

## Somerset Tobacco Sale At All-Time Peak

Somerset is experiencing the highest selling season in the history of the market.

Opening Nov. 29 with many types of tobacco at an all-time peak, prices have advanced several cents. The current season's Somerset sold 1,578,878 pounds of tobacco for \$34,896.51, averaging \$59.19 per hundred. During the same period last year Somerset sold 2,369,022 pounds of tobacco for an average price of \$54.10. This year's average is 28 cents per hundred, above 1954's.

All grades of burley are sharing in these high prices with the common and medium leaf showing the greatest gains. Somerset warehousemen say the acute shortage of this year's crop accounts for these very high prices, and they expect tobacco to sell higher as the end of the season nears. The shortage of the crop becomes more evident.

Due to the light weight of the tobacco this year, but growers are benefiting from a high-average price. The first four days of the current season Somerset sold 1,578,878 pounds of tobacco for \$34,896.51, averaging \$59.19 per hundred. During the same period last year Somerset sold 2,369,022 pounds of tobacco for an average price of \$54.10. This year's average is 28 cents per hundred, above 1954's.

## SCI Report On Tourists Publicized

Preliminary results from the first tourist test are being publicized in Rockcastle and other areas of Kentucky have been released by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

According to the Executive Vice President of the Kentucky Chamber, Harper Gattson, Louisville, the survey was conducted in the scenic Cumberland Area—a ten-county area used as a tourist test area by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and the southeastern Kentucky. The survey itself was conducted by scenic Cumberland, Inc., Inc. Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, Kentucky Highway Department and Kentucky Division of Publicity.

The purpose of this fact-gathering survey was to tabulate pertinent information on Kentucky's tourist industry in order to guide future programs. The survey was conducted during the 12-hour period, the total cars counted numbered 31,990, of these 17,617 were from Kentucky, 14,373 from out of state. Slightly more than 13,000 of the total number were stopped and the occupants personally interviewed.

The cars averaged 2.46 persons each. The top twelve out-of-state registrations were listed as follows:

Ohio, 1024; Michigan, 896; Tennessee, 831; Florida, 394; Indiana, 382; North Carolina, 180; Georgia, 198; Illinois, 178; Virginia, 174; South Carolina, 66; Alabama, 40; and New York 35. The remaining cars, A from 34 other states and Kentucky.

In addition to the personal interviews, survey cards were mailed to the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce by the tourists. These cards revealed the following information:

The average tourist spent one and a half days in the scenic Cumberland area. The average tourist spent \$15.00 per day while in the area, 27% of tourist expenditures went for food, 23% for gas, 15% for other services, and 24% for other retail services.

As far as accommodations are concerned 30% used motels, 13% hotels, 2% tourist homes, 8% tourist cabins, 20% friends and relatives; 3% trailers; 24% other.

The purpose of the trip: 22% business, 27% pleasure, 21% combined business and pleasure, 22% visited relatives; 8% other.


