## X-Ray Units Set Visit To County Towns

Free chest x-rays will be available to Rockcastle County residents March 12 and 13 when two of the Tuberculosis X-ray Mobile Units of the Kentucky State Department of Health visits Mt. Vernon and Brodhead.

The unit will be in Brodhead from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. March 12, and from 9 a. m. to noon and from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. on March 13.

The unit will be in Mt. Vernon three days, March 12, 13 and 14. It will be open from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. March 13, from 9 a. m. to noon and from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. March 14, from 9 a. m. to noon and from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. March 15.

All persons over 15 are urged to make sure they do not have tuberculosis by having a chest x-ray. The service is being made available through the cooperation of the Kentucky State Department of Health, Rockcastle County Health Department and the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association. There is no charge for x-rays.

According to Dr. Walker Owens, local health officer, tuberculosis took 642 lives in Kentucky in 1953 and is one of the state's gravest health problems.

Free Chest X-Ray Will be available to Rockcastle Countains when the Tuberculosis X-ray Mobile Unit of the Kentucky State Department of Health visits Brodhead and Mount Vernon as follows: (UNIT NO. A) Will be parked in front of the Gray Theatre Brodhead, March 12, 13 March 12, hours 1 P. M. to 4 P. M. March 13, hours 9 A. M. to 12 noon, 1 P. M. to 3 P. M. (UNIT NO. 1) Will be parked in front of the Bryant Building, Mt. Vernon Mar. 12, 13, 14 March 12, hours 1 P. M. to 4 P. M. March 13, hours 9 A. M. to 12 noon, 1 P. M. to 3 P. M. March 14, hours 9 A. M. to 12 noon, 1 P. M. to 3 P. M.

All persons over fifteen years of age are urged to make sure they do not have tuberculosis by having a chest x-ray. The service is being made available through the cooperation of the Kentucky State Department of health, the Rockcastle County Health Department and the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association.

Nearly three-fourths of all new cases of tuberculosis in Kentucky are being discovered through these mass x-ray survey programs. The units tour throughout the state and approximately 300,000 persons get chest x-rays annually under the program.



Persons under fifteen years are x-rayed only if they are known to have been in direct contact with persons who have tuberculosis or upon a physician's referral. The tuberculosis case rate among this younger group is quite low. All teachers and food handlers are required to have an x-ray made.

### County Agent Notes

Strawberry Pointers  
SET A NEW PATCH  
After the harvesting season last year many farmers tried to set out a new patch of strawberry berries. Of course June setting is not satisfactory but the point is that these farmers realized they should have some new berries coming on to make up for the loss of production that usually happens as a patch gets older.

After harvest it's too late to set a new field 2 1/2 ft. apart back in March. Don't lose a on a slope. Trim roots back to

year of production because you didn't see far enough ahead.  
If you feel like you should set a new field get your plants ordered now. Arrange to have them set between now and April 15.

APPLY SOIL INSECTICIDE NOW — One of the best ways to apply grub and wireworm control is to mix the insecticide in some fertilizer. Some companies already have this material (aldrin, chlordane or heptachlor) in their fertilizers and all you need to do is to broadcast it on the ground at the rate of about 1000 lbs. of fertilizer per acre. This should be worked into the soil about 10 days to two weeks before setting.

It is profitable to treat all new strawberry fields with this material. If more fertilizer is needed get it without the insecticide in it.  
SET PLANTS CORRECTLY — All rows should be 4 ft. apart. Blakemores are set 3 ft. apart in the row. Tennessee Beauty and Pocahontas are set 2 1/2 ft. apart. Centour all rows back in March. Don't lose a on a slope. Trim roots back to

4 or 5 inches and spread out fan-shape. Do not let roots dry at anytime. Pinch off all bloom stalks. Set plants at ground level — not on ridge or down in furrow. Plants set with a tobacco setter should be set slightly deeper than by hand setting. Do not cover crowns or leave top of roots exposed. Cutwater immediately after setting and about every 9 days thereafter.

FERTILIZER OLD FIELDS NOW — If you haven't already done so fertilizer the picking patch the first chance you have.

If you have a good bed of plants use about 1000 lbs. of a 0-20-20 fertilizer. Use your judgment on how much to use of thinner plant stands. Put on when weather and leaves are dry and immediately brush the excess off the green foliage.  
THINGS TO DO — Make hand-set — get a rubber stamp with your name and address on it. Get your crates, grading pans, insecticides, dusts or sprays. Get a copy of the new strawberry circular No. 124 at the County Agent's office.
