Sue, 5, Ginger, 3, and Pansie, 16 months-old, had been playing in the corn crib in a barn behind the house. The fire was spotted first by neighbors when flames were shooting from the crib. Mrs. Brummett, who was alone at the time, had to be restrained from going into the crib by neighbors.

Mr. Brummett works in Columbus, Ohio, and was reported enroute to Lexington at the time of the fire.

The Lincoln County Fire Department answered the call to the farm but was unable to extinguish the fire because of a shortage of water. Fireman dug through the debris to recover the charred bodies.

Fireman theorized the children might have been playing with matches, but the cause of the fire has not been determined.

Funeral services were held today at 2 p. m. in Nigger Creek Cemetery with the Rev. Eldon Asher of the Broadhead Church of God officiating.

The children are also survived by two brothers who were at school at the time of the fire.

Uncooked Tomato Relish

How to use the last tomatoes on the vine before the frosts ruins them is of concern to many homemakers in northern areas at this season. One quick and easy way to use a few tomatoes is an uncooked relish. Such a product adds color and flavor to meals. Because it is uncooked, it must be kept in the refrigerator.

Here's a U. S. D. A. recipe that makes about 4 pints of relish.

Ingredients: 2 quarts chopped peeled tomatoes; 1 cup chopped

celery; 3/4 tablespoons sugar; 1 tablespoon mustard seed; 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg; 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon; 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves; 1 cup vinegar. Mix all ingredients together thoroughly, our into clean jars and cover. In the refrigerator or other cold place this relish keeps two to three weeks.

It has been obvious to residents for considerable time, and most certainly the council, that most traffic violations occur in areas of town where the present crash marshals are unable to reach in time. Add to that an increasing number of offenses and only a public clamor for remedy could result. The council acted wisely in listening.

With the new car, and the new qualification that the town marshals be able to drive, will in all likelihood result in a better service for the two present marshals, Clifford Pittman and McKinley Arnold. If that is the

They faced the criticism of those of us who want and demand law enforcement yet "cut" the price in addition, their salary was hardly average, despite the percentage of their take from police court collections.
