## Laurel Man Gets 2 Years During Court

Rockcastle County Circuit Court got off to a slow start Monday and up until late Tuesday only four cases had been concluded.

The only jail term handed down by Judge R. C. Tarter so far was a two year term given Darnell A. Howard of Laurel County. Howard was convicted on a voluntary manslaughter charge following a plea of guilty.

Howard was tried for the death of James D. Kennedy, who was killed in an auto-accident south of Livingston in May, 1953.

In court action Monday, Isaac Blankenship was fined \$100 and costs on an appealed drunk driving charge. He was tried in absence of his attorney.

Two other cases were continued. The trial of Isaac (Johnny) Mills, of Livingston, charged with a 12-1/2 caliber shooting and wounding of Clayton Anderson, of Louisville, was continued until Dec. 13.

The case of Starling Cox, charged with having intoxicated liquor in his possession was continued to March 19, 1956.

In all, the court heard 12 criminal cases to hear during its 30 judicial days.

On Nov. 30, instead of the reported Nov. 27, the third trial of Ray Smith, charged with the January, 1954, slaying of Lewis Abney, will be held.

Most of the cases scheduled for the court involve child desertion charges.

## James Chester Webb Dies Of Heart Attack

James Chester Webb, of Pine Hill, died on the way to Berea Hospital about noon Monday. He was 60.

Mr. Webb was stricken by a heart attack while hunting near his home at Pine Hill. He was accompanied at the time by his brother-in-law, Albert Mink. Mr. Mink called an ambulance, but Mr. Webb died before he could be taken to Berea.

Mr. Webb was the son of Thomas and Louise Sweet Webb. He was born in Laurel County on July 7, 1895.

In 1923 he married Ida Mink of Pine Hill who survives. He also survived by three sisters, Mrs. B. R. Cooper, Covington, Mrs. R. C. Cooper, Cincinnati, Ohio, and Mrs. Mike Klienback also of Covington. One brother, John C. Webb, Ft. Thomas, survives.

Mr. Webb was a Louisville & Nashville Railroad switchman until he had to quit work in 1949 due to an accident. He was a veteran of World War I. Services were held Wednesday at Pine Hill with the Rev. Gene Bradley officiating. He was buried at Pine Hill Cemetery. Cox Funeral Home had charge of arrangements.

Valerie Jane Ramsey, infant daughter of Earl and Peggy King Ramsey of London, Ky., died at Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, on Nov. 21, 1955. She was two days old.

### A sweeping report recommending Route 25 be a four-lane highway from Covington to the Tennessee line and repairs to sections of Route 150, has been released at Frankfort.

The report on all Kentucky highways by the Automotive Safety Foundation calls for a four-lane "trunk line" beginning at Covington, running south through or near Lexington, Richmond, Berea, Mt. Vernon, London and Corbin. It also calls for road repairs between Stanford and Danville on Route 150.

The report does not say definitely how the 4-lane road is expected to go. It does suggest it by-pass "all major population centers" and report does not define "major population centers."

However, since the report does mention that older roads are to be feeders to the new network of highways, in all probability the new highway would be built to report does not define "major population centers."

Based on an engineering study, the report covers a 20 year improvement program, estimated to cost \$84,000,000. The report does not say how the highway modernization plan will be financed, but it is expected that any four-lane highway through this area would certainly have to be partly under the direction and financial help of the federal government.

Currently the highway program in the state operates in this manner: The state builds and maintains all road marked "state," with some federal aid to those state roads which are also federal (Route 25 through Mt. Vernon is an example). The state also builds and maintains streets in cities that are part of the road system or connecting major highways.

Two cents out of every gallon of gasoline is used on rural and farm-to-market roads. There is also a flat-state grant of \$5,000,000 each year to the counties for road maintenance and construction.

As the ASF would have it, this present program would be altered. Roads would be in three classes:

1. State trunks—major two and four-lane roads connecting all parts of the state and serving as the main population centers, except Covington and Louisville.

Arterial roads—for traffic in the State, counties and cities and access to trucklines.

Feeder roads—roads between farm and home and major arteries or trunks.

The report also sees eventual construction of 641 miles of limited access highways mostly north and south.

Apparently from the report, there is very little change in the status of Mt. Vernon in the alterations. The state has been building and maintaining state trunks in counties, and cities of the State Chamber. It would probably continue to do so. Higher classed cities would not come under state funds, but would be maintained by call for reverting back to a pre-1942 law which called for cities to maintain their own roads and streets.

Before such a program would go into effect, the General Assembly would have to approve the program.
