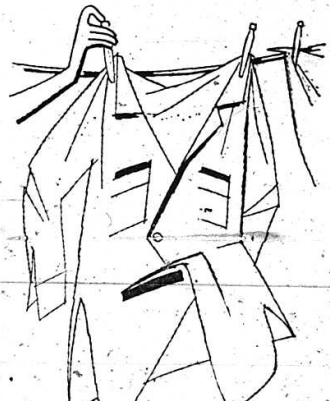

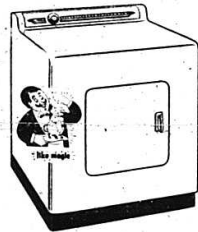

ED DENNEY'S DECISION SHOWS HIS POLITICAL AWARENESS

Edwin Denney, former Mt. Vernon attorney and 1955 Republican gubernatorial candidate has searched his conscience and, by his own words, "concluded not to make the race" for United States Senator against Democrat incumbent Earl S. Clements.

In rejecting the urging of many of his former supporters and friends to make the race, Mr. Denney in turn urged his friends to follow his lead and lend their support to Congressman Thurston B. Morton of Louisville, who Mr. Denney believes will "make an excellent candidate."

We can look at Ed's words and decision not to make the race with sympathy. He has recently suffered an overwhelming defeat at the hands of Gov. A. B. Chandler. Mr. Chandler's majority was nearly 130,000 votes. Before that, in 1952, Republican candidates, even with President Dwight Eisenhower heading the ticket and Democratic fortunes at their lowest ebb could not carry Kentucky and the state went for Adlai Stevenson. With the farm vote apparently in the Democratic column, it is doubtful any Republican can win in Kentucky in 1956, even "like."

Not that Ed is afraid of a good race and a stiff fight. In "politics" for the gubernatorial nomination in the 1955 primary, he knew he would probably face one of America's household names, "Happy" Chandler, but it did not deter him. Certainly Mr. Chandler's name is more to be feared than Senator Clements'.

On top of the overwhelming Democratic vote, Mr. Denney's campaign last November undoubtedly took some of his personal funds. It happens to all candidates despite support and contributions from the party's state treasury.

Also, Mr. Denney has had to push his law practice into the background and this he has never wanted to do. From it comes his current and future livelihood.

No, we cannot blame Ed for his decision not to make the Senatorial race. Though he would make a good candidate as he did in 1955, he stands to lose considerable prestige by a second defeat. And after all, there'll be other years undoubtedly when the "corn will be greener" in the Kentucky farm fields.

1954 Business Receipts For Rockcastle Told

Receipts of 32 service establishments enumerated in Rockcastle County in the 1954 Census of Business amount to about \$356,000, according to a preliminary report covering service trades, published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The combined yearly payroll of the county's service establishments was \$90,000. They reported 67 employees of whom 63 worked fulltime in the pay period ending nearest November 15. Proprietors actively employed in the operation of unincorporated businesses numbered 34.

Establishments providing personal services numbered 13 and reported receipts of \$102,000. Establishments primarily engaged in automotive repair, parking and other automotive services numbered none and had receipts of none. Establishments listed as "all other services" in the preliminary report numbered 19 and had receipts of \$24,000.

"Personal services" group includes such businesses as barber and beauty shops, cleaning and dry-cleaning plants, laundries and laundry services, garment alteration and repair services, funeral services, photographic studios, shoe repair shops and shoe parlors, as well as other personal services.

"Automotive services" group includes general automobile repair shops, battery service shops, tire repair shops, body and paint shops, and mobile rentals, storage garages, parking lots, auto laundries, and other miscellaneous automotive services.

"All other selected services" group includes business services, miscellaneous repair services, amusements and recreation services, motion pictures, hotels, tourist courts, motels and camps.

479 New Industrial Plants In 7 Years

A total of 479 new industrial plants in Kentucky from 1948 to 1955 provided \$1,603 new jobs, according to a department of Kentucky Economic Statistics released here today by the State Agricultural and Industrial Development Board.

