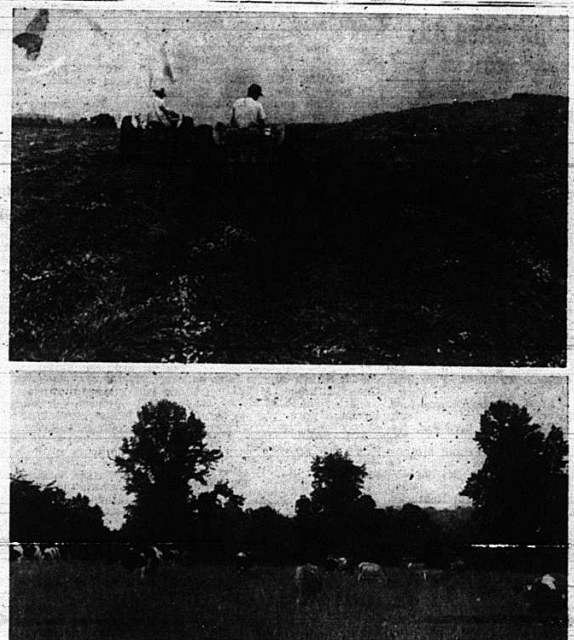

### Detailed Study Now Underway On "Operation Tourist Count"

"Operation Tourist Count", conducted here and across the Cumberland region last week has been reported a great success. A detailed study of the survey results now is being made by the director of Joseph Pulliam of the highway department's Division of Planning. Mr. Pulliam has announced that the results probably will be announced in November.

Aims of the project are as follows:

1. Determine what percentage of tourist traffic in the SCI area is through traffic and how much is through the Cumberland-Wonderland area.
2. Learn comparative ratings of metropolitan areas as origin of SCI tourist traffic. From this study the location and area tourist operators can determine where advertising efforts should be directed.
3. Find out what the area's visitors like and don't like about Cumberland-Wonderland attractions and accommodations.
4. Give an indication as to the average daily expenditure of tourists in the area.
5. Develop a formula for the incident of tourist cars in all traffic in the region. Such a figure could be applied to future traffic counts taken by SCI to determine the number of tourists in Cumberland-Wonderland at any given time.

The SCI survey stations will check traffic on virtually every major highway in the tourist test area. A minimum of eight volunteer workers, plus police and other safety officials will be on duty at each of the stations at all times during the survey.

Traffic flow and safety factors determined the placement of the survey stations, according to SCI officials. Station locations were:

- On U. S. 25 North of its junction with Ky. 1016 at Berea; on Ky. 80 East of London; U. S. 43E. Devol at S. 27 north of South of Williamsburg; U. S. 27 between Pine Knot and the

Farmers who raise sericea know that it makes excellent hay when managed properly and it is one of the few crops that can withstand this dry weather. It is seeded in the spring and may be cut two to three times each year. It does not have to be seeded each year but is a perennial.

### Root Vegetables Family Favorites

Root vegetables are made the family favorites says food specialists at the University of Kentucky.  
1. Scrub vegetables, then boil them whole in their skins. This method saves both flavor and food value. Remove the skin after cooking, then serve vegetables with butter, white sauce or in a scalloped dish.  
2. When oven is being used for other food preparation, bake vegetables, too. Potatoes, squash and carrots are choice bakers.  
3. A little lemon juice or vinegar with the fat adds a pleasant flavor for beets, turnips and carrots.

Recipe for baked grated carrots: 2 T melted fat, 4 T chopped onion, one cup bread crumbs, 2 eggs, one cup milk, one tsp. salt, dash of pepper, 2 cups grated raw carrots.

Melt butter, add onions and half of bread crumbs. Stir and cook slowly, until light brown. Remove from fire. Beat eggs, add milk, seasoning, carrots and remainder of bread crumbs. Set in pan of hot water (the filled casserole) and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees for 35 minutes.

### Navy Sets December 10 For Annual NROTC Exam

The tenth annual competitive examination for high school seniors who desire to attend college and train for careers as Naval officers will be held throughout the nation on December 10, the Navy announced today.

Applications for the NROTC are now available, but must be received by November 10.

Parrett will serve as basketball coach. Their Naval careers in colleges and universities across the country in 1956, with substantial financial assistance from the government. After a normal college education, graduates will be commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps, for active duty with the Fleet throughout the world.

Male citizens of the United States, between the ages of 17 and 21 are eligible to apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Persons who attain a qualifying score will be given the Navy's rigid midshipman physical examination next February. From the pool of qualified candidates remaining in competition, approximately 1,800 young men will be selected for appointment to the NROTC, and the course of their choice.

Students enrolled in the Regular NROTC program will spend their summers on training cruises in competition, and will receive \$600 annual retainer pay until commissioned. In addition to the normal college curriculum, Marine Corps students will study a planned course in Naval Science. All tuition, fees, and books will be furnished by the Navy.

This college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty in the Marine Corps. Such graduates will be selected under a separate quota established for the services.

Applications are now available at all high schools, colleges and U. S. Navy Recruiting Stations, or direct from the Chief of Naval Personnel, Washington 25, D. C.
