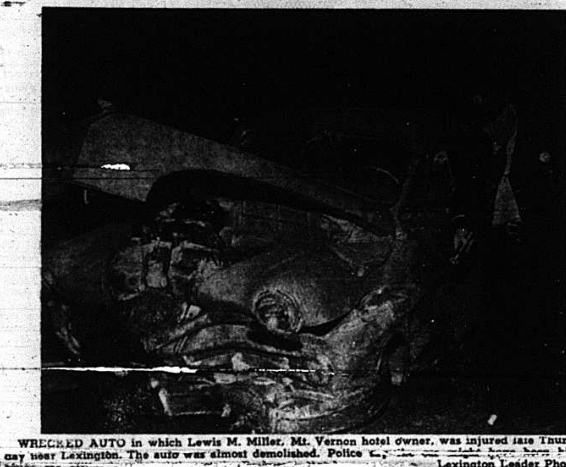

## Lewis Miller Home After Car Smashup

Lewis M. Miller, owner and manager of the Rockcastle Hotel, returned home today after being treated in Lexington's Good Samaritan Hospital for injuries received in an auto wreck late Saturday at Harp's Corner near Lexington.

Mr. Miller received two broken neck-vertebrae and a deep head cut in the wreck. He was brought home from the hospital today by car.

To date the cause of the accident has not been determined. Police report the Rockcastle County man's car might have been hit twice, the last time by Bobby Rankins, 16, of Grimes Mill Road, Lexington.

Young Bankins told police he rounded a curve, going south, and saw the Miller car sitting in the road. He was unable to avoid a smash-up. He told police the Miller car appeared to have been wrecked before he hit it.

No charges have been reported filed against the youth.

Relatives report Mr. Miller has been resting as comfortably as possible. He will be fitted with a neck brace. He is recuperating at the Rockcastle Hotel.

## Hospital Group Readies Rockcastle Fund Drive

Building a hospital is one thing, operating it is another. So said the Rev. Raymond Lawrence, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Baptist Church, at a meeting last week of the finance committee of Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital, Inc.

It was the first meeting of the newly formed committee which will take over running the group's drive for \$200,000 in funds to operate the new local hospital in the early months of its existence.

He told the committee "the Baptists are not certain they can operate the hospital, but we are willing to give it a try and do our best."

His report there are 27 Baptist churches in Rockcastle County and all are behind the project or have members behind it.

He remarked the hospital is a county-wide project and if it is to succeed everyone will have to be behind it.

"If the Baptists fail we don't know who will operate it." A business of any kind becomes an unattractive proposition when it fails. No group wants a hospital that always runs in the hole," he declared.

Said he: "But we will all have to make it go and there will be no advantage for anyone running the hospital. If there is an advantage for the Baptists in operating it, I have failed to find it."

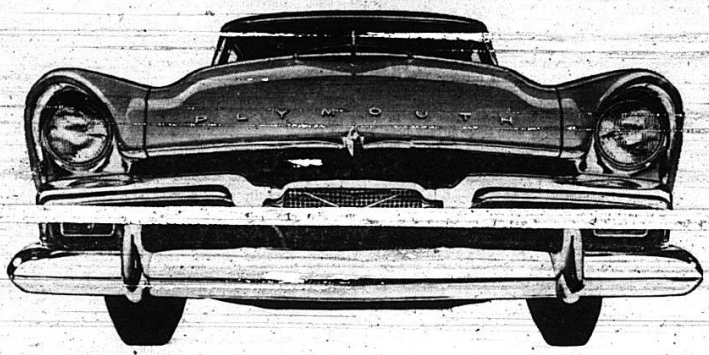

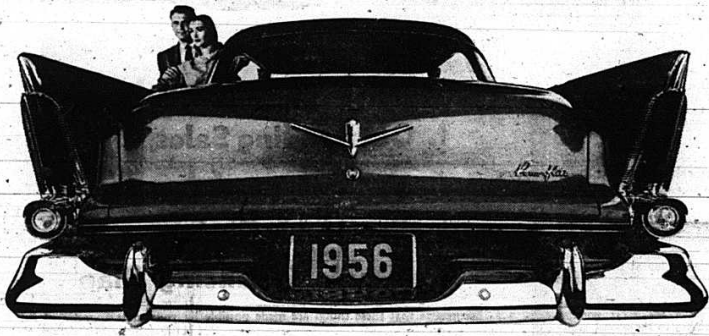

### MRS. MIRACLE'S WARNING SHOULD NOT GO UNHEARD

A preview of things to come is contained in Superintendent Miracle's alarming report that Rockcastle County schools will lose \$6,445.87 in state money this year.

She put her finger on the heart of the matter when she said: "The reason for the loss in money came about because many people in the county left to seek employment in other towns and states."

The reason for the loss of money is this, technically: State funds are allocated to school districts on population basis. The population of Rockcastle County School District dropped from 3801 last year to 3695 this year. The loss of population means a drop in cash from \$142,586.66 to \$136,140.79, or \$6,445.87.

Mrs. Miracle's statement that the loss is difficult to absorb in one year points up that any loss in school funds (already low) could mean the loss of some of the services rendered by the schools. Although she did not directly say this, such has been the case in other school districts.

There is no ready-made solution to the problem. Population losses do not usually occur overnight. People, most certainly, won't return overnight. To get back the lost money the school district will have to gain 106 residents between now and the state's next fiscal year. Gaining them appears unlikely. More likely the county will lose population again this year.

The only remedy obviously, is to find some way to bring citizens into the county as well as keep those already here. Mrs. Miracle has one sensible solution - bring industry into the county. Getting industry here will take time and considerable effort. It's practically to the point where it amounts to "closing the barn door after the horse has got away." But wailing in a

responsibility of governmental and civic organizations.

Perhaps there is a little industrial light beginning to fall on Rockcastle. An advertisement in last week's Signal shows some firm has a factory in mind here if a suitable building can be found. The Rockcastle Betterment Association is trying to find one. It has not indicated the type of factory. Citizens should cooperate. Let us remember, if our school system is forced to discontinue some of its services, Mrs. Miracle told us it was costing a long time ago.

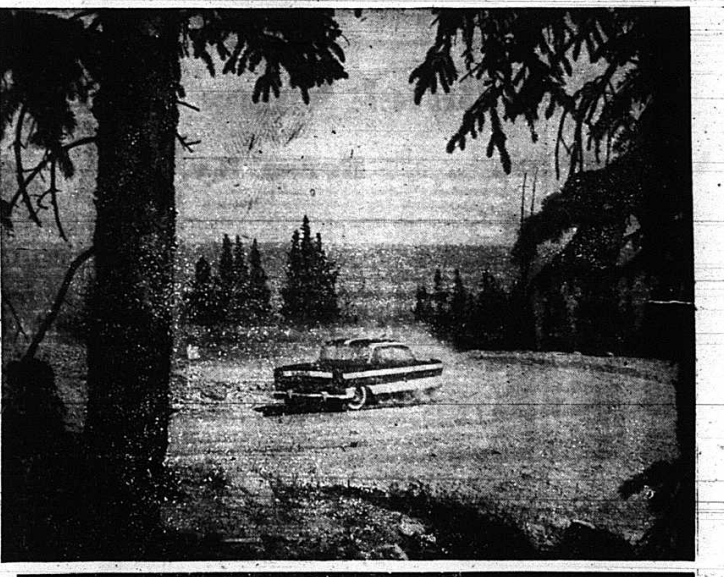
