## Rockcastle County Attorney, Railcar Crash Takes Life Of T.J. Niceley, Buried Monday

## Railcar Crash Takes Life Of Ed Halcomb

T. J. Niceley, 80, for more than 50 years a leading political figure in Rockcastle County and the state, died Friday night at Berea College Hospital. He was the victim of a heart attack.

Niceley suffered a heart attack about 8 p. m. Friday at his home. He was later taken to Berea where he succumbed at 11:20 p. m.

Niceley was born in Jackson County, the son of Benjamin and Phoebe Nichols.

In 1879 he married Lucy M. Catron of Level Green. Her father held a political office at the time.

Niceley got his first political office — deputy sheriff — in 1906. Four years later he became sheriff and served until 1910.

The next eight years he was circuit court clerk, and in 1922 he became county court clerk, an office he was to hold for 32 years.

At the time of his death he was county attorney. He also served as Eighth District Republican Chairman and County Republican Chairman.

In 1937, Mr. Niceley was the Republican candidate for Secretary of State under a ticket headed by King Soward of Lexington.

He was vice president of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, a mason and a member of the Mt. Vernon Christian Church.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three sons: Russell A. Niceley, Miami, Fla.; Henry T. Niceley, Atlanta, Ga.; and Lewis (Continued on page 4)

Ed Halcomb, 41, of Brush Creek, was killed Friday when he was riding collied with a school bus at Morgan near Falmouth.

Byrd Cummins and Jimmy Ghent, two of Mr. Halcomb's fellow workers were injured slightly. Several other men on the handcar reportedly escaped injury.

The accident occurred about nine miles south of Falmouth where the Louisville & Nashville Railroad crosses Morgan Road at a blind curve.

Witnesses said Mr. Halcomb tried to jump from the handcar but was crushed between it and the bus. The bus, which had taken children to school, had stopped at the crossing but the handcar protruded over the track. The impact knocked the handcar into a ditch.

The bus driver was identified as James E. Fisher, 33, of Falmouth. There is a flasher light and an electric bell at the crossing but the handcar failed to set off the signal.

Mr. Halcomb was born in Rockcastle County the son of Pearly Warrick and Ed Halcomb. He was married in 1946, and also survived by two children: Norma Jean, 9, and Janet Irene, 5, one sister, Mrs. James Allgood, Monroe, La.; three half-sisters: Mrs. Martha Young, Big Hill; Mrs. Mary Woodard, Coplar Bluff; Mrs. Mrs. Gladys Robinson, Orlando.

Funeral services were conducted Monday at the Brush Creek Holiness Church with Brothers Rella Cornelius, C. W. Murphy, and Brown.

He was buried in the family cemetery, The Sparks Funeral Home had charge of arrangements.

John Green Riddle, a former guard at the Kentucky Reformatory at Frankfort and native of Rockcastle, died at Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, Thursday after a short illness. He was 78.

He was born in 1878, the son of the late John W. and Sarah Julia Riddle. He was a member of the Corbin Christian Church, is survived by one brother, Charles L. Riddle, of Frankfort, many nephews and nieces, including the children of the late James Riddle of Mt. Vernon.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday at Cox Funeral Home with the Rev. Howard Ray and Bro. George Murphy officiating. He was buried in Elmwood Cemetery.

Mt. Vernon will soon have a youth center. The center is scheduled to open May 22.

The center will be located at the First Baptist Church and will be sponsored by the Men's Brotherhood of the church, according to an announcement by Edison Caldwell, president of the brotherhood.

"When the center opens, the men of the church will see a great thing come true. They have looked forward to operating a center for a long long time," Mr. Caldwell declared.

The center will feature ping-pong, shuffle board, darts and other games. Sports magazines and books will be provided. Ice cream, soft drinks and candy will be sold at wholesale prices.

Motion picture cartoons will occasionally be shown. The center will always be chaperoned. No dancing, swearing or loitering on the outside of the building will be tolerated, Mr. Caldwell said.

The center will be located on the first floor of the Educational Building. Through the summer months it will be open on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday nights. It will remain open until 10 p. m. and 9 p. m.

