Incumbent Councilmen Win Mount Vernon City Election

Mt. Vernon voters gave the city government a vote of confidence in Tuesday's election and returned the five incumbent city councilmen to their old jobs.

Back at the helm of the city are Everett Chander, Jack St. Clair, Carl Brown, Roy Winstead and Jack Laswell. One new member, Bob Jasper, replaced William Landrum, who did not run.

The return of the five councilmen to their old seats proved a defeat for the Law and Order ticket which made a last minute effort to win members to the council through a write-in vote.

Only one member, supported by the Law and Order ticket was able to win a seat on the new council. That candidate was Mr. Jasper. Carl Brown, 194.

Backed by the Law and Order ticket and failing to gain enough support, Mr. Brown, Meadows, Conrad Parrett, Tom O'Mara, Chester Hellard and Charles Shively. Only other voters cast were one for Mr. Landrum and one for Joe Henderson.

Leading the victorious candidates was Mr. Winstead, with 316 votes. Mr. Chaney was next with 241. Third most votes, 207 went to Mr. Laswell. Mr. Brown got 201, Mr. Jasper 199, and Mr. St. Clair, 194.

Other voters were: Hellard, 176; Parrett, 166; O'Mara, 140; Shively, 139 and Meadows, 97. The voting by precincts is as follows:

Hospital Donations Increasing

The drive to get operational funds for the new hospital in Mt. Vernon went ahead this week as \$142 more was pledged, raising the total so far to \$4,242.

The drive for \$20,000 will continue through April. The federal government requires a new hospital to have \$20,000, or thereabouts, as a cushion fund to fall back on in case the hospital operates the first month or two in the red, which often happens.

Last week the drive got off to a flying start with the following contributions: Magard Drug Store, \$100; O. V. Hilton, \$1,000; Edwin Denney, \$500; Mrs. Carrie Baker, \$1,000; Marebath Baptist Church, \$500; F. M. Porter, Manchester, and Mrs. Alza Wright, Anchorage, \$1,000.

New contributions coming in this week includes Mrs. Joe McCown, \$12; Mrs. Edna M. Barrett, \$10; Sand Springs Baptist Church, \$25; Carl Brown, \$10.

Hospital officials have called on residents to contribute, no matter how small the contribution. Hospital officials also report there are a limited number of rooms still available and persons interested in memorizing a room may do so by contacting Mr. Hilton. A contribution is allowed to memorialize a room by contributing at least \$10.00.

All churches, no matter the denomination, have been asked to send money. Those doing so will receive recognition on a bronze plaque in the waiting room of the hospital.

Luther Jones Fined After Kids Stay Home
Luther Jones, of Livingston, was fined \$10 in Rockcastle County court this week for failure to send his children to school.

School officials report Mr. Jones failed to send his two grade school children to classes. According to Kentucky statute failure to send a child to school can bring a maximum \$10 fine for the first offense and a maximum of \$20 for each subsequent offense. Each day a child is kept out of school is considered a separate offense.

Committeemen Ready Drive

John Houston, president of the Farm Bureau, got another job Monday night when the Rockcastle County Development Association elected him president of a committee to get a new committee for Rockcastle County.

Elected vice president was Elmer Owens, of Borr, and secretary, treasurer, Richard Harris of Orlando.

The three men will now concentrate in various areas of the county and get up committees which will carry on the stockyard idea to the mer.

The new committee will soon draw up articles of incorporation and take share subscriptions. A subscriber does not have to purchase stock when he subscribes. He merely indicates his willingness to buy stock when shares go on sale.

Mr. Houston told the some 20 members present that "some farmers want a stockyard and some don't as in any undertaking. Some don't like the locations, but the location has not been decided definitely."

"If farmers want a stockyard it will go over, if not, it won't. The entire county will have to support it if it is to go over."

Chandler's Majority Sets New Record

Democrat Slate Victorious

Veteran Democrat Campaigner A. B. "Happy" Chandler swept into office in a landslide of votes in Tuesday's election, and carried the entire Democratic slate with him to victory.

His vote, along with the slate, is reaching record proportions for a gubernatorial election. At the latest count, with 3,729 of the state's 4,032 precincts reporting, the vote stands:

Chandler, 413,213
Denney, 292,929
Majority, 120,284

Even with tabulations still incomplete, it is not expected that Mr. Chandler's majority will go much over 120,000, possibly 130,000 votes, or that Denney can reduce the majority very much.

