Home Agents Notes

Recipe of the Month
For an attractive, thoughtful gift, you can't go wrong on Christmas cookies, says Miss Florence Inlay of the UK home economics Extension station. Packed in a ribbon-lined box or covered with glistening cellophane on a plate, the cookies will add to the holiday festivities. The family, too, will like the pretty assortment that you have ready in the home freezer.

Holiday Cookies
From a good standard recipe such as the following, a variety of cookies may be made by dividing the dough into several parts and treating each one in a special way.
1 c butter
2 c sugar
4 eggs
2 t vanilla
4 c sifted flour
4 t baking powder
one-half t salt
Cream the butter and sugar thoroughly, add well beaten eggs and vanilla. Mix sifted flour, baking powder and salt and stir into the first mixture until well blended. Chill several hours until firm enough

to handle. Divide into four parts.
Filled Cookies:
Roll out and cut in circles one portion of dough. Top each one with a spoonful of fruit filling made of one-half pound of finely cut dates, one-fourth cup of sugar, one-third cup water and a few grains of salt. Cook filling for 5 minutes over low heat. Cool. Top the filling with a second circle of dough, and press edges together. Bake at

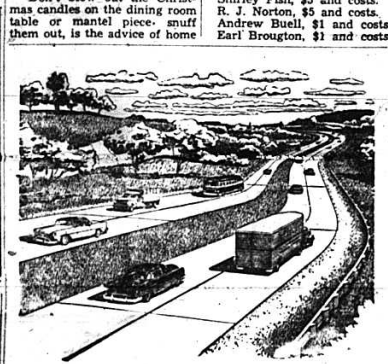
400 degrees for about 10 min.
Pecan Cookies
To another portion of dough add 1 T of grated orange rind and one-fourth c finely chopped nuts before chilling. Chill thoroughly. Form in small balls on cookie sheet and press lightly with bottom of jelly glass. Top with pecan-half. **Decorated Rolled Cookies**
Bake cookies in hot oven, 400 degrees, for about 10 minutes. Remove from pan and cool.

Holding a cookies at an angle over a bowl, brush with slightly beaten egg white, then with colored sugar, (sugar may be colored by adding a drop of fruit coloring to one-fourth c of granulated sugar. Mix with fingers and allow to dry. Slightly toasted or tinted coconut may be applied in the same way.
Snuff Out Candles at Christmas Time
Don't blow out the Christmas candles on the dining room table or mantle piece; snuff them out, is the advice of home

management specialists at the University of Kentucky. Blowing them often scatters the softened wax, leaving hardened bits of candle on the table top, cloth or wall. Should this occur, remove the wax carefully with a knife, then use carbon tetrachloride to take out any remaining stain.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Luke 1:5-8
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 11:1-9

Christmas Songs

Lesson for December 25, 1955

Did the angels sing when Christ was born? Some prosaic and unimaginative people say they didn't. True enough, Luke never says there was music. All he says is that the "multitude of the heavenly host" (he does not even say they were angels) were praising God and "saying, Glory to God in the highest..." Surely Christian art and Christian story is not wrong in thinking of this as song, not mere recitation or speech-making. At any rate, if the angels did not sing such words, the Dr. Foreman church has sung them. All down through the Christian centuries Christmas has been a singing time. You cannot suggest all that Christmas means in simple spoken prose, you have to sing.

Beauty in a Jangled World
Luke, who had an ear for such things, put into his gospel not less than four poems connected with the birth of Christ. Of these the "Glory in the highest" is the shortest. The others are the words of Mary (Luke 1:47-55), of Zechariah (1:81-79) and of Simeon (chap. 2:23-32). In the R.S.V. these are printed as poetry, as they really are. (The reader will note other poetic passages, but these are the four most famous ones.) The church has set all these to music many times over, and in some churches they are sung every week. Mary's song like the others has been given a Latin name, from their first words in the Latin Bible: "Magnificat" for Mary's song, "Benedictus" for Zechariah's, "Gloria in excelsis" for the angels, and "Nunc Dimittis" for Simeon's. But modern church-goers do not always realize that each of these poems was called forth in some way by the birth of Jesus. This is as it should be. What poetry is to language

and to sound, the coming of Christ is to this world of humanity. In the midst of all the jangling, wrangling, maddening and often meaningless noises of the world, in the midst of all the stupid ordinary soon-forgotten outpouring of talk, talk, talk, a lovely poem comes bringing beauty and meaning, like a rose in a junkyard. So in the midst of our jangling world Christ comes bringing meaning and joy and peace.

Some Will Not Listen
To some—to too many—Christmas means nothing. "Silent Night" is a tune to be tired of, nothing more. The angels might as well never have sung, the Story never written. Readers of TIME magazine will recall an article last July 18 about a writer who is typical of many men and women in these times. He knows there is such a thing as the way of Love, for every cross on every church proclaims it, and every Christmas carol sings it. But he will not accept it. He chooses the way of defiance and despair. To him, life is a wandering in the dark, with nothing but his own candle which will soon go out.

