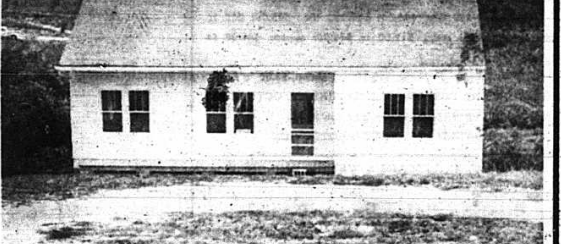

Ranger Reports Forest Fire Threat In This District

A very serious Forest Fire threat is facing us here in Madison, Rockcastle, and Jackson Counties. The months of August and September have produced only insignificant rains totaling two and one-quarter inches.

These rains have been so far apart that the rainfall has evaporated by the following day. Our woodlands and grasslands are now tinder dry. Green leaves are falling from the trees, dry enough to burn, standing grass and weeds will burn as though they had been soaked in gasoline.

This is what would happen if a fire started in our dry forests or grasslands. First, it takes nearly an hour to get a crew of fire fighters to the average fire. In that hour a forest fire would increase from a match, cigarette, pipe ashes, or rubbish fire to an 80 acre fire. It would take 36 men working as hard as they could 4 hours to put a control line around that fire. It would take 6 cars to haul the men and equipment to transport the fire fighting tools to the fire. It would take half of those men 8 hours the following day to put out all the smoldering inside the fire. It would take \$95.00 worth of food to feed the fire fighters on the fire. If every-thing went smoothly, the chances did not get across the control line, that one little match or cigarette would have cost a total of \$500.00 to put out.

Rebuilding Underway On Garrard Stockyards

The Garrard County Stockyards of Lancaster leveled by a disastrous fire September 5, has started rebuilding on the same site.

The \$2,000,000 mid-day fire touched off by an exploding gasoline tank truck destroyed the entire farm block of the Garrard County seat.

The stockyards was granted a permit to rebuild at a special meeting of the Lancaster City Council last week.

The business is owned by Kirby, Hogan and J. L. Teater of Garrard County.

J. T. Pillard said the new entrance would face Stanford Street just like the structure destroyed by fire.

The permit was granted for a one-story building any yards of wood construction, a 2-story office buildings of cement blocks with the east and north sides of iron construction. A building across the railroad tracks will be built facing Campbell Street. This building will have three ironclad sides. Two fire hydrants with 50 feet of hose attached will be installed inside the building.

With entrance facing Campbell Street, the loading on Stanford Street will be reduced about 25 per cent, the owners said. Stanford Street is "part of heavily-travelled U. S. 27."

Wilson was stabbed with a knife in the Mobley home, according to the arresting officer, Livingston Policeman Ted Meadows. He was taken to Berea Hospital in the Sparks Ambulance shortly after the incident and released Tuesday.

Examining trial for Mobley will be set for Saturday. Judge Walter Sowder's court. Mobley's bond has been set at \$1,000.

County Agent Notes

Agronomist Warns Johnson Grass Is Serious Menace

Johnson grass, a perennial noxious weed that closely resembles Sudan grass, is rapidly becoming a menace throughout Kentucky, according to Joe F. Freeman, agronomist at the University of Kentucky Experiment Station. Thousands of acres of fertile bottom land have been practically taken over, and upland soils are becoming infested with it.

Eradication of Johnson grass is almost impossible on over-flow bottomlands where fresh water is brought in each year by flood waters. However, control of the grass to allow production of alternate crops, or perhaps in certain cultural practices, such as close grazing, frequent cutting and plowing, is possible. These methods weaken the root stalks or destroy seedling plants.

Eradication is possible on upland, although it may cost as much as \$50 to \$75 an acre where infestation is heavy. Single plants or small patches can be destroyed by digging or spot-treating with chemicals. Sodium chlorate in the dry form, or TCA as a spray may be applied to the soil in the stubble after the grass has been cut. Retreatment to kill seedlings application is necessary.

Seed production can be prevented by cutting or mowing the plants each time they put out flower heads. Three close cuttings a year usually will be required. It should be done not only in fields and pastures, but on roads and ditch banks in fence rows and on wastelands. Various methods of control and eradication are being tested at the Experiment Station farm at Lexington.

Destroy Bagworms Now
Although bagworms were found hanging on trees and shrubs are now dormant, they should be picked off and destroyed at this time, says Prof. W. A. H. of Kentucky Experiment Station. Each bag contains upwards of 300 eggs, which will hatch in the spring if allowed to remain.
