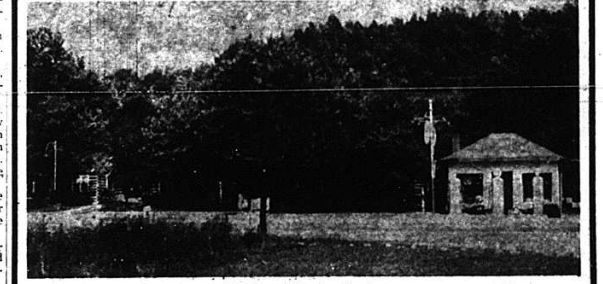

## Pike Assails State Pick Of Commission

Clall Pike, Rockcastle County Democrat chairman, this week branded the selection of Democratic election commissioners in Rockcastle an undercover movement that by-passed elected party leaders in the county.

Mr. Pike referred to the recent decision of the Secretary of State Thelma Stovall which chose the Rockcastle Democrat election commissioner from a list of five names submitted by E. L. Marshall, Livingston groceryman, instead of a list submitted by chairman Pike.

Opp. Russell, Mr. Pike, headed the list submitted by Mr. Marshall which also included George Mason, Lloyd Phillips, Robert Denton and Dewey Greaves. Mr. Pike submitted a list topped by Ray Pope and also including Fost Norton, Sherman Price, Addison Graves and James Lewis Miller. Mr. Vernon, chosen Republican election commissioner.

The list was submitted as required by state law, the list is chosen by precinct committees and the chairman at a meeting. The first choice for committee is usually the first name on the list.

Affidavits from 33 committees in Rockcastle stated no committee meeting was held to draft the list. Therefore, Miss Stovall ruled the list submitted by Mr. Pike illegal.

Mr. Pike is a supporter of Earl C. Clements, incumbent Senator making the race. He supported Chandler in the November election.

The county chairman declared on March 24 a total of 42 committees (a quorum) met at his home at Livingston and drew up the list to be submitted at that time. 12 persons objected to the choice and walked out just as the meeting was concluding.

Later, according to Mr. Pike, two committees visited 33 precinct committees and came up with a petition of some 700 names. The committee post to the state submitted by Mr. Marshall. Mr. Pike stated the committees who signed told him they didn't know what it was they were signing.

In the past the Appeals Court judge at Mt. Vernon has chosen election commissioners, but the state law has been amended and now the commissioners are chosen by the secretary of State, an appointee of the administration holding office at the time and two other members.

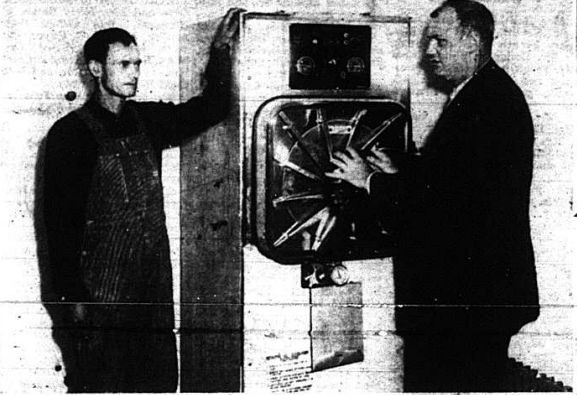

## Expect Supplies Last Of June

The July 1 date set previously to open the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital may be postponed for at least a month, according to a survey of hospital committees made by the Signal.

Though some committees believe the hospital can open on July 1 date, account apparently has not been taken on the building, equipment, furniture, and materials.

The construction work at the hospital is going ahead as scheduled. Henry Owens, building contractor, says he will be finished by July 1. Work remaining on the building includes the inside finished work, tiles on the floors, asbestos blocks on the ceiling and painting.

Administrative-wise, Floyd Owens reports he is processing applications and expects to have a staff ready by July 1.

## Equipment Displayed At Pulpwood Demonstration

Equipment demonstrations and other features may also be seen at the pulpwood harvesting demonstration Friday at Mrs. Nancy Williams' farm located just off of Route 25 between Snyder and Boone, a short distance from Judge J. A. Lambert's home, beginning at 9:30 a. m.

