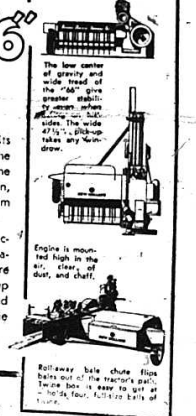

Welfare Home-Canning. Welcome news to the many rural families who can vegetable at home comes from food preservation research of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The research shows that the easier, freeze-saving raw-pack method may be used safely for two of the first spring vegetables—

asparagus, green peas—as well as for sweet corn, other cream-style or whole kernel. Recently also the raw pack has been given the go-sign for snap beans, fresh lima beans, black-eye peas, summer squash and carrots. Aim of the research has been to establish the easiest methods for getting a safe and nutritious product, and to find the minimum safe processing times and temperatures for each product to maximum freshness may be saved.

The hot pack may be used, however, if preferred, because preheated vegetables pack more compactly than raw vegetables, the hot pack saves space in jars or cans.

The home canning still counts in the food supply of many rural families is indicated by a recent food consumption study and analysis by the U. S. Department of Agriculture which showed that nearly all farm families and 8 out of 10 other rural families did some canning during the year. Canning is a thrifty way to preserve farm-produced or garden-produced food.

Because asparagus is one of the season's earliest vegetables, families who grow their own or buy it locally may be interested in the new "raw-pack" directions from the Department.

Count on using about 2 one-half pint jars for each pound of fresh asparagus for each quart of the raw-pack canned asparagus. Choose fresh, tender stalks. Wash, trim off scales and tough ends and wash again. Cut in 1-inch pieces.

To raw-pack in glass jars, pack the pieces as closely as possible without crushing, to within one-half inch of the top of the jar. Add one-half teaspoon of salt to pint jars and 1 teaspoon to quart. Cover with boiling water, leaving one-half inch of space at top of jar. Adjust jar lid to the pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure (24 degrees F.) process pint jars 25 minutes and quart 30 minutes. As jars are removed from the canner, complete the seal if closures are not self-sealing.

To process in tin cans, pack asparagus pieces closely without crushing to one-half inch of the top. Add one-half teaspoon of salt to No. 2 cans, 1 teaspoon to No. 1 one-half cans. Fill to the top with boiling water. Exhaust to 170 degrees F. (about 10 minutes) and seal cans. In the pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure, process No. 2 cans and No. 1 one-half cans 20 minutes.

Recipe of The Week. A lattice-top rhubarb pie is as much a part of spring as early flowers. Strawberry rhubarb is especially desirable with its pretty red coloring and fresh flavor. In this recipe, Mrs. Pearl Haak, specialist in foods at the University of Kentucky,

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suggests the addition of beaten eggs. The custard-like consistency cuts the acidity without loss of flavor.

Lattice-Top Rhubarb Pie 2 eggs 1 one-half c sugar one-third c flour 1 T grated orange rind one-fourth t salt 4 c cut-up rhubarb 2 T butter

Make the pastry of 2 c of sifted flour, 1 t of salt, two-thirds c shortening and 3 to 5 T of cold water. Mix, press dough together and chill in refrigerator while preparing filling.

Beat eggs, combine sugar, flour, orange rind and salt and add to eggs. Stir in rhubarb and half the pastry in a circle one-eighth inch thick and fit into 9-inch pie pan. Roll remaining half the same thickness and cut in half-inch strips. Turn rhubarb mixture into bottom mixture and weave pastry strips to form criss-cross lattice top. Trim edge, place strip of dough around edge and seal.

Bake in hot oven, 450 degrees for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 25 minutes longer.

Menu: Pot roast of beef, pan-fried potatoes, asparagus, lettuce salad, rolls, butter and lattice-top rhubarb pie.

Lambdins Get \$25,000 Total From Wreck

A total of \$25,000 was awarded Miss Easter Lambdin of Mt. Vernon as administratrix of the estate of Mrs. Ina Lambdin who was killed along with her small daughter in an auto accident at Livingston a year ago.

A Federal Court Jury in London Monday found Lee Lambdin, husband of the deceased and driver of the auto in which she was riding, "also negligent" along with Huber and Grubbe Motor Express driver, William McCoy, and refused to award Mr. Lambdin damages.

Mr. Lambdin, third party defendant, and Miss Lambdin, had sued for \$103,000 in behalf of Mr. Lambdin and \$75,000 for Mr. Lambdin's wife.

According to Defense Attorney Edwin R. Denneve, the judge directed that \$25,000 be credited with \$12,500 Mr. Lambdin would have been awarded. This is apparently means since Mr. Lambdin was found negligent along with the truck driver, the company should not have to pay all the \$25,000 to the estate, but half should be borne by Mr. Lambdin. Mr. Lambdin will therefore pay \$12,500 to the estate, leaving \$12,500 to be paid by the trucking company to the estate.

Mr. Denneve said \$40,000 settlement before the trial was refused, by Mr. Lambdin and Miss Lambdin.

