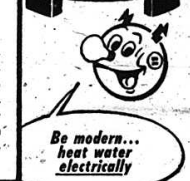

Truck Burns After Driver Strikes Bridge

A Muncie, Ind., truck driver was burned severely at noon Sunday when his truck crashed into a bridge at the Rockcastle-Lincoln County line and burned.

In a Lancaster hospital suffering from burns on the feet and other parts of his body, is Robert Funkhouser.

A second accident in which three Broaddus men escaped serious injury occurred while the Lincoln County Fire Department found the truck blaze. The trio, Charles Sanders, C. E. Woodall and Chester Davis, all of Broaddus, came over a hill near the wreck scene and were unable to stop their auto until they had crossed it.

According to a report, the driver of the truck tried to avoid an auto. The truck was on the side of the bridge, was thrown to the other side and came to rest on the road a few yards beyond the bridge where it burned.

Funkhouser was apparently thrown to the curb of the truck and stunned. Persons attracted to the scene did not look in the truck and the driver remained inside about 15 minutes before he revived and crawled out. Onlookers thought the driver had already escaped.

Traffic was stopped in the area for over an hour and for about two miles in each direction while the fire was being extinguished. Gentry's Wrecker Service, Mt. Vernon, used three wreckers to remove the damaged vehicles.

In another wrecked accident, Roy S. Culbertson, Covington, escaped injury when a car hit him from the rear on Burr Hill. Both cars were damaged. There is no identification of the driver of the other car.

"With an eye to the special opportunities now offered to veterans, many former service men of all services are re-enlisting in the Air Force," the Sgt. added.

He further added that a new program for determining a man's rank in addition to the special enlistment to the services of experienced, skilled technicians, is included in this system is authorized for the recruit himself to determine base assignment for prior service personnel on certain cases.

"For those who desire them," Sgt. Maddox stated, "30-day advance leaves will also be granted to veterans who re-enlist in the service. In addition, he will be surprised by the increased pay, retirement and family benefits and upgrading opportunities offered now by the Air Force."

Rain, Snow Give Rockcastle Beating

Water, water, everywhere, and not a drop to drink," So goes a poem that must have been written for Rockcastle County during the last 27 days with only six sunny days and a whopping 13.37 inches of rain.

The county's "rainy season" began on Jan. 23 when a storm dumped 3.32 inches of rain on the county. Since that time, Old Man Weather has continued to "pour it on" for one of the wettest years in memory.

Since Jan. 30, more than half the total yearly average of rainfall has been recorded.

Beginning on Jan. 30, it rained most of the night and the following day until a cold snap moved in to send temperatures downward and bring out the sun. The county had a brief holiday, but the following day it rained two more inches. Since that time there has been an accumulation of 13.37 inches.

Latest heavy rain was Friday night when 1.26 inches fell. The last deluge sent streams out of their banks, turned low-lying areas into lakes, swelled doors and windows and brought new leads to soggy roofs. Thunder and lightning accompanied the rainfall.

One of the hardest hit areas was in the vicinity of Brush Creek where four streams converge. The water was up to the floor of the bridge and under houses along the bank. The water quickly subsided without causing property damage. At one time residents reported the bridge "created and groaned" under the weight of debris washing downstream, but the spn held.

Last night participation in another form depended on the area - snow. Kentucky Utilities' rain gauge reported 1.3 of 8/8 inch from about two inches of snow. The snow was destined to stay around for long as clearing skies melted most of it off highways and streets by noon.

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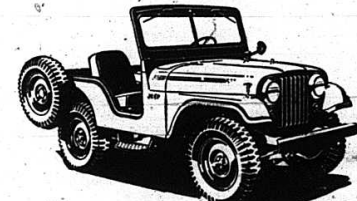

Of course it is well known that tax forms are available to everyone and should not be given any weight in a situation of this type. Mr. Gray went on to say that all Internal Revenue field offices carry very distinctive credentials or means of identification which consists of a black leather folder with the Treasury Seal stamped over parts of a picture and the signature of the Agent together with the signature of the Regional Commissioner of Internal Revenue, on the inside. All taxpayers should demand to see this identification folder when approached on official matters by anyone purporting to be an Internal Revenue Officer. Mr. Gray also requested that any one who has been approached by a person posing as an Internal Revenue Officer contact immediately the nearest office of the Internal Revenue Service or the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