But Some Have Heard
On the other hand there are many, and among them some of mankind's best, who have found in the Christian faith something more than merely a story, a lovely legend, a song for little children, something which it would be pleasant, but impossible to believe. A good book to get for the new year is one called "This I Believe about Jesus, Christ" (edited by J. C. Monahan, Rexell & Co., New York). It is a collection of testimonies to Jesus Christ, by an impressive variety of men and women. College presidents, executives of great business firms, scientists, politicians, persons in many walks of life, all write on the same theme: what Christ has meant to them. Any one who thinks that Christianity is a religion only for weak characters ought to read this book. Any one who thinks that Christ is attractive only to children, might well read this book and learn better. The writers by their testimonies show that not alone for ancient and legend-loving times, not only for simple peasants in primitive lands, but for modern men, hard-headed, highly educated, burdened with great responsibilities, Christ brings meaning and beauty as well as power. Strong voices in every land join the heavenly host in praise to God who has given us his Son.

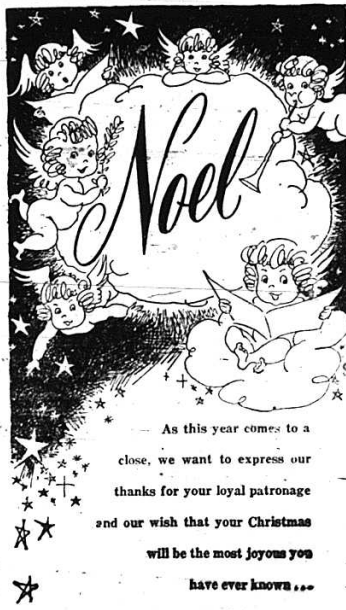

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Burley tobacco growers will vote Dec. 29 on marketing quotas for the next three crops.

Burley tobacco growers will vote Dec. 29 on marketing quotas for the next three crops, according to officials of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All growers who produced burley tobacco in 1955 are eligible to vote in the referendum. The county will be divided into five precincts for the voting. Voters can cast their ballots at the A. S. C. Office, Mt. Vernon; Cromer's Store at Blue Springs; the grade school at Brodhead; Brook's Garage at Conroy; and Burnet's Store at Orlando.

For the 1956 burley crop, the Department of Agriculture has announced a marketing quota of 365 million pounds which, converted to acres, results in 250,450 acres. The marketing quota in 1956. The 1956 national was determined on the basis of average yields during the 5 year period.

"The decision to be made in the quota referendum can be simply stated, a committee appointed to determine the marketing quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting, marketing quotas—with penalties for non-compliance—acreage allotments, and price supports averaging 90 percent of parity will continue in effect for the 1956, 1957 and 1958 crops.

"On the other hand, if more than one-third of the voters disapprove quotas, there will be no marketing quotas. If quotas are approved, no acreage allotments, and no price supports for the 1956 crop. Marketing quotas have been proclaimed again next year, and another referendum held.

"Marketing quotas have been in effect for burley tobacco each year since enactment of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 except for 1959, when they were discontinued by growers.

A notice of the individual farm acreage allotment will be mailed to the operator of each farm on which burley tobacco was grown during the past five years. These notices will be mailed today. All county committees in advance of the referendum in order that farmers may know how the quota formula today will affect their individual farming operations for 1956.

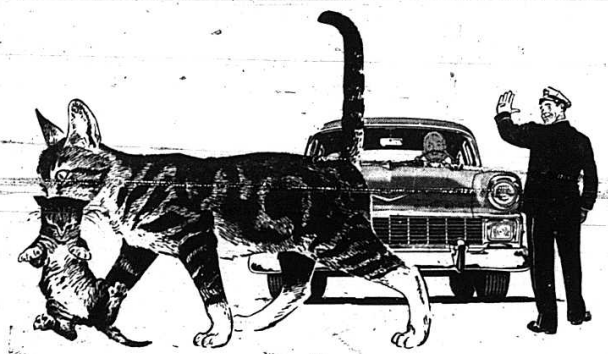

Doctor Webb has announced the new Livingston Motor Company building on Main Street is being remodeled and will be used for a recreation center for everyone, and especially, teenagers.

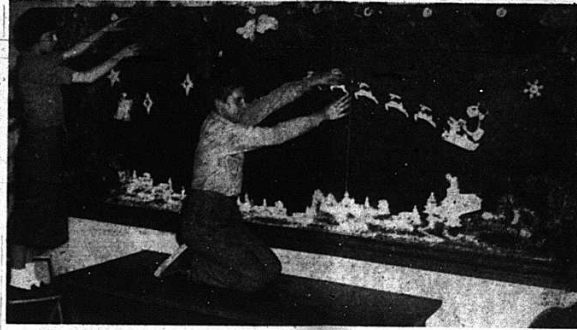

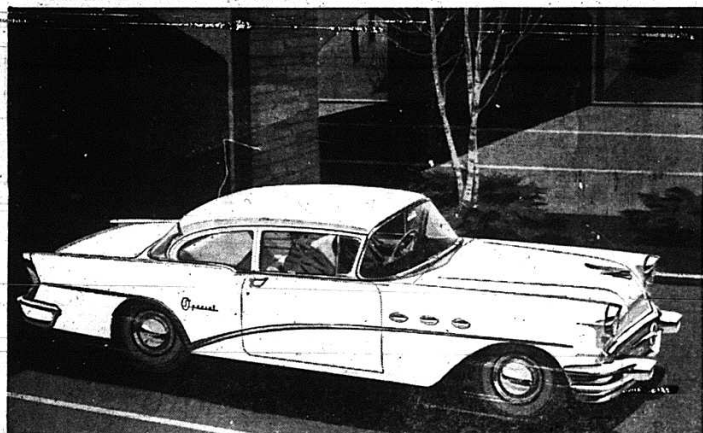


