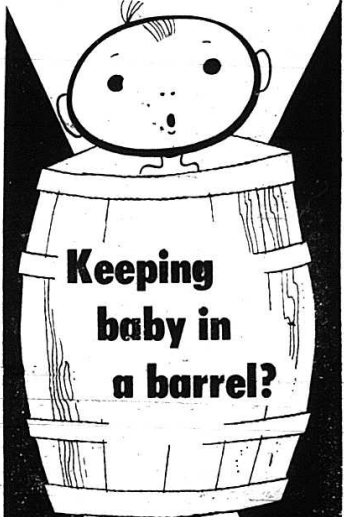

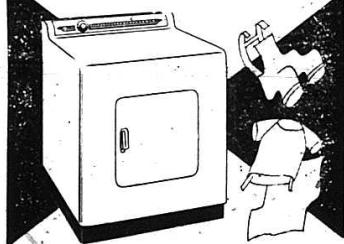

City Parking, Traffic Ordinances Ordered Enforced By Council

Ordinances designed to clear-up traffic congestion on Main Street were passed at a recent meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The council acted apparently in an effort to halt the increase in the number of cars parking, sometimes three deep, on the city street.

One of the ordinances prohibits double parking from the Louisville & Nashville Railroad crossing to First Street, which runs north and south on the east side of the county jail.

Failure to comply carries a fine from \$1 to \$5, at the discretion of Police Judge Leonard Langford.

In other action, the council directed city police to enforce an old ordinance keeping heavy trucks off Main Street except when loading or unloading. The truck route through Mt. Vernon is also in Richmond Street to the intersection of Route 150, and east to the city limits.

Failure to comply with this ordinance carries the same fine, \$1 to \$5.

The council also reminded motorists it's illegal to park in designated parking areas (meters) facing traffic. For example, motorists who should park on the right side have been parking on the left side of meters on the left side. The fine for this is also \$1 to \$5.

To aid traffic in Mt. Vernon, and especially persons parking, the council decided at the meeting to use illuminated yellow paint in front of fire hydrants and no parking areas instead of the customary red. The council believes yellow will remain brighter for a longer period of time. The painting is expected to begin soon, depending on the weather.

2 Youths Fined By Police Judge

A shot fired by Mt. Vernon Police man McKinley Arnold ended an auto chase Thursday night which started in Oak Hill.

Fined \$35.50 by Mt. Vernon Police Court on a charge of leaving the car was James Burton, of near Brodhead. Fined \$25.50 on a drunk charge was Walter Bond, also of near Brodhead.

As charged on a P. I. e. m. n. Arnold, the car passed through Mt. Vernon at more than 70 miles an hour. When Arnold met Police man Hagan, Alexander tried to stop the youths, they sped away. The trio was chased through Brindley Ridge near the intersection of Route 150 and 461 where Arnold fired the shot that ended the chase.

Water Rates Made Official By Councilmen

An ordinance clarifying rates for commercial water users outside city limits, was passed at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council last week.

The new ordinance does not change present water rates. The rates for users outside the city limits, as well as those inside, remain \$6 for the first 10,000 gallons of water used and \$50 cents per 1,000 gallons over the 10,000 gallons.

According to Henry Cox, superintendent of the water works, the council acted following a ruling by the Court of Appeals which requires approval by the Public Service Commission of rates for municipally owned utilities serving outside the city limits.

Mr. Cox emphasized the ordinance does not change water rates for city users; will effect only about two water users; does not apply to residences and is merely an ordinance to make the matter official.

Work Progresses On Hospital; Ready In June

It's beginning to look like a hospital.

This statement sums up the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital now under construction on Newcomb Avenue, Mt. Vernon.

According to Henry L. Owens, general contractor, Richmond, Ind., who is doing the work, the hospital is about 60 percent complete. Government inspectors call it 80 percent complete, but Mr. Owens says he believes 60 percent is a nearer figure.

If work goes on as planned, and if material arrives on schedule, he expects to turn the hospital, complete, over to the new owners about the middle of June. He reported the weather no handicap now that the roof is on.

As of this week, the inside partitions are about half completed, about 80 percent of the rough electrical work, plumbing and the plumbing is being installed. Two large boilers have also been installed.