County Agent H. Lee Durham states that he believes all woodland owners will be interested in Rockcastle County's first pulpwood harvesting demonstration.

The bow saw is a tool which allows one man to cut more wood than two men with a cross cut. W. E. Roberts of the Sandwick Lumber Co. will demonstrate how this piece of equipment will help produce a cord of wood for sale. Roberts will show an cut about three cords of wood a day by him-

Members of the Mt. Vernon City Council in the near future will hear a recommendation from Dr. Jack Henderson, Mt. Vernon dentist, that the State Board of Health be asked to approve a fluoridation program for the Mt. Vernon Water Department as a means of preventing tooth decay.

The dentist will give copies of booklets on fluoridation to Mayor Roy Cummins to distribute to the council after the council studies the booklets. Mr. Henderson will appear at a regular or special meeting to discuss fluoridation in detail.

Doctor Henderson will then leave fluoridation up to the council members, who are directors of the water department. The council will advise Henry Cox, superintendent, to go ahead with purchase and installing of necessary equipment or forget it.

Fluoride is a compound of fluorine with a metallic base. It is a substance that is added to prevent early tooth decay. It does not stop tooth decay already started.

There is nothing new to the dental profession. In Kentucky alone, 38 towns have added the compound to their water systems. There is also a total of 936 communities in 43 states, District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, have naturally or artificially fluoridated water. Over four million people in the United States have been living all their lives in areas where their water naturally contains fluoride in concentrations as high or higher than that recommended for dental health.

Some of them are: American Legion and Jaycees. Though adults will benefit little from fluoridation, children will benefit greatly. Mr. Henderson says. Most benefit is derived by youngsters whose mother receive a compensating amount through water in their birth.

For example, in an eight year study in a Kentford, Ontario, Canada it was found children in the six year old group which had received fluoride, there was a 62.5 percent reduction in dental decay. In the eight year old group, there was a 52.5 percent reduction. In the 12 year old group, there was a 54 percent decrease and in the 14 year old group, a 21.3 percent decrease in decay.

In towns where surveys of four, seven and eight years were conducted, and where the children showed marked dental decay reduction, included: Evanson, Ill.; Madison, Wis.; Marshall, Texas; Grand Rapids, Mich., and Newburgh, N. Y.

According to Dr. Henderson, (Continued on page 5)

It is sometimes necessary to peel hardwood trees before they can be sold for pulpwood. "Peeling" means the bark is demonstrated and supervised by Robert King of the Meade Corp., Chillicothe, Ohio. After the peeling is over the pulpwood peeling will not be a difficult job.

A small one-man power saw for the forest owners will be demonstrated by representatives of the Bowers Paper Co., Roy Fulcher, Kentucky buyer of the forest, and the Meade Corp. Professional foresters marked the trees that should be harvested on a plot of woods. Personnel of the Meade and Bowers will be on hand to cut and stack the wood on a plot. Information will be available to tell exactly how much money the crop of wood will (Continued on page 5)

## NO, REPRESENTATIVE LAMBERT DIDN'T QUITE "GO ALONG"

In the Monday morning edition of the Louisville Courier-Journal the editors reprimanded nearly all members of the State Legislature in an editorial entitled "The Assembly Finally Ends a Shoddy Performance."

In the editorial it is pointed out that "the Republican Party of Kentucky must bear part of the blame" for being flattened "under the Chandler steamroller," and that "no one" excepting Louisville's Henry Heyburn "raised a voice against the shocking tactic of the Chandler machine."

"WHOA!!" They have overlooked the Representative from Mt. Vernon, James Lambert. That he was overlooked is slightly hard to believe. It seems to us the Assemblymen, or others, would have to be somewhat hard of hearing if they were unable to hear Mr. Lambert vote "NO" on numerous occasions. From experience, we do not identify Mr. Lambert as a mild spoken man when court and legislative issues are sizzling. But perhaps Mr. Lambert voted "NO" so many times it finally failed to register on the ears of his colleagues in the House.

But failing to hear, the Assemblymen must have SEEN when Mr. Lambert was marched to his seat by the Sergeant-At-Arms when he demanded to be heard on a bill authorizing the state to spend some \$200,000 to remodel the governor's mansion. The record shows "our Jimmy" voted his resounding "NO" when the bill finally came to a vote.

