"These are milestones of progress," said Layman. "We have accomplished a great deal during our brief existence, but this is only a sample of what can be achieved in years ahead."

Although the test-area project, started in February 1955 by the Kentucky Chamber, is now completed, Layman said SCI is set up as a permanent organization. "We shall continue with our experimental techniques during the years ahead. We've still got a big job to do."

Thirty-eight new store fronts dress-making step by step and have gone up in the region since last year, and 47 new privately-owned summer cottages have been built, Layman said. Other achievements listed by the development group head: 5 new travel folders; 4 new attractions; 12 new events and festivals.

Activity has been brisk in our ten-county area since SCI was organized. Physical improvements are apparent at every turn. Even though we have already experienced a seven per cent increase in retail trade in our region, we know that the full impact of SCI's efforts will not be realized for several years," Layman said. 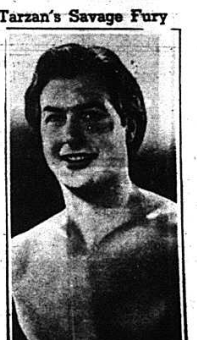
## PROPOSED LAKE

## The Signal Says....

### A NEW POST OFFICE WOULD BE AN ASSET TO THE TOWN

Very few Mt. Vernon residents, if any, will greet the news of a possible new Federal Building (post office) in the city with anything less than a "standing ovation."

Rep. Eugene Siler and Mrs. Ethel Griffin, acting postmistress, have started the "ball rolling" and with any kind of luck at all they should succeed in convincing the Post Office Department, and later, Congress, that Mt. Vernon sorely needs the new facility.

Our present post office is housed in the former People's Bank Building. It has 1,358 square feet and is heated with one coal stove. There is a shortage of everything concerned with inside post office business, except customers. Parking is out of the question. Loading and unloading mail trucks is done from the middle of the street, which is Route 25.

Even the mail carriers have their problems. Only one auto can get into the rear of the post office at one time.

On top of all these reasons, the volume of business calls loudly for better and increased facilities. The post office is now receiving 4,750 patrons—2,500 in the city and 2,250 in the rural area. Any increase, and there will be one, will only complicate the situation.

There's another reason. Every surrounding county, has a Federal Building. There's one in Pulaski, Madison, Laurel, Jackson and Garrard. Why shouldn't we have a building?

If nothing else, a new, modern post office building on Main Street, or any other street, would be a beautiful sight. Where to locate it would have to be decided later. We could think of at least two suitable locations that might be available.

Since the federal government has been inclined recently to look kindly on small areas in need of a Federal Building, perhaps it will smile and nod in our direction very soon. We hope so.

### SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

W. L. Brown, Spiro, had a pond laid out and constructed last week. Mr. Brown's pond was located and laid out by the S. C. S. technician so water can be piped from it to his barn and feed lot by gravity.

A pond was also staked out last week for Bill Cole. Res. Hill. Mr. Cole had no water for part of his farm lying across a road from his house and the pond will supply stock water for that part of the farm.

R. D. Brock, Scaffold Cane, could not get a pond of the size and depth to meet A. C. P. specifications because of rock near the surface of the ground.

D. B. Bullen is developing a spring on his farm and running a pipe line over 1700 feet to supply water for livestock. Mr. Bullen says that it is more gratifying to have to haul water for a big bunch of hogs in hot summer weather.

Walter Bullen had the S. C. S. technician and Billy Cass, S. C. S. aid; look at his spring for suggestions on how to pipe the stock water and piping the water to different parts of the farm.

Such practices can mean better use of pasture and better livestock production. Many farmers are taking advantage of the A. S. C. cost share program to carry out these good farm practices.

A complete soil and water conservation program has been worked out with L. C. Williams for his farm on Clear Creek. His plan includes such practices as creek work, drainage, fertilization, pasture development, fencing, and woodland management. Mr. Williams laid several hundred feet of tile last year.

Soil capability maps were received for O. A. Dowell, W. A. Ponder, L. C. Williams, R. Oso-link.

Supervisors of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District held their regular monthly meeting Friday, April 6, at the Soil Conservation office. W. S. Stewart, chairman, presided at the meeting. Bradley Saylor, secretary and treasurer, reported that state and national orders had been paid and that orders had been placed for signs to be placed on the major highways showing the boundary of the District. John Houston and W. E. Proctor, members of the board of supervisors, were present at the meeting. W. M. Coffey, another supervisor, could not attend the meeting.