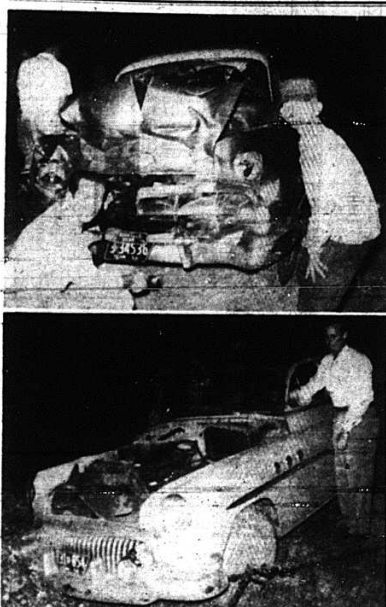

Mayor Roy Cummins told the council he has had complaints about the tables—that children are wandering about the pool—and at least "old fashioned" pool—is illegal in Mt. Vernon by city ordinance.

GO TO JOYLAND

Dr. Conrad Fey, Brodhead Chiropractor, served notice this week he will oppose vigorously "any mass chemo-therapy in doctoring Mt. Vernon's water supply"

Dr. Fey referred to the announcement last week by Dr. Jack Henderson, Mt. Vernon dentist, that Mr. Henderson plans to recommend to the Mt. Vernon City Council that the council ask the State Board of Health to approve a program of fluoridation for the city Water Department as a tooth decay preventive.

In a letter to the Signal, Mr. Fey wrote he intends to "get pamphlets of a counter nature to those intended so that both sides of the question can be fairly appraised."

The chiropractor's reference to "pamphlets" probably means he will hand the city council pamphlets opposing fluoridation. At the last council meeting a discussion of fluoridation was postponed because of more pressing business, but pamphlets showing the benefits of fluoride were handed council members to study.

Fluoride is a compound of fluorine with a metallic base which mixes with tooth enamel. It does not stop tooth decay already started. The compound is odorless and tasteless in water.

In his letter, Doctor Fey said he is preparing information in order to "present my case against fluoridation of public drinking water."

The opposition to fluoride came sooner than was expected, but just how effective it will be remains to be seen. To date, no one in Mt. Vernon has voiced official opposition to fluoride. In some towns and cities in the nation councils have had to over-ride heated and violent opposition to push through city legislation for the chemical.

Two groups usually opposed to fluoride are members of the chiropractic profession and members of the Church of Christ, Scientist, both on grounds that fluoride is a medicine.

A vote of the city council is all that is necessary for the addition of fluoride, that is, if the State Board of Health and the Rockcastle County Medical Society approve.

At the present time 38 towns in Kentucky have fluoride in the water supply, including Louisville and Ashland.

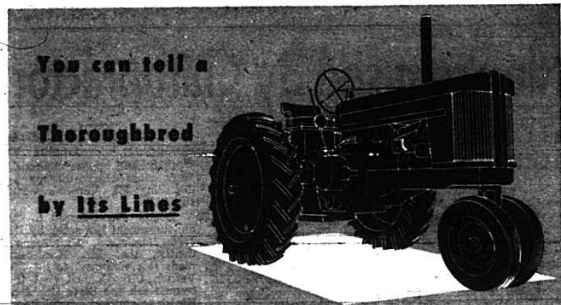

School After Training—New U. S. Navy Program

Enlistment under a new program offered by the Navy permits recruits to take school training after completing nine weeks of basic work. D. W. Taylor, GMI, USN, in charge of the Navy Recruiting office here, announced today.

"Persons with high school diplomas will be assured of a specific rating and vocational training prior to assignment to regular duty on a ship or at a station," Taylor reported.

Schools are available for waiting electronic field seaman recruit with 14 choices of studies; hospital recruit which covers dental and hospital technician; and seaman recruit with 12 schools, and seaman recruit, with a choice of 26 schools.

GRUBWORMS HURT TOBACCO BEDS

Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station entomologists and Kentucky Extension Service tobacco specialists are warning Kentucky tobacco growers that green June beetle larvae (grubworms) and leaf beetles are doing considerable damage to burley beds.

And some farmers, in attempts to fight these pests, are damaging their young plants considerably by using oil emulsion concentrates in spray. Russell Hunt, Extension Service burley specialist, warns against such use, recommending dusts or wettable powders instead.

Dr. Mallory Boush, Experiment Station entomologist, said June beetle larvae can best be controlled by a one per cent parathion dust applied to bed surfaces after bed covers have been removed.

Boush noted that no other material, including dieldrin, aldrin, heptachlor or chlordane, will give as rapid control as parathion. These four insecticides are effective, he said, but are slow acting in warm weather, parathion dusts will give control in 48 hours if weather is cool, insecticide goes deep into the ground and an additional application of parathion might be necessary. Parathion dust has little residual action.

The green June beetle larvae is from an inch to an inch and one quarter long. It is one of the largest of the subterranean insects and damages tobacco beds by tunneling and by disrupting bed surfaces, allowing the surfaces to dry out. The insects don't actually eat the plants, he said; they have a