Mr. Owens indicated extra bedrooms have been added to the original plans now making a total of 13. Officials were to build two more rooms, with money saved from the original appropriation through lower bids in general construction, plumbing and electrical work. Officials wanted four extra rooms but there was only money enough for two rooms.

The remainder of the money from the original appropriation will go into other construction work at the hospital.

As construction work went ahead, so did the Association drive to raise some \$20,000 to operate the hospital during the first few months.

At present the drive is almost at the half-way mark. A total of \$9,809.95 has been contributed.

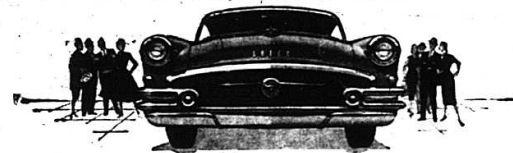

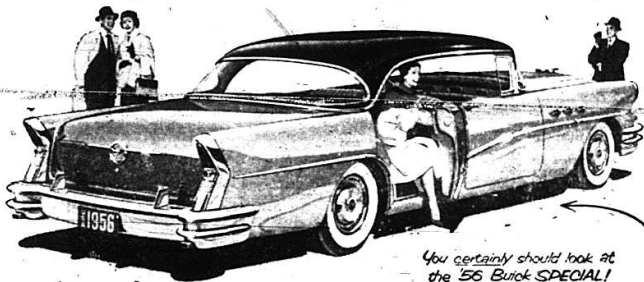

IT'S HIGH TIME WE GOT A MERIT SYSTEM

Of course we understand the upheaval these days in various departments of state must be marked to the fortunes or misfortunes, depending on which side you're on or politics. The shake-ups are hardly new. They're all part of the old-time-honored game of politics—of "git while the getting's good." The game is easy to play. The rules and equipment simple. You have to have a vote majority and a good sharp axe.

Since the game is played with an axe, we suppose there's little else to do but shrug it off and forget it from one to four years to it is a sad commentary on the state's political life.

the next. But frankly, we'd like to see the axe eliminated because.

At the moment there is a glimmer of hope. Gov. A.B. Chandler in his State of the State address last week before the General Assembly dropped more than a hint that he's all for a merit system—something many states already have.

A merit system puts state employment on a competitive basis. It works, usually, like federal Civil Service. Employees remain in service through perhaps several administrations, and must have a hearing before they're fired. Such a system attracts competent people, people who otherwise, if you'll pardon the expression, wouldn't touch a state job "with a ten foot pole."

Happy's thinking on a merit system is sound-thinking, and it's at least a step in the right direction even though it won't solve all state employment problems. We think Happy can and should put it over.

But until the day Happy and the General Assembly comes through, we'll just have to go on choosing state employees on the basis of the number of voters they brought to the polls on election day.

IT'S MARCH OF DIMES TIME

It's March of Dimes time again in Rockcastle. The administrative organization has been set up under Mr. Phillip Davis, the containers are in various business places, and some of the mailers have been distributed.

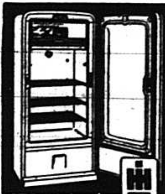

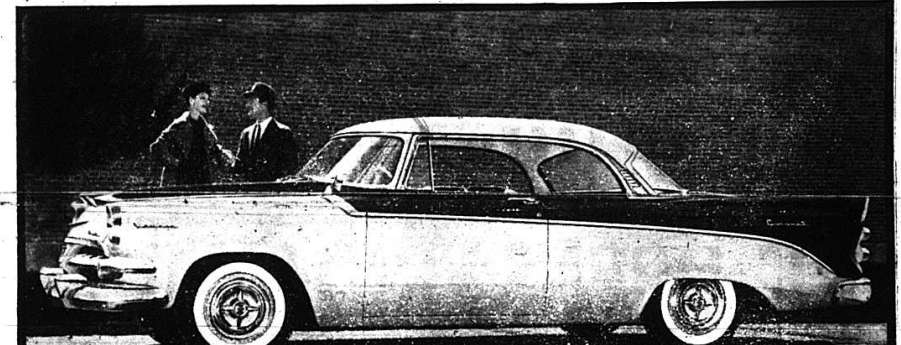