The facilities provided are those of junior, intermediate and young people. Children who have reached their ninth birthday may come to the center as visitors but must be accompanied by their parents. Adults are invited to visit the center at any time.

Only during revivals at the church will the center be closed. "Our pastor, Raymond Lawrence, expressed himself as heartily in favor of the center," Mr. Caldwell stated. Mr. Lawrence congratulated the church for taking this forward step in giving special service to young people and helping to combat juvenile delinquency.

All young people of the community are invited to take advantage of the center, regardless of church denomination or affiliation.

Police Judge On Salary Basis

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted at a special session Tuesday afternoon to put City Police Judge Leonard Langford on a salary and set his salary at \$100.

The council apparently acted following a statement last week by the Kentucky Attorney General that police judges are probably in the same category as magistrates, and therefore the judge should not be deemed a public officer.

Langford's salary was based on the average of fees he was paid from cases during the city's 1955 fiscal year.

A week ago the Court of Appeals at Frankfort struck down Kentucky's fee system of paying magistrates for trying criminal cases by declaring the method unconstitutional.

No other business came before the council.

To Beautify School

A beautifying project will now be underway at Livingston High School, according to Principal Charles Parsons.

The area around the gymnasium, the street on the west side of the school and part of the playground is to be blacktopped. The gymnasium is to be decorated and repaired. Shrubbery will be set out at the corners of the school and grass will be sown.

The project is sponsored by the town, the Board of Education and Save The Children Federation.

## One Physician Opposes Use

Dr. Conrad Fey, Broadhead chiropractor, this week began his campaign against the fluoridation of Mt. Vernon water by terming fluoridation to prevent tooth decay a violation of human rights and declared the people "will have no choice but to either take something that you may not care to take according to your judgment or get a barrel to bring your water in from an unvisited spring."

The chiropractor, true to his decision to fight fluoridation, "fluoride is described in the dictionary as a potent corrosive gas—which cannot be kept in glass which it attacks freely, so one of its forms (sodium fluoride) it is used as rat poison. This is the basic element that is being suggested as being used in Mt. Vernon's water supply," he declared.

Dr. Fey was in Mt. Vernon Tuesday and visited the mayor and members of the Mt. Vernon City Council. He distributed literature of what he called "a counter-nature" on fluoridation for the councilmen to study. Previously, the council had been handed literature from Dr. Jack Henderson, Mt. Vernon dentist which points out the benefits derived from fluoride.

In a written statement to the Signal, Dr. Fey said: "Reference previously has been made that mostly chiropractors and members of the Church of Christ, Scientist (Continued on page 4)

If fluoride for Mt. Vernon city water came to a vote of the Rockcastle County Medical Society today, the vote would probably be three "for" fluoride and one "against" the chemical.

Such was the outcome of a poll of three of four of the county physicians who comprise the Medical Society. The poll was taken by the Signal this week.

In order to add fluoride to the Mt. Vernon water supply as a tooth decay preventative, the Medical Society must approve the chemical for use.

Dr. George Griffith, Dr. J. F. Pennington, Dr. Walker Owens, county health officer, and Dr. R. G. Webb of Livingston, make up the Society's membership. Of the three contacted, Doctor Webb opposes fluoride. Doctor Owens could not be contacted, but in all probability he will go along with fluoride since most health departments approve.

## China School-marm Likes 1-Room Livingston Class

A one room school and the state high school at Rockcastle teacher have most impressed a head school mistress living 25 miles from the Chinese Communist border, and a YWCA secretary who are now visiting this country.

Mrs. La Myen, principal of the state high school at Rockcastle State, Burma, and Miss May We, national secretary of the Burma YWCA, have been in the United States since March 20.

During this time they have been in New York, Philadelphia, Washington, D. C., and Niagara Falls. They recently spent several days at Berea College.

But the one thing in the United States that most impressed them was a one room school near Livingston, Ky. in Rockcastle County, and the devoted efforts of Mrs. Cascus Fleisher, the teacher there.

Mrs. La Myen had only words of praise for the Kentucky teacher. "She is doing a fine job,"

the foreign visitor said. "She has the spirit of service that that students need today. Mrs. Fleisher told me she had about 30 students in eight different grades, and how she could manage it I wonder."

