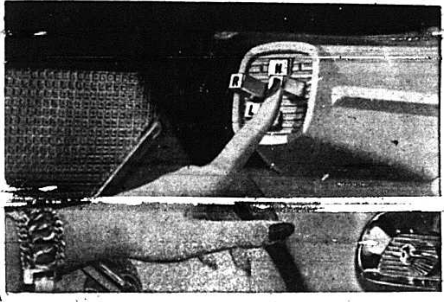

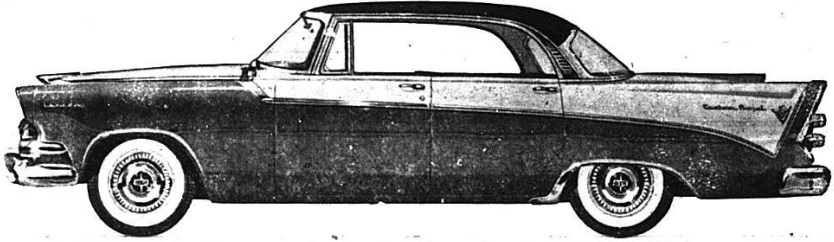

Extension Program. **Timely Tips on Strawberries KEEP MIDDLES CLEAN** - Nearly everyone that grows strawberries last year realized the importance of keeping the "rastus" or "Double shovel" busy up through November. Plants are growing fast now and it doesn't take long for the runners to get matted across the row.

GET STRAW OUT IN FIELD - Some strawberry growers in the county already have their mulling material out in the field. It is a good idea to turn these bales over a couple of times so they will get wet all the way through. If they are tied tight cut the strings. For one acre it will take 1 1/2 tons of straw. This is about 75 bales that weigh 40 lb. each. The straw is not put on until between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

A good way to get rid of the weed seed is to dump the bales in a pond and leave them for a week.

Fall In Ditch Takes Life Of Byron B. Hall

A fall into a ditch containing about two feet of water claimed the life of Byron Brooks Hall, 20, of Brodhead, Wednesday afternoon on the campus of Eastern State College.

School friends discovered his body a few minutes after the mishap when they missed him and went to look for him.

According to a report, young Hall, son of Herbert and Sybil Bethurum Hall, was working on a float to be used Saturday in a parade at Eastern's homecoming game with Western State College.

He jumped from the float and disappeared around a building. When he failed to return friends went in search and found his body in the ditch. Apparently, he struck his head in a fall and drowned.

The popular young senior at Eastern is survived by his parents; one brother, Bernard of Louisville, and one sister, Mrs. James R. Edwards, Arlington, Va., as well as grandparents and other relatives.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Broadhead Baptist Church with Dr. John Carter, president of Campbellville Junior College, officiating. He will be buried in Lexington.

The young man will be brought to his home in Brodhead Thursday afternoon where friends may call.

MAYOR REPORTS ON CITY STREET WORK

Mt. Vernon is trying, as finances will allow, to get its streets in good condition.

Three Boys Held For Grand Jury

Three Mt. Vernon teenage boys were held to the grand jury under \$1,000 bond in Juvenile Court this morning—two on charges of storehouse breaking, and one as an accessory.

Under investigation by the grand jury will be Roy Allen, 18, Gerald Rowe, 11, and Fredrick Tallant, 13, all of Mt. Vernon.

Allen is being held as an accessory to storehouse breaking. Judge Sowder said Tallant and Rowe are charged with storehouse breaking.

He reported Rowe and Tallant admitted entering the Mt. Vernon Locker Plant. Carl Brown's grocery, Claude McHargue's and Clyde Barnett's store over a period of several weeks.

The three were picked up Friday by state and local police following the break-in at Barnett's the night before, at which time shotgun shells, cigarettes and \$14 were taken.

They gained entrance at Barnett's by breaking a padlock on a back window.

Judge Sowder also reported Rowe and Allen tried to break in at the Kentucky Stone Co., Mt. Vernon office. 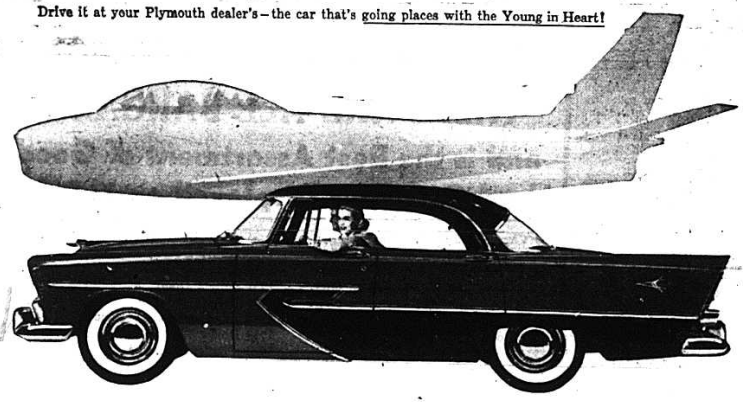
