth, in order to stop the increase of the Hebrew people; as such a law if carried out perfectly would have obliterated the Hebrew race in the course of 50 years.

But the Egyptian midwives did not heed the order of their king, having more respect for the wives of the Hebrews than the fear of the Pharaoh; and at this time there was a Hebrew, Amram by name and his wife was Jochebed; and God had mercy on him on account of his supplication and raised up Moses on this wife.

When he was born, his father and mother kept him hid for three months and when they could hide him no longer, they made an ark of bulrushes and pitched it so it kept out the water and when they had placed Moses in this ark, they cast

it in the flags of the Nile River; whereupon Pharaoh's daughter appeared on the beach for recreation and saw the ark floating in the water; who ordered her servants to bring it to her and when she opened it she discovered it contained a very beautiful man child and she loved it on account of its beauty.

When Mariam saw Merthusus, the daughter of Pharaoh, open the ark, she came running down the river bank, and said shall I call a nurse for you to look after the child, and Merthusus gave her permission to call a nurse and Mariam called the child's mother; and when Merthusus had raised Moses, on account of her wealth, she educated Moses in the colleges of the Egyptians; and if he had not ran away from Egypt, he was the heir to the throne of Pharaoh, as Pharaoh had no son of his own.

And, Merthusus, being a virgin, adopted Moses for her son so he could be the heir to the throne of her father; and it was Moses, as his name given to him by Pharaoh, who led the people of drawing him out of the water as his name signifies drawn out of the water.

And, he was it, who led the Hebrews and descendants of

Joseph out of the land of bondage, on account of the hardness they were suffering from the Egyptians who once loved the Hebrew people, but now hated and feared them.

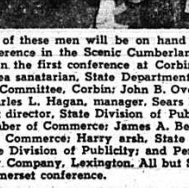



September is the month to sow seed on the lawn. In most sections the rains this year have produced an abundance of crabgrass. If the lawn has lots of this grass, it should be cut short, one inch, and raked to remove the crabgrass, then extra fancy Kentucky bluegrass seed should be sown. If there is a fair stand of bluegrass among the crabgrass, about one-fourth seed should be sown on each 1,000 square feet of surface. If the lawn is comparatively young or on old lawns that have a very thin stand of bluegrass, one pound of seed to each 1,000 square feet is the best.

It is not good to reseed the lawn at this time because the crabgrass will benefit most from the fertilizer. After the frosts in late October or early November have killed the crabgrass, the fertilizer should be applied. Seeding and feeding at the right time will do much to help overcome much of the crabgrass. Good lawns are the result of regular annual care, and seeding is the place to begin.