In Denney's home Eighth District, where many Republicans expected a 30,000 vote majority for Denney, Denney was a head early today by only half that total. With 442 of the district's 667 precincts totaled, Denney has 43,938 votes to Chandler's 28,328.

Vote totals in the eight districts this morning stood:

First District: Chandler, 69,905; Denney, 31,472. Second District: Chandler, 50,514; Denney, 24,685. Third District: Chandler, 67,594; Denney, 33,739. Fourth District: Chandler, 54,473; Denney, 33,664. Fifth District: Chandler, 55,178; Denney, 41,229. Sixth District: Chandler, 67,678; Denney, 37,952. Seventh District: Chandler, 28,544; Denney, 21,250. Eighth District: 29,326; Denney, 16,276.

In other statewide voting, an amendment to lower the voting age from 21 years to 18 years for a gubernatorial election, 160,276 votes to 105,355. A two thirds majority is required for passage.

Another amendment to exempt household goods from taxes (There has been a \$250 tax exemption on household goods) passed by a lopsided majority: 192,164 to 73,005 at the latest tabulation.

In other counts in the state, Harry Lee Waterfield, Chandler's running mate piled up a tremendous majority. Waterfield has 394,995 votes to Joe Eaton's 253,300.

Other votes tabulated show Democrats leading as follows:

Secretary of State: Stovall, 378,607; Freshney, 246,164. Attorney General: Ferguson, 378,138; Stovall, 241,543. Auditor: Foust, 388,940; Gilbert, 250,115. Treasurer: Carter, 380,573; Steely, 239,834. Superintendent of Education: Martin, 393,128; Hume, 233,627. Commissioner of Agriculture: Butler, 383,639; Scott, 233,526. Director of Appeals, Seventh District: Dr. Jacobs of Cleveland, 374. Railroad Commissioner, Third District: Bailey, 92,411; Mobley, 80,427.

Early Wednesday morning, Denney sent telegram to the governor-elect, who held the governor's office before becoming a United States Senator and Baseball Commissioner, saying: "Congratulations, I wish you a successful administration."

Chandler will take office Dec. 13. He is a Democrat Law-rence Wetherby.

Denney Given Nice Majority In Rockcastle

Though the rest of the state liked Democrat "Happy" Chandler, a majority for Denney, though not quite as well as expected.

With 19 of the 30 Rockcastle precincts tabulated early today, Denney had 2,896 votes and Chandler, 842 votes.

According to Clarence Carter, county clerk, on the basis of the returns, there will be about 3,100 votes for Denney and about 1,100 votes for Chandler, a majority for Denney of about 2,000 votes. Mr. Carter said Denney's expected majority in Rockcastle before the election was around 2,500 votes.

In all state races, in Rockcastle County Republicans are leading as expected. Rockcastle is also approving lowering the voting age to 18, and approving an amendment not to tax household goods.

James Lambert of Mt. Vernon is assured another seat in the House of Representatives. He is also approving lowering the voting age to 18, and approving another term. Fred Lucas, was also unopposed for State Senator and won handily.

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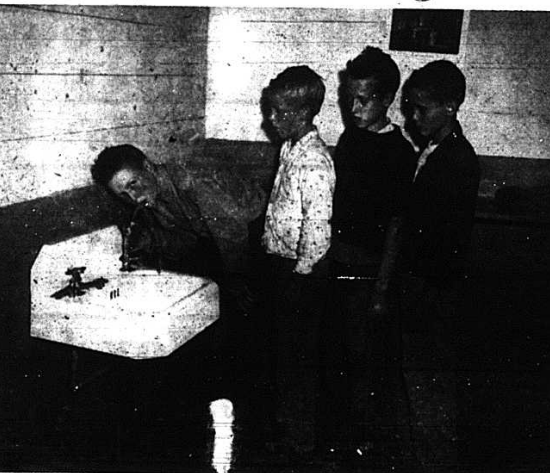
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Davis School Gets Running Water