Mrs. Myen said that the Rockcastle school reminded her of her native Burma. "In my state many students walk for miles out of the mountains to come to school and then hurry home in the evening to work."

In Burma, Mrs. La Myen, the wife of a doctor, is the headmistress of a 600 student school. She has students from kindergarten to high school age.

### WORDS FLOW ON THE SUBJECT OF FLUORIDE

The somewhat new chemical, fluoride, has been in the local news for the past two weeks. Before it is finally decided by the Mt. Vernon City Council whether fluoride will be added to the city water supply as a tooth decay preventative, there will be considerable discussion on the subject.

This is a subject to be, for fluoride can, as seen, be approved or condemned on medical, religious, moral and personal grounds. Before any definite action has been taken everyone should have his say, because that is the American way of conducting issues in our national and local governments.

No doubt, both sides have points "for" and "against" fluoride; but however strong these points are, the final decision must rest only on one question: Will fluoride in the city water supply greatly benefit the people of the town and future generations?

The answer will be left to the city council after each member has studied "pro" and "con" literature on the subject and has heard representatives from both sides.

At this point we do not take issue with either side. We do remind all concerned of the tremendous importance of the decision.

### T. J. NICELY'S DEATH ENDS A POLITICAL ERA

The death of T. J. Nicely last week end from a heart attack ends an era in Rockcastle's political history.

Mr. Nicely's contribution to the community was service, friendship and courtesy to all he knew, and the public responded by electing him deputy sheriff, sheriff, circuit court clerk, and for eight consecutive terms, county court clerk. His final defeat, and one of his few, was no repudiation of Mr. Nicely, but rather a practical public's view that he might not survive another term in office.

With his death at 80, most of the elder politicians of the heyday of the Rockcastle of the early part of the century have gone. It was fitting that "Tom" Nicely should be one of the last, because his political contribution and career was one of the longest and most illustrious.

... pose fluoridation. This I accept as a compliment but it is not so. Many leading bio-chemists and research chemists as well as some leading dental and

medical doctors oppose the method as well as the principal of fluoridation.

There are indications that this same chemical contributes to ailments of heart, liver, kidneys, and lungs - Reference: "Roes Principles of Chemistry," page 287.

Fluoride occurs in many foods and in the drinking water of many communities in small amounts. When food contains more than 10 mg. per 100 grams, or the drinking water more than 2 parts per million gallons, a defect in the enamel of the teeth results. This is called "mottled enamel" and develops in children who ingest such food or water at the time permanent teeth are being formed.

Mottled enamel also called "Florosis" is a condition characterized by chalky white patches in the enamel of the teeth.

Proponents of fluoridation of public drinking water claim that 50 percent to 60 percent of dental caries are thus prevented. Many sound thinking men of dentistry and medicine as well, believe that the same ratio could be prevented by oral hygiene (brushing teeth) and dietary changes. Should we by mass methods encourage further laziness on dental health or perhaps would education of the public especially school-age youngsters be the answer?

### Rockcastle's Income Rate Given By UK

Rockcastle county's per capita income in 1954 has been placed at \$1,027 by University of Kentucky economists who have just completed a new study on personal income in Kentucky.  
Kentucky's slow but persistent climb from its lowly position among the states in personal income has continued for another year. It was disclosed in the study, entitled "Personal Income in Kentucky Counties 1954."

The study progress being made by Kentucky is reflected in various phases of the UK work, prepared under the direction of Dr. John L. Johnson, director of the UK Bureau of Business Research.

One of the most important findings of Kentucky's income study is the gradual decrease in percentage of the difference between per capita income in Kentucky and the nation. Dr. Johnson said.  
According to the study, Jefferson County ranked first in per capita income in 1954 with a figure of \$2,079. Placing second and third were Kenton and Fayette counties with \$1,729 and \$1,680 respectively. In only two other counties was per capita income greater than for the state as a whole.

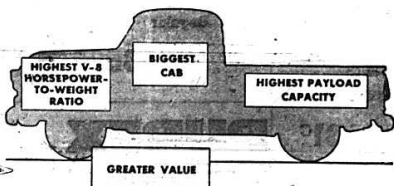
