Pulpwood Harvesting Demon-

strations. A series of pulpwood harvesting demonstrations are slated for a four county area for the first week in May. The counties involved are McCree, Whitley, Laurel, and Rockcastle (or South Madison). The only day meeting scheduled for each county will consist of an integrated hardwood - pine (with saw logs too if the site allows) harvesting demonstration. An attempt will be made on these meetings to show better and more economical pulp-logging and handling methods as well as proper cutting. Cooperating in this venture will be the Extension Service Foresters, U. S. Forest Service, The Bowater Paper Co., Calhoun, Tenn.; Meigs Corp., Chillicothe, Ohio; and other agricultural agencies in the counties involved. A suitable site will be selected soon either - Federally owned forest land or privately owned forest area. The use of bow saw for harvesting, chain saw,

County Agent Notes

Siriverberies May Need Fertilizing Where soil tests show insufficient phosphorus and potassium, fruit men at the University of Kentucky advise application of 600 to 1000 pounds of 0-20-20 fertilizer or its equivalent, an acre. The material should be broadcast over the rows in February or March. Brushing off the fertilizer from the foliage is advisable.

In starting new patches of strawberries it is considered well to plow under a green manure crop. Such a crop as plant food and organic matter which improve the structure and water holding capacity of

John Bullock, manager of the S. A. S. C. office, says that the Soil Bank program now being operated by Congress may make field seeds in big demand. Farmers might be wise in buying the seeds needed for grass and hay at an early date.

Richard Harris had some sericea combined on his farm and plans on seeding a part of these seeds as soon as danger of frost is past. Sericea is a good permanent legume for hay if properly managed.

1956 Heart Fund Campaign Opens In Rockcastle County

Appointment of Mrs. John Lear, Benfro Valley, as 1956 Heart Fund drive chairman for Mt. Vernon during the annual campaign in February, has been announced by Robert C. Alphin, Frankfort, state campaign chairman.

Mrs. Robert Gertrude St. Mt. Vernon, will serve as co-chairman.

Kentucky's 1956 Heart Fund goal is \$225,000. Alphin announced "Heart Sunday," the two-hour, house-to-house solicitation which climaxes the month-long drive will be conducted in most Kentucky counties on February 26.

Alphin's announcement called attention to the sponsorship by the Kentucky Heart Association, its local chapters and committees of a year-around program of research, health education and community service. The program, he said, spearheads the fight against the nation's number one killer and crippler, heart disease.

The activities include clinical and surgery facilities for indigent children and support of a Chair of Heart Research and five separate research projects at the University of Louisville, School of Medicine, teaching institutes for doctors, nurses and technicians, support of the Rehabilitation Center in Louisville which crippled heart patients are taught to lead useful lives. A State-wide Artery Bank where live arteries are preserved for use during heart operations to replace damaged or diseased arteries, and an intensive lay educational program that reaches a great majority of Kentuckians.

The campaign has the sponsorship of the Mt. Vernon Woman's Club.

To start things rolling on Rockcastle, a movie entitled "Follow Through," sponsored by the Rockcastle County Health Department and showing conditions related to the heart and rheumatic fever, was shown at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon Woman's Club at the J. H. Rowe's Tuesday night. Some 40 persons were present to see the film.

Rockcastle Soaked By Heavy Rainfall



Nearly three and a half inches of rain drenched Central Kentucky and Rockcastle County this week end, sending streams out of their banks and making torrents out of trickles.

The rain beginning about 7 p. m. Saturday and continuing through Sunday night with an occasional breather, made rivers out of streams and left low-lying areas under water.

A total of 3.32 inches fell in Mt. Vernon registered by Kentucky Utilities' rain gauge the most in the county over a year 48 hour period in over a year.

Though the long rain left shoes soggy and homes damp, it was welcomed by the farmers. Rainfall was below the season's normal. Farmers usually consider a warm, winter rain beneficial and to spring crop.

The rain also replenished farm ponds and reservoirs in the area. Water at the Mt. Vernon Water Department Lake was about two inches below what it was at the same time last year, but Henry Cox, superintendent, reported the rain "put the lake in good shape."

While Rockcastle County was getting its share of rain, Stanford, Lancaster and Danville areas were getting more. As the storm moved from west to east, it dumped four inches on Stanford and Lancaster and 3.53 inches on Danville.

Though it is not official, observers believe more rain fell in the northern section of the county. In the Roundstone-Conway section, Roundstone Creek was out of its banks in counties, including the area into pastures and farmland.

Monday the rain stopped following a drop in temperature and a change in the order of the day. Tuesday, if Rockcastle residents thought the rain was over for awhile, they got a surprise.

Wednesday afternoon the rain began again and continued steadily through the night, bringing an estimated one and a half to two inches and a half to the area. The total since last Saturday now approaches the five inch mark, the most rain in five days in over two years.

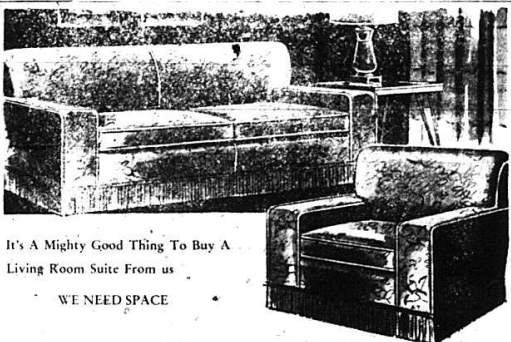

On February Markets

Potatoes, pork and beef are the three items that headline the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful food list for February.
Supplies of late potatoes are becoming so abundant that the Department has announced a week of Feb. 2-11 for its peak effort in promoting potatoes. Family food-shoppers should find not only quantity but also quality in potatoes, whether they choose from bulk bins or buy these ready in bags. The late-crop potatoes are preferred generally for baking, mashing and combination dishes.
Supplies of "new" potatoes from the winter crop in Florida and elsewhere in the South will be following in February. These are favorites for boiling in their packets or for boiling and serving "parade" buttered.
Pork also will continue plentiful in February. Because of continuing heavy supplies, reasonable prices are expected to continue. Also at the meat counter there will be generous offerings of beef, especially the higher grades.
Crisp, fresh green cabbage will be coming from Texas, Arizona, California, and Florida next month. It's a buy in appetite appeal as well as for the vitamin C it offers. Recipe of The Week

Boston Baked Beans

1 qt. navy beans
1 small onion
one-fourth lb. salt pork
2 t salt
one-half t mustard

3 T molasses
1 c hot water
Wash beans and soak in cold water over night. Drain, cover with fresh water and cook slowly until skins break. Drain. Place onion in the bottom of bean pot and add beans. Score the rim of salt pork. Mix seasonings and hot water together. Bury pork in the beans, leaving the rim exposed. Add molasses mixture. Cover bean pot and bake in slow oven, 275-300 degrees for 6 to 8 hours. Add water from time to time as necessary. Bake uncovered the last hour. If desired, the beans may be cooked in the pressure sauce pan at 10 pounds for 1 hour.

Slow Cooking Helps Ham

Leaders of homemakers clubs at Montgomery county attending a training school noted with interest that the smoked ham baked by Mrs. Pearl Haak, specialist in foods at the University of Kentucky, showed little shrinkage, and that it was unusually moist and flavorful. Mrs. Haak explained that she placed the ham in a shallow pan in an oven of 225 degrees. No water was added. About 25
