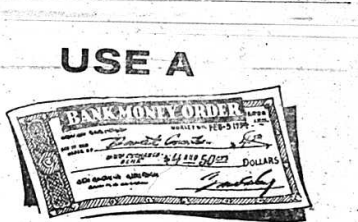

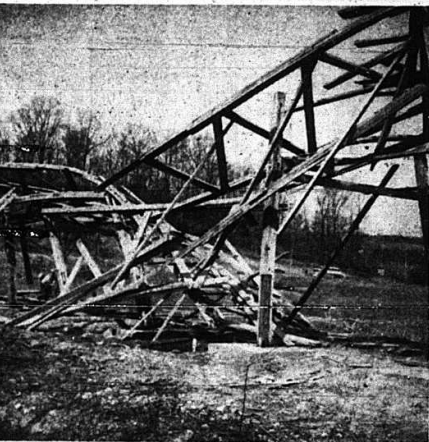

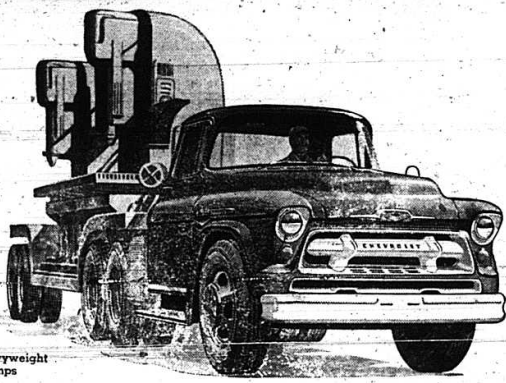

He will know the people who patronize the hospital and how to always be able to find quick cash; never-the-less, they need help. It will be left to Mr. Owens to help them find that help.

### Southern States Co-Op Increases Net Worth

Southern States Cooperative's net worth increased over two million dollars during the first six months of the 1955-56 fiscal year, according to a report prepared by J. H. Arret, Jr., of Richmond, Va., to members at their annual regional board meeting held in Berea.

Net worth of the South's largest cooperative stood at \$40,610,000 on December 31, 1955 as compared with \$37,740,000 for the same date in 1954, Arret reported.

Net savings of Southern States for the first year totaled \$2,078,000 which was one of the largest totals in a comparable period during the past six years.

Dollar volume for the same period for Southern States was exclusive of 100 affiliated cooperatives, was \$45,688,000, which was slightly lower than that of a comparable period last year.

### Rabies Season Opens; Watch Your Pets Closely

Pet owners have been asked to be on the alert for rabies as spring approaches.

Rabies is one of the most dreaded of the animal diseases which may be contacted by man. There is no cure for the virus. Life may be saved only if known in time.

The department cautions people to have pets vaccinated every year; keep a pet in a pen or on a leash when there is reports of rabies in the area; report all suspicious dogs or other animals to local law enforcement officers; and if bitten or scratched, see the family doctor at once and tell him the facts.

According to the Health Department, don't kill stray suspicious dogs or animals which can be captured. Hold for 10 days in a pen and notify authorities; don't kill a suspected animal by shooting it; don't try to destroy the head. Take it to the Health Department and find out what to do.

In Rockcastle, a cow owned by W. H. Scott, Orlando, was found to be positive when seen by Veterinarian Rudolph Burdette, the department reported.
