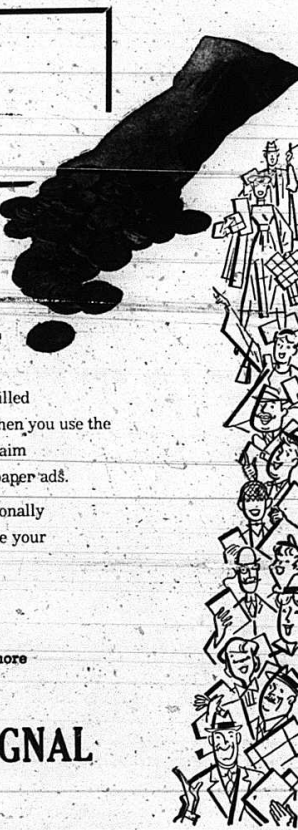

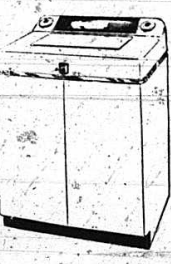

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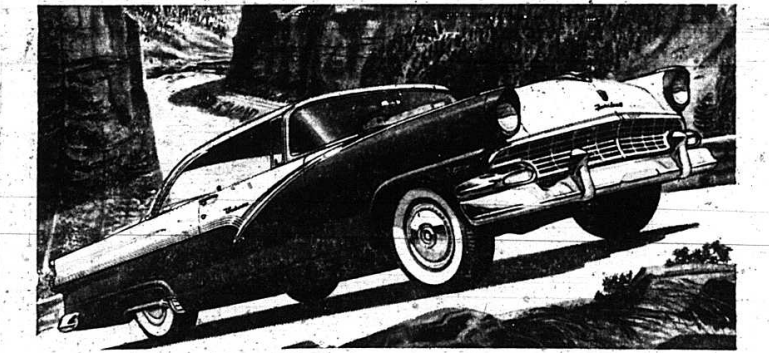

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT IS A BUSY PLACE

The huge task of any county health department is pointedly illustrated in the 1955 report of the Rockcastle County Health Department, released last week by Dr. Walker Owens, director.

It is worth noting that this is one of the smaller county departments in Kentucky. So think of the tremendous job it is to administer to some of the larger departments, such as Madison, Fayette and Kenton counties.

Though we do not know how this year compares to last year or years before in volume of business, it is readily apparent there was enough to keep the small staff on its toes.

Among the jobs in 1955, were 2,814 immunizations; 122 blood tests; 1,292 physical examinations; 653 individual inspections; 216 teacher - nurse conferences; and health talks to 1,177 children - in the area of sanitation, and restaurant inspection, such as hotels, motels, and restaurants. On top of all this, there was the task of dispensing health education and health information, including a radio program on the Somerset section.

The goal of the health department is to do its utmost to inform the county about early symptoms and signs of many diseases, and to participate in activities that are in the interest of better community health.

These are noteworthy goals, because from them come our continued health and well-being.

THANKS TO THE WEATHER BUREAU

We had information last week Mt. Vernon is to receive an official thermometer and rain gauge from the United States Weather Bureau.

This is good news, if only to relieve our inquisitive nature. For many a day we have wondered if it were really as cold or hot, as the little thermometer on the back porch reported, or if our neighbor's guess on inches of rainfall is anywhere near accurate.

Now we're going to know. The Weather Bureau is giving the two expensive instruments to the town. The instruments will be installed, we're told, at the rear of the Fire Station and Henry Cox, superintendent of the Water Works, will do the daily readings.

The rain gauge, especially, will be beneficial. Farmers who irrigate will have definite figures on how much water they'll need. The gauge will also be valuable to the Water Department in anticipating the lake flow and consumption of water.

And for all of us, with rain on the roof for more than a week, it is interesting to know just how much fell. Kentucky Utilities, which has a rain gauge for its own use, supplied the answer. From Jan. 28 through Feb. 7 there was a total of 7.32 inches of rain. But we don't want to bother KU for a daily accounting.

Most towns around us (Stanford, Danville, London) have both instruments and they have records available always to the public. Until now we have not had this service. To the Weather Bureau, we can only say, "thanks," for the belated gift.

Brodhead, which is the most improved ball club over last year, can credit a lot of their improvement to a more balanced team and teamwork. Ronnie Sutton and Don Thompson have carried most of the scoring load for the Tigers this year but as I said earlier, it takes five players to make a team. Coach Harper has experimented with several combinations this season and has put some come up with a winning combination.

J. Pennington has a knack of scoring six or eight points in every game besides being the best defensive player on the team. The short sturdy forward moves with speed of a cat and never lets up from the starting whistle until the closing horn. What he lacks in scoring ability he has an excess of in defensive skill. He is also a very good ball handler and when not taking a set shot from the side of the basket, you can see him driving to the basket. His speed and defensive ability makes him one of the most important players on the team.

James Brown can usually be seen cutting across the free throw circle where he executes a very nice one handed jump shot that usually finds the goal. The fleet-footed ball player is an excellent rebounder and good ball handler. He is a mippy defensive man, and jumps as though he has springs in his shoes. He has been an important cog in the Tiger's defense. Terry Chandler, who was up and down at the start of the season, has finally settled down and developed into a very good player. Terry on several occasions has been the big gun in leading his team to victory in very close contests. He is cool, calm and collected and plays as though he is a member of some college team. He is a very close defender on the line, and adds his share of points from the field. He is an average defensive player but has a little hard work can develop into one of the best in the county.

Then there are the coaches. These are not college heroes have been chosen to develop America's youth athletes into good sportsmen, and their ability and accomplishments can be seen plainly in the teams they have developed. Although their material, sometimes may not be of the best caliber, you can bet your bottom dollar that they will do

Vernon basketball team to make the school a better place for the dropping of all the team. There have been several stories as to why Marvin Hines is no longer playing with the Red Devils. The story the way I heard it, and I received it from a very reliable source, is that the players taller than him quit. The young athlete preferred to finish the season, but his father said no, and no it is.

Myron Stapp, Coach, led the Inspired Brodhead Team 68-57. Mt. Vernon had to stave off an inspired Brodhead, in the last quarter of a very close contest to win their 19th consecutive game.
