## "Operation Tourist Count" Set For Friday And Saturday

Test will be one of largest traffic surveys ever conducted in Kentucky.

Rockcastle County Jaycees this week end will be helping sponsor one of the biggest and most comprehensive traffic survey projects ever conducted in Kentucky as "Operation Tourist Count" gets underway.

### Cattle, Car and Hogs In Lancaster Fire

Cattle, a car and hogs were counted among the losses of a fire which broke out during the two million dollar fire which leveled the Lancaster Stockyards and farm-business block.

Sam Jones had the largest number of cattle at the stockyards as 1,000 head of livestock perished in the flames. Jones had taken 15 head to the market.

The Rockcastle fire destroyed in the mid-day inferno was the property of Tommy Carpenter. Other livestock men who had cattle or hogs on the market Friday were Vernon Houck, Robert Wilmot, Earl Turner, James W. Lambert, O. M. E. F. J. W. Hilton and Ambrose Hastly.

### Development Association To Meet Twice Monthly

The Rockcastle County Development Association is moving forward. Plans for the progress of the community are developing to the point where the association now feels that two meetings a month will be necessary to put the plans in action.

In the future the association will meet once a month at Mt. Vernon and again at Livingston or Brodhead. The Mt. Vernon meetings will be held on the third Monday of the month. On alternate first Mondays the group will meet at one of the other two towns.

The weekly meeting was held at Brodhead, with a large and representative attendance. The speaker at the meeting was Nathan Muller, who reported plans for a larger and more blackberry processing plant in Mt. Vernon and announced that he also would buy strawberries as soon as the acreage is raised.

Rockcastle residents received \$36,000 for blackberries last year. The strawberry acreage pointed out the most of the money was profit, since the blackberries grow wild here.

The strawberry acreage would need to be raised to 200 or 300 acres to support a strawberry processing plant, he said. The present acreage is 100 acres. The Brodhead meeting was conducted by B. H. Hammett, association president. Favorable reports were given for a stockyard here and it was reported that investigations will continue into the prospects for a wholesale grocery.

Plans also were made for Rockcastle County Day, a special day set aside to promote trade in the county. Rockcastle Day has been set for October 1.



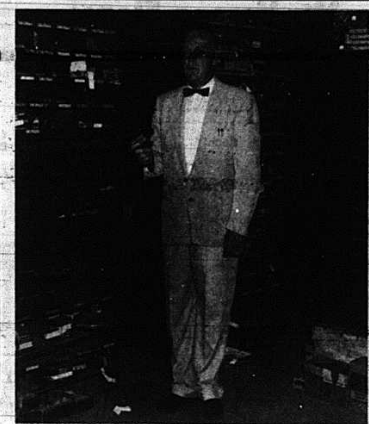