The report also provided the following information: Jobs were provided for 40,962 persons in 179 of the plants with a plant investment of \$1,552,378,750. Plant investment for the other 300 plants was not available but these provided more than 10,000 jobs.

In addition, the report listed 135 firms which expanded their plants during the period at an investment cost of \$267,421,557.

Income to Kentucky farmers from livestock, farm products and crops in 1954 totaled \$558,991,000. The report said there were 218,476 farms in Kentucky in 1950 averaging 89 acres each. Forests of Kentucky in 1954 employed 14,304 workers who drew total wages of \$39,630,807 in 630 establishments. The State has a total forest area of 11,497,000 acres-of which -11,446,000 is in commercial forest and 51,000 acres is labeled as non-commercial.

Urge GIs To Watch Insurance Time Limit

Veterans of the Korean and post-Korean conflict period are losing valuable GI insurance rights because they are filing applications for special five-year term policies four months after separation instead of within 120 days.

The law grants only 120 days in which to apply for this non-transferable term policy without medical examination, said Ray R. Adams, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office at Louisville.

"One hundred and twenty days," he explained, "can be, and usually is, less than four months. So, when a Korean or post-Korean veteran counts on a four-month leave and thus files his application one, two or three days late, he cannot be granted insurance under the law."

Not only must the application for this special five-year nonconvertible term policy be filed with VA within the 120-day period after separation, but the first premium also must be paid within the same period.

County Agent Notes.

Chap Feed for 1956

In order to make the most money from cheap livestock and livestock products in 1956, farmers must feed low-cost quality feed but one produced at the least cost possible.

Whether it be grain or forage because pasture crops produce the cheapest feed we can produce through livestock, special attention should be given these fields this year. In establishing pastures and hay fields, the first step should be to have the soil tested. The next step should be to apply lime and fertilizer.

It is necessary to establish the crop and give production. The third step is to maintain the pasture and

hay through annual application of phosphate and potash according to the needs as determined by the above soil test.

If the needs of an established pasture or hay field are not known, a soil test should be made. If the feeds are known, from a soil test, the recommended applications of phosphate and potash should be made. It is cheaper to maintain established forage crops than it is to reseed them.

There is no advantage in applying nitrogen fertilizer to pasture and hay crops if a good stand of legume is in the mixture, except that the nitrogen might give some extra forage in the early spring. Recent experiments have shown that nitrogen on such fields does not increase the total pasturage or hay for crop year. However, if there is no legume, or if the stand is weak, nitrogen applications will pay provided there is sufficient phosphorus and potash to meet the needs of the crop.

Sudan Grass The Sudan Grass variety, Tift, has been removed from the list of varieties recommended for use in Kentucky. Tift has shown no yield advantage over other varieties in Kentucky and is more likely to cause Prussic Acid poisoning than Piper.

Piper has been found to be more palatable in more characteristics than other varieties tested. Prussic Acid poisoning from Piper is less likely than from other varieties. Piper will be the only variety recommended for use in Kentucky in 1956.

The seed supply of this variety does not appear to be sufficient to supply the demand.

Alfalfa Narragansett has been added to the list of alfalfa varieties recommended for use in Kentucky in 1956. This variety was developed by the Hedges Plant Experiment Station by pasture and hay fields, the first mass selection from crosses between several varieties and tested. This variety is recommended for use in Kentucky to four Atlantic, Buffalo, Ranger is to maintain the pasture and

National Forest Money Half-Million, Half-Year

The Federal Treasury received \$21 million more from the sale of timber, grazing fees, and special land use permits on national forests during the last six months of 1955 than it did during the same period in 1954, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today. If this trend continues, national forest receipts for the year ending June 30, 1956 will hit an all-time high.

Forest Service field offices reported receipts of \$63,476,238 from national forest resources between July 1 and December 31, 1955. This compares to \$42,
