Mother, Son Killed When Car Hits Tree

Mr. McClure Hurt In Crash

Funeral services were held Wednesday at Mt. Vernon for Mrs. Rissie McClure, 45, and her son, Larry, 23, who were killed instantly early Sunday in a spectacular auto crash in suburban Deer Park, Cincinnati, Ohio.

The car, driven by Larry, went off the edge of a raised rail road crossing and slid about 375 feet and wrapped around a tree.

Brown McClure, 50, husband and father of the victims, was hospitalized for injuries not believed to be serious. He still remains in a Cincinnati hospital.

Deer Park Police said the family was returning from a visit with relatives near Woodwood when the accident occurred.

Police reported the vehicle hurled a 15-foot raised railroad crossing in Galbraith Road near Blue Ash Road and catapulted into the air. It then overturned and slid the some 375 feet into the tree.

Mrs. McClure was thrown about 40 feet into the side of a house. Mr. McClure was also thrown from the car. Larry was trapped in the wreckage. Working crews had to cut the auto in half to free him. The back seat of the auto was bent into the front seat, circling the tree.

Mr. and Mrs. McClure moved to Hartwell in 1954 from Mt. Vernon. Mr. McClure is an employee of the General Electric Co., Evendale, Cincinnati.

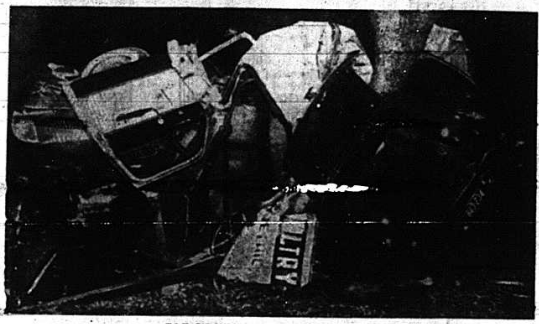

Vernon High School and attended Berea College for two years before he entered Eastern. He had taught school for a year and had had two years of military training.

Mrs. McClure was born Rissie Lovell Dec. 6, 1908, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Lovell, who survive. She was married Mr. McClure in May, 1923. Besides her husband she is survived by a son, Leroy, who lives in Knoxville, Tenn.

She is also survived by five brothers, Sherman of Mt. Vernon, Tennessee; Livingston of Tully and Delbert of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Alonzo of Vista, Calif., six sisters, Mrs. Zena McClure, Mrs. Virginia Pittman, Mrs. Sadie Clontz, all of Mt. Vernon; Ada Doan and Mrs. Juanita Farris, Blue Ash, Ohio, and Mrs. Janis Farris, Park Hill, Ohio.

Mrs. McClure was a member of the New Chestnut Ridge Church of Christ and during several years operated a grocery store at Chestnut Ridge.

County Agent Notes

Certified Strawberry Plants

We are glad to report that Kentucky has a few million strawberry plants for sale, grown from virus-free plants that have been sprayed or dusted with Parathion at 10-day intervals during the growing season, according to the directions of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station.

We feel that this source of certified berry plants will give an increased yield in the harvest of 1957. The following varieties will be certified: Tennessee Beauty, Blakemore and

Pocahonty. These plants are certified by the Kentucky Seed Improvement Association and are the most desirable plants to set this year. These plants will be sold by the Cumberland Strawberry Growers Association on the basis of "first come - first served."

The Association plans to use storage facilities in strategic parts of the state to make delivery easy and convenient at setting time to the strawberry growing areas. These plants will possibly be put in storage at Lexington, Pineville, Portland, Tennessee, and Nashville, Tennessee. The price will range from \$10 to \$17 per thousand depending on the variety and quantity ordered.

There will be a 20% payment required with each order. No orders less than 1000 will be accepted. The Association will accept orders now and as late as possible.

Antibiotics: Good for Young Calves

Since it has been established that adding small quantities of antibiotics to rations improves the growth of chickens and hogs, the Experiment Station has conducted studies on the value of antibiotics in calf feeds. These studies have involved over 100 calves. Following is the statement on the results of the investigations:

1. The antibiotics, aureomycin and terramycin, stimulate the growth rate of calves for the first 12 weeks of life about 10 to 20 percent. There appears to be little difference between these antibiotics.

2. These antibiotics increase the appetite of the calves, which makes them slightly more "hardy" and increases their total consumption of feed.

3. Calves fed antibiotics are required per pound of gain than calves not fed antibiotics.

4. Antibiotics tend to reduce the incidence of calf scours in our studies, calf scours have

rarely been a problem, but antibiotics did aid in scours prevention when scours was a problem. Research work at other stations indicates that antibiotics do reduce the incidence of calf scours.

On the basis of these results, as well as on considerable data obtained elsewhere, it appears that either aureomycin or terramycin should be included in all calf feeds that are to be fed to calves under 18 weeks of age. Beyond this age little benefit can be derived from the feeding of antibiotics.

If farmers are not buying a commercial calf feed containing an antibiotic they may purchase an antibiotic supplement from the local feed dealer or mixer and add it directly to the calf's milk immediately before feeding. Generally about one teaspoon per calf feeding is required of most antibiotic supplements.