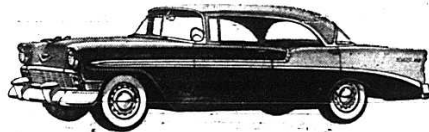

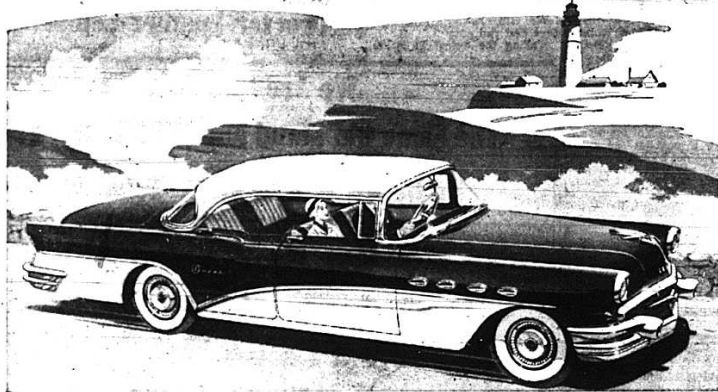

The Signal Says...

LET'S LEAVE OUR BOXING GLOVES AT HOME

Play ball! That's the cry heard around Kentucky this week. The same cry is heard here in Rockcastle as the three county schools open their basketball season.

All three county teams appear set, says our sport writer, Lyle Underwood, to give each other and the rest of the district a "run for its money." And on hand will probably be more spectators than at any time in recent years. All will be pulling for their favorite team. That's fine. But behind that support is a danger—especially this year.

Let's look at that danger and its consequences. It's the fourth quarter. Two minutes left to play. One point separates the two teams. The pep clubs are "whoopin' it up." Nerves are taut. Although the moment won't matter so much tomorrow, right now it matters a great deal.

Suddenly, one of the fans sees an incident on the playing floor that is inevitable in the rough and tumble game. He seizes on it and screams a none too complimentary phrase. Someone wants to defend the honor of the school and the badge is on.

Another situation would see two opposing players lose their wits and resort to their fists.

Regardless of the situation, the next day brings the bitter news and the crying wail. Ted Sanford, commissioner of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, has suspended the teams from further competition.

Suspension can happen. When it comes, it's not easy to take. Ask the team that's had one. All the team and school can do is try to live it down. Sometimes they never do.

We are told basketball is getting to be big and serious business. Mr. Sanford and Kentucky officials have been trying to tie the wildcat they have had by the tail. Indications are, they'll stand for no foolishness this year. They intend to control players and spectators, and if unable to do so in some scattered instances, then the school and town will have to bear the financial and sportsmanship loss. They're ready to "lower the boom."

In this sense, like all seasons, both spectators and players must be ready to bear part of the responsibility for loss of prestige and recognition. The school must always be held responsible whether it is or not.

Real boils down to this: A player who cannot control his temper does not deserve to play. No team unable to abide by the decision of a referee (right or wrong) deserves to compete. No school which cannot teach its players sportsmanship and good conduct along with basketball deserves to floor a team. No fan unable to take the losses with the wins deserves a team to support.

When the going gets roughest this year and the winning point doesn't come, refrain from punching the guy in front of you in the nose, or swatting the lady with your purse. Remember this paraphrase of a line on love from a poem by Alfred Lord Tennyson: "It's better to have played and lost, than never to have played at all."

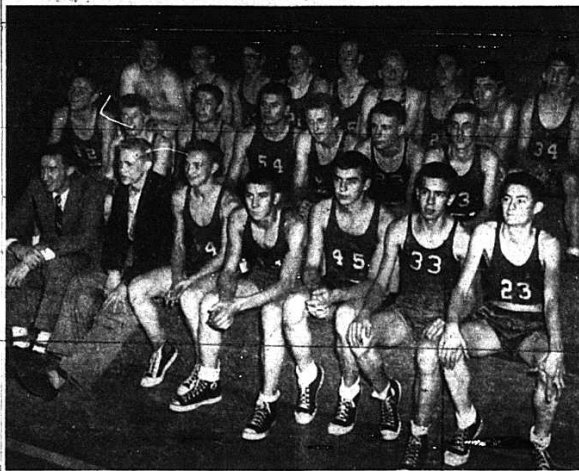
Boone Cummins Rites Held Last Saturday
