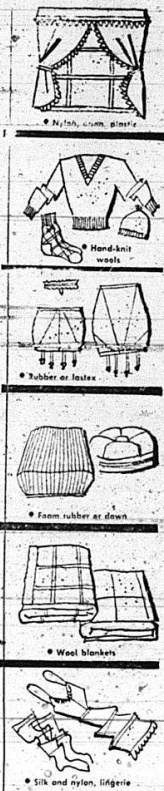

**County Agent Notes**

**Brucellosis (Bang's Disease) Control Program**  
The Brucellosis Control Program is being revised by the Commissioner of Agriculture. This revision is necessary because of a lack of funds. It is hoped that these changes will make the program more efficient.

The blood testing of calves at time of vaccination has been discontinued. Kentucky was the only state that had this requirement. This change will save appreciable amounts of money. It is recommended that

owners of pure bred herds have their calves blood tested at time of vaccination. The owner will pay for collection of blood samples. The blood will be tested in an official laboratory free of charge. Indemnity payments on reactors sent to slaughter use 50 percent of the funds available for the Brucellosis Control Program. These indemnity payments were discontinued Jan. 1, 1956. The removal of indemnity will permit the signing up of new herds. At this time funds are not available to pay for the first test on new herds. The owner may employ any licensed graduate veterinarian to collect the blood samples. The

blood will be tested free of charge in an official laboratory. A request for emergency funds will be introduced in the current session of the Legislature, according to the Commissioner of Agriculture. If this measure is passed funds will become available for paying for this initial testing, possibly with the next 30 to 60 days.

**Acceptance of Milk Ordinance**  
Acceptance of the new milk ordinance in compliance with the U. S. Public Health Milk Code. The dairy herds affected by these ordinances must be on Plan A or Plan B and in addition have their first test either blood test or Ring Test by a certain date. Unfortunately these cities did not select the same deadline for the first test. The earliest selection by any city is June 4, 1956. Some of the other cities have selected July 1, 1956 while in other cases the date is Jan. 1, 1957.

Preparations are being made to begin the Ring Test in Kentucky. It is hoped that this test will be in full operation in 30 to 60 days.

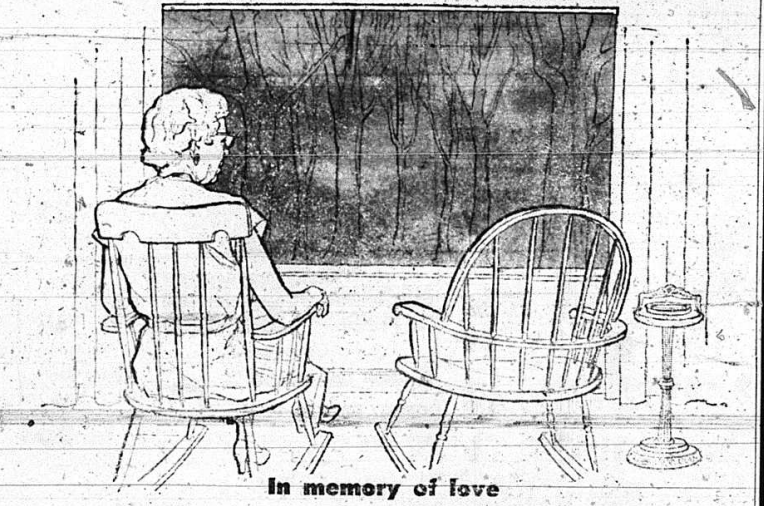
