During the remainder of March, by mail or other methods, citizens will be asked to purchase Easter seals to benefit crippled children in the state and nation.

Last year Easter Seal money helped provide 23 children in Rockcastle County with medical care, clinic examinations or treatment. Not only did the 23 children receive aid, but two other youngsters from Rockcastle were patients at Cardinal Hill Hospital, an Easter Seal center in Lexington.

It has also been pointed out, whenever a Crippled Children's Commission Clinic is held in the area Easter Seal funds help pay expenses of the clinic staff.

In addition to all this care and treatment, the Society furnishes transportation for children to clinics and hospitals, purchases wheel chairs, braces, hospital equipment and medicines.

The Easter Seal campaign is another of America's worthy causes. Like the polio campaign, the money is used for children who otherwise might go without necessary care.

The rehabilitation of small children, and teaching them to make their own way in the world without aid from the government or other sources, is an unequalled humanitarian effort. Our dimes and dollars will be well spent.

### Real Estate Men Must Have License

A state law, passed by the General Assembly, requires that persons operating as real estate agents or auctioneers anywhere in Kentucky must have a state real estate license on or after July 1.

Previously, the Real Estate License Law applied only to persons selling or leasing property belonging to others and located in or within five miles of a city of the first, second or third class.

According to the law, if a real estate auctioneer can furnish satisfactory proof he was engaged in the business as of Jan. 1, 1956, and not reside within five miles of a city of the first, second or third class,

he is eligible for a license without taking a written examination.

### More Forest Fires Less Damage. In 1955

Although more forest fires occurred in Kentucky during 1955 than in 1954, the average size of the fires was reduced fifty percent, Harold B. Newland, director of Forestry Division reported. During the year, 1,266 fires burned 32,741 acres or 0.546 per cent of the more than six million acres of forest under organized protection, while in 1954, 1,045 fires burned 60,088 acres or 1.02 per cent.

While 221 more fires were handled than in 1954, the average size of fire was reduced from 63.8 acres to 26.6 acres, speaking well for our fire detection and prevention programs," Newland's report explained.

The report, made in the Forestry Division's annual mid-winter conference with district foresters, was labeled "excellent, one we can all be proud of," by Newland.


