**Freezing Strawberries**  
Time to put strawberries in your freezer for shortcakes, sundaes or other treats the year round is when the fruit is red-ripe all over, sound, firm and slightly tart, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Here's how to prepare sliced berries in granulated sugar. About two-thirds quart fresh, ripe berries are needed for each pint to be frozen. Wash berries a few at a time in cold water. Lift berries gently out of water and drain. Remove caps. Then slice into a bowl or shallow pan. Sprinkle sugar over berries—3/4 cup to each quart of berries. Turn berries over and over until sugar is dissolved and juice forms. Pack berries in freezer container leaving 1/2 inch headspace in wide-mouth pint box. Press berries down into juice. Seal the freezer container. Label with name of fruit (granulated) sugar mixed for appearance—that is, for-fruit and date frozen. Freeze. Then store at zero degrees F. or

below.

## Gray Ladies--

### ARC Group Plans Services

Plans progressed this week for the formation of the Gray Ladies volunteer service organization for the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

The organization is headed by Mrs. Mary Craig, the veteran. Details of the organization were discussed last week at a meeting of the local Red Cross chapter by Miss Theresa White, Red Cross field representative for this territory, and Mrs. Reuben Medley of Frankfort, volunteer field consultant.

With the opening of the hospital at Mt. Vernon this summer, it was felt by the hospital's Board of Directors that volunteer help in the day to day activities of the hospital would be necessary.

Knowing the many services in need of the hospital, the Gray Ladies contacted Red Cross. The Red Cross responded with the suggestion of Gray Ladies.

The Gray Ladies organization got its name because of the gray uniforms which the ladies will wear with the Red Cross insignia. It has been part of the Red Cross program of services for many years.

A few hours of training by a qualified staff is all that is required of the organization. Volunteers will work on a scheduled basis, probably once a week. Although these details cannot be stated definitely until hospital needs are more firmly established.

Gray Ladies do not assume medical duties. Red Cross points out that they will be the "extras" which will help make the patients day a little brighter.

Some of the duties of the Gray Ladies will be to distribute books and magazines, make telephone calls and receive mail. They will shop for small items such as toothpaste and baby pins. The Ladies will read to patients if indicated and write letters.

Mrs. Craig is beginning to get her organization established. She will welcome inquiries from interested people who are pointed out by Gray Ladies is not in itself a religious organization. No denomination is emphasized.

The Gray Ladies is the second organization to be formed as a service to the local hospital. Recently, the hospital auxiliary was officially approved by a hospital's Board of Directors.

## Clements, Morton, Siler, Victors In Local Election

Incumbent Senator, Earle C. Clements, Democrat, carried Rockcastle County by 12 votes in the primary election May 29. Clements received 473 votes and his rival Joe B. Bates, 461. The third candidate, James Delk had 4 votes.

As expected, Thurston Morton, of Louisville, won the Republican nomination for Senator. His Rockcastle majority was 147 votes over Julian Golden in Rockcastle. Morton received 387 votes. Golden, 240 votes, and Gravitt, 27 votes.

In Rockcastle in the GOP battle for representative, incumbent Rep. Gene Siler polled 207 votes to 173 for W. D. Scalf. On the Democratic side, W. D. Scalf received 293 votes; Lyle Willis, 11, and James Cupp, 7.

In the November election, Clements will oppose Morton and Siler will oppose Scalf. At that time another serious contest will be held with two candidates yet to be named. The latter two will seek the seat made vacant by the death of Al Barkley.

## Farm Income 2 Million

The value of products sold in 1954 by operators of 1,514 farms in Rockcastle County was \$2,031,750, according to a preliminary report of the 1954 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The value of all crops sold was \$1,418,258 and included \$1,403,928 for field crops, \$540 for vegetables, \$13,740 for fruits and nuts, and \$50 for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$588,527 and included \$194,268 for dairy products, \$59,213 for poultry and poultry products, and \$335,046 for livestock and livestock products.

The value of the forest products sold from the county's farms was \$24,985.

Information on the value of farm products sold is presented for each county in a preliminary State report, copies of which may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., at 10 cents each.