Representative Lambert had other "NO" votes.  
He voted "NO" for a tax exemption for Keenland Race Track.

He voted "NO" on the child welfare services change.

He voted "NO" on an income tax increase.

He voted "NO" on a law requiring a minimum price of 22 cents on cigarettes.

He voted "NO" on a 100 million dollar bond issue for road building if unnecessary.

He voted "NO" on the truck weight limit law.

He voted "NO" again on the establishment of eight advisory highway commissions.

Furthermore, he violently voiced disapproval for part of the Highway Reorganization Bill of which a section provides that at any time the state can turn back state maintained roads to the county for county maintenance. He called this section an apparent attempt to influence votes.

Finally, he voted "NO" on the budget bill offered by the governor and offered one of his own (House Bill 442) which was defeated. But unnamed Assemblymen later told Mr. Lambert they wished they had voted for his bill.

It is also of note that Mr. Lambert for many sessions had introduced a bill to make needy who are permanently and totally disabled persons, eligible for public assistance. This bill always met with defeat, but in this session it was introduced by a member of the opposing party with amendments and was duly passed.

Not all of Representative Lambert's votes were "no" votes. There were some on the "yes" list. He voted "yes" on removing the lien on property of public assistance recipients. He voted "yes" on a bill which prevents "finger" annexation by cities. He voted "yes" in favor of raising whiskey production taxes.

We'd say, all totaled, Mr. Lambert's voice was decidedly raised in the Assembly but decidedly drowned by the chorus of "YES" votes.

Besides Mr. Lambert, there were a few others overlooked by the editorial writers at Louisville. R. S. Griffin of Liberty did not always vote "yes"; nor did Leroy Taylor of Harlan; or Durham Howard of Bell; or Caleb McFadden of London; or Leonard Hislop of Somerset -- all Republicans. Nor did Democrats Foster Ockefman and John Breckinridge of Lexington, always vote "yes."

Yes, we'd say "our Jimmy" gave a good Republican account of himself in this latest and most expensive General Assembly. In fact, his account was so good someone in the Assembly remarked "the gentleman from Rockcastle is getting in 'Happy' hair." We venture to say, Happy will have to do a "right smart" of combing before he combs Jimmy out of his hair.

### PIKE ASSAULTS

Rockcastle was not the only county in the state where commissioners were chosen from lists submitted by persons other than county committees. Over the protests of Oldham Clark, Louisville, Democrat member of the State Board of Election Commissioners, Mrs. Stovall and Charles Upton, Republican member, named a Democrat and Republican election committees in every county, except Henderson, 36 counties, including Rockcastle. Had the "boom" lowered on them.

A suit was filed Monday in Franklin Circuit Court to have the selection in the 26 counties declared void. Franklin Circuit Judge William B. Ardry is asked to direct the State Election Commission to "forthwith reassemble" and set aside appointments of Democratic election commissioners in the 24 counties.

The suit charges that Upton and Mrs. Stovall acted "arbitrarily, and without warrant or authority of law" in permitting the Republican member of the commission to name and designate persons whose names did not appear on lists regularly certified by Democratic county committees.

Judge Ardry is expected to make his decision today or Friday.

### FLUORIDATION

In fact, many communities add fluoride to the water and use it up to a year before announcing its use to the public. The cost of fluoridation to the city is very small. The usual cost is between five and 15 cents per capita per year. The cost would obviously depend on several factors: size of community and per capita use of water; amount of fluoride in water before fluoridation (Mt. Vernon has none); type of chemical used and the number of installations.

These points would have to be decided by the council and the superintendent of the water works. It is estimated it would cost about \$6 a month for enough compound for Mt. Vernon. The cost of installation is estimated at \$600.

### COUNTY CAPERS

Should the council decide on fluoridation, as noted, the State Health Department would have to approve the installation and the amount used.

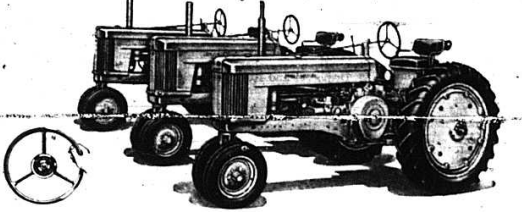