### March Assistance Totals \$23,247

The following payments were made last month: \$14,450 to aged assistance, \$14,950; aid to dependent children, \$8,648; aid to needy blind, \$549.

A total outlay of \$3,255,323 for the three categories of aid was distributed last month. Old age grants totaled \$1,950,462; dependent children payments, \$1,190,333 and blind disbursements, \$114,342.

### Clements Campaign Opens April 17

Senator Charles C. Clements will formally launch his campaign for reelection to the United States Senate April 17 with a thirty minute television program and 15 minute radio program with a special network which will blanket the entire state.

The 26 radio and seven TV station presentation of the opening will spearhead Senator Clements' intensive campaigning in Kentucky as often as his Senate responsibilities in Washington, D. C., before the new May 29 primary date. Most of the states' night radio network carrying the assistant Senator's broadcast will be addressed will air the opening at 8 p. m. local time.

### Land Operation

A series of meetings with county committees and office managers has just been completed throughout the State for the purpose of discussing the responsibilities of local county committees and action they are required to take in seeing that all land in respective counties is listed in accordance with its actual use and operation, according to R. C. Smith, chairman of Kentucky A. S. C.

During these meetings the requirements of the regulations and procedures are being specifically outlined with regard to how all land units are to be listed for purposes of the related farm programs. Gray pointed out that for purposes of the related farm programs a farm is generally defined as all land that is operated by the same person or persons, as a single unit with respect to rotation of crops, and with work stock, farm machinery and land substantially separate from all other land.

Mr. Gray said that the meetings were uniform throughout the State and that each county committee has been instructed and requested to review each farm to operate, to determine and take action necessary to list each farm properly. If two or more tracts of land are operated by a single unit in conformity with the definition of a farm, the regulations require that they be combined as one farm. If two or more tracts of land are not a single unit but are actually as two farms, likewise the regulations require that they must be divided.

Mr. Gray relates, and it was specifically pointed out in the meetings, that the regulations provide for not obtaining a matter since all land is required under the regulations to be constituted in conformity with its actual operation. County committees have therefore been requested to complete this review of all land units in their respective counties and to take action by not later than May 1.

### PROPERTY ASSESSED NOT EQUITABLE

Property assessments in Kentucky are being made on an inequitable and fractional valuation, but the situation is not peculiar to this State. This conclusion has been reached by the Legislative Research Commission in a study of the property tax as a source of governmental revenue.

The study showed Kentucky ranking tenth among the states in dollars of property taxes collected for state purposes, and in percent of total state property taxes received by all the States.

It was reported however, that the property tax program, inaugurated in 1949, has contributed to improvement of the situation. Improvements are shown both within the counties and among counties. An assessment of \$13,900,000.00 is distributed upon this basis: Realty, 51 percent; tangibles, 27 percent and intangibles, 22 percent.

The report said several classes of tangibles are excluded from the county property tax base, agricultural machinery, manufacturing machinery, livestock and poultry, farm products in hands of the producer and raw materials and products in the hands of the manufacturer. It added, "there is little justification for this favored treatment."

principally in the larger counties. The report also recommended that assessments might be improved through these steps: 1. Expansion of the reappraisal program to achieve uniformity within counties. 2. Adequate salaries for county-tax commissioners. 3. Appointive assessors with security of job tenure. 4. State assessment of mining properties, and possibly larger industrial establishments.

### SIXTEEN NEW LAWS PASSED BY STATE

Passage of 16 new laws effecting farmers was accomplished in the regular session of the State Legislature. Of prime importance was a bill amending the Dog Law and authorizing payment on sheep losses from the State fund. June 30, 1954 instead of June 30, 1955. The amendment will result in payment of approximately \$60,000 to Kentucky farmers.

Among major aims of the Department of Agriculture were giving the Department authority over marketing agricultural products. One established an Egg Marketing Board and that all egg dealers be licensed and that all eggs be graded and graded with the grades displayed on packaging. Another law prohibiting packaging which misleads the buyer as to quality. It also requires that all commodities be labeled by their measure or numerical count.

Other laws favorable to farmers include regulations on marketing of untreated grain and processing of grain annually to subsidize showing of Pollard Herefords; requiring sale of hand trucks or other equipment related to farm operations weighing tobacco to be of uniform weight, deleting provisions of KRS 247 that allowed Frank Cottrell to receive Blankenship property at Quail courts, providing for transfer of strawberry marketing and inspection rules by the University Experiment Station to the Agriculture Department and establishment of a mosquito control program by the Department if deemed necessary by the Commissioner.
