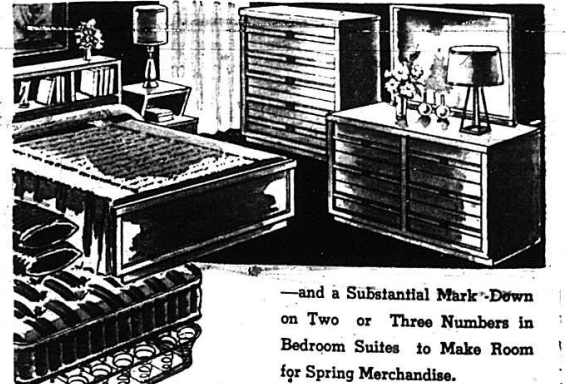

BOOKMOBILE'S INCREASED CIRCULATION PROVES ITS VALUE

The news from the bookmobile, that last year it had a 300 percent increase in the number of books from its shelves read by residents of Rockcastle, should be good news to school officials in the county.

According to librarian, Miss Edna Grace McKenzie, in 1954-1955 year the bookmobile had 3,699 readers. Last year there were 10,790 readers, an amazing increase to say the least. Such figures should point up that a remarkable number of young people in Rockcastle are going for "book larin," which should eventually be rewarding to the efforts of school teachers.

Though we are told more of the young readers still want old favorites Zane Grey and Grace Livingston Hill, than they do technical books on science and industry, we can still be glad young people are at least reading; and the technical book trade is beginning to pick up.

Miss McKenzie told the bookmobile board meeting Tuesday children are advancing rapidly in their reading. This is more good news. Going from say, Zane Grey to Lloyd C. Douglas has a few books between, is a big jump, and the youngsters are making the transition with no apparent damage to the orderly progression of their mental processes, to use a psychological term.

Though most of the recent bookmobile report is good news, some of it is not. The mobile library has the same problems, and more, than other libraries have. Many adults, for example, don't know the books are for them. The books are for them. Readers also are failing to return books, and some are returned "dog-eared," torn, marked and generally damaged. Such mistreatment of books takes them out of circulation and away from other readers who would enjoy them.

It seems unnecessary to say, but the bookmobile does not have an unlimited supply of books, or money with which to purchase books. Some lost books are not now available for purchase.

It is also reported, this year the books will have to be taken from circulation in rural areas, since many of the books have disappeared, or have not been returned due to oversight. From now on, we're told, books will have to be checked directly from the bookmobile when it calls.

Miss McKenzie's pleas to her readers to take care of their books and return them should not have to be made. We hope readers will abide by the simple rules. We feel most readers should believe as Emily Dickerson once wrote:

There is no frigate like a book
To take us lands away,
Nor any courses like a page
Of prancing poetry.
This traverse may the poorest take
Without oppress of toll;
How frugal is the chariot
That bears a human soul.