### Buy Auto Insurance With Caution—Thurman

The State Department of Insurance today urged Kentuckians to be extremely cautious when buying insurance, particularly automobile coverage.

Recently, a member of unethical practices were discovered by the Kentucky State Commissioner of Insurance, C. P. Thurman, and his staff.

These brokers must see that their companies have the minimum capital and surplus being placed in the Commonwealth.

The Department of Insurance requires a certified copy to the amount of surplus for each separate attestation will be required from the non-admitted company certifying that its capital and surplus is not less than \$200,000.

In a recent example, the Department discovered that one agent had palped coverage on a Kentucky automobile with a company considered unacceptable.

The agent of this Indiana company was ordered to cancel all such policies and within 12 hours every policy was withdrawn and the unearned premium refunded to the policyholders. Less than a week later, the company was placed in receivership.

### Real Estate Law Amended By Assembly

The 1956 General Assembly of Kentucky amended the real estate license law for the purpose of affording even greater protection to the public.

Every auctioneer and real estate agent operating in Kentucky must be licensed by the Kentucky Real Estate Commission as of July 1, 1956. Individuals applying after that date must take and pass the written examination. Application forms may be had by contacting the Kentucky Real Estate Commission, 1129 Kentucky Home Life Building, Louisville, Kentucky.

The new law applies only to those who are required to be licensed for the first time and have been engaged in the real estate business as of Jan. 1, 1956.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL POINTS THE WAY

Many centuries ago God told his people to place twelve stones from the bed of the river Jordan near the western bank of that well-known stream. These stones were to serve as a reminder to all who would pass through that area that GOD HAS MADE A WAY for his people.

The WAY is sometimes brought about by a demonstration of the mighty power of God in working miracles. The WAY is sometimes slowly and silently pointed out to those who seek after the Living God.

Man has always been a forgetter. God, knowing this, has given various signs, or tokens, of His promises to remind man of His faithfulness in fulfilling promises. His supreme token was His Only Begotten Son. When God promised that He would not again destroy the world by a flood, He placed a rainbow on the shoulder of a cloud as a sign of this covenant with man. In placing the stones near the Jordan, God intended that such a monument would continually remind the Hebrew people that God had cared for them, and that He would continue to help them. Nearly every generation since that time has been a recipient of God's leading and protective spirit which urges ahead to make a HIGHWAY for His people.

Those of us who love America dearly feel that God made a WAY for his people back in the fifteenth century so that a new land would be born which would rear its head above the commonplace level of life; that a nation would exist which would be a leader and a light to other countries. One important force behind our rise and progress was the emphasis placed upon education. As our appreciation for education grew, we grew also. Education, used wisely, and controlled intelligently, reaps many benefits for those who have vision and courage enough to make use of education. It is a sacred trust which no generation, or nation, should betray.

The greatest teacher of all times, Jesus, reiterated often to his disciples the importance of learning that truth which would set them free. In the exercise of this prerogative, the disciples found a ready tool in assisting others in the pursuit of the NEW WAY. The prophet of old spoke of a New and Living Way. In bringing the prophecy into realization, Jesus built a living institution; endowed it with His blood; staffed it with His apostles; provided a textbook (Bible) and made plain the curriculum. Last of all, just before His ascension to the right hand of the Father, He gave his institution a charter — "GO YE THEREFORE, AND TEACH ALL NATIONS..." The strength of the charter manifests itself in carrying out this injunction. Our chief role, therefore, in being faithful to this charter is to TEACH men and women, boys and girls, to find THE WAY.

To remind us of the great sacrifice made by God in giving freely His Son, the church came into being. We do not need to see the stones near the Jordan to be reminded of the WAY-MAKER, but look we must to the church to be reminded of what God has done for us. A vital life-line of that glorious organization is the Sunday School. In thousands of churches over our land the Sunday School stands as a lighthouse to point the way to a better way of life. America's strength is not alone in her military might, nor in her stockpile of weapons, but in her bulwark of faith. Sunday Schools are helping to nourish this spiritual power.
