WHY NOT GIVE A STOCKYARDS A TRY?

The Rockcastle County Development Association has opened a verbal drive to convince farmers in Rockcastle County they need and should have a stockyard.

As planned, an association committee will ask farmers to subscribe to shares in the stockyard. Later the farmers who subscribe will be called on to purchase the shares. If there are not enough subscribers, then the subscriptions will be dropped, along with the stockyard idea, without cost to the subscriber.

The need of a stockyard in the county is of course a matter of opinion like any other idea. Many farmers, no doubt, are asking: 'Why build a stockyard when there are good markets in nearby Stanford and Richmond?'

There are three reasons, according to R. H. Hamm, president of the association, why a stockyard would be advantageous to county farmers. He enumerates them as:

- (1) A stockyard would keep money at home.
- (2) If close to a town, the yard would bring more people into town resulting in more business.
- (3) A farmer with a herd of cattle could take a buyer to his farm and not have to bring his cattle into town.

To date, a decision has not been made on where the stockyard should be located. The location is being considered at the present time, and the committee, headed by Farm Bureau president R. H. Hamm, is open for suggestions and recommendations.

Needless to say, the points made by Mr. Hamm, if they hold true and they certainly appear logical, speak loudly for support of a stockyard by the county's farmers. Why not, at least, give a stockyard a try?

State Officials Give Public Assistance Report

Residents of Rockcastle Co. received \$23,130 in October under Kentucky's three public assistance programs—old age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the needy blind. Commissioner of Economic Security W. Garnett Johnson reported this week.

Their payment were broken down as: Old age assistance, \$14,227; aid to dependent children, \$6,831; and aid to needy blind, \$2,072.

The total state outlay for the month of October was \$3,202,922. Old age assistance grants were \$1,968,859; dependent children, \$1,185,140 and for the needy blind, \$111,823.

AWAIT DECISION ON FACTORY SITES

A group of touring industrialists, looking for suitable factory sites, took a look at the Mt. Vernon area this week and went on their way with no comment.

According to a report of officials who met them, including John Lair, O. V. Hines and R. H. Hamm, the officials had nothing to say concerning the likelihood of establishing a factory in the vicinity. The industrialists merely looked at the various sites pointer out, listened to the comments of their guides and then went on their way.

The group will tour all of Kentucky before they make any decision on possible factory construction. It will possibly be another year before the decision is announced.

The night adult class in woodworking at the Westwell Shop of the Foundation School Industrial Arts Department at Berea, will begin Wednesday evening, Nov. 23. The hours will be from 6:30 to 9:30 two evenings each week for a period of nine weeks.

The course is under the direction of Mr. Rude Osolinik, assisted by Mr. Ernest Kinard. The course is primarily for men in Berea and nearby communities who wish to improve their skills in woodworking or who may wish to learn from the beginning.

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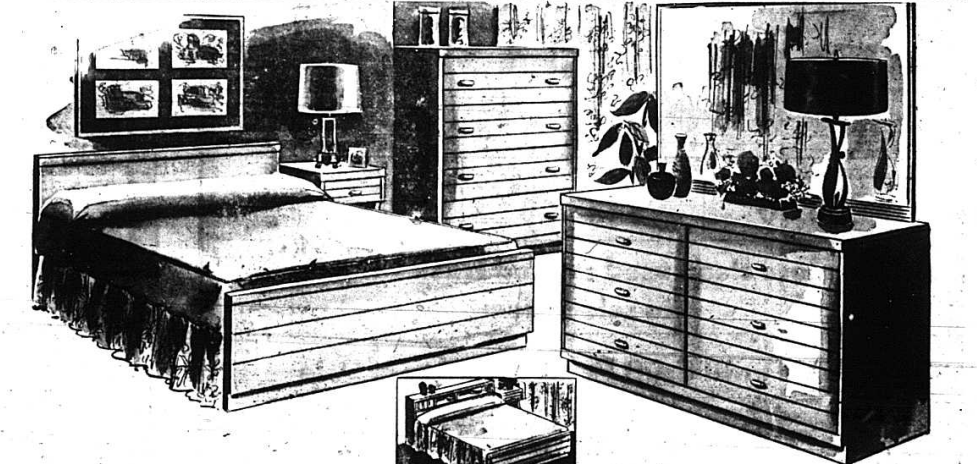
