Ketchucky State Gasoline Tax Refund
The 1936 Regular Session of the Kentucky General Assembly amended the Gasoline Tax Refund Law in order to make it easier for farmers to obtain a refund on gasoline used for agricultural purposes.
No refund of the state tax

on gasoline can be made until the farmer has obtained a permit from the Kentucky Department of Revenue. Application blanks for Gasoline Refund Permit can be obtained at the county agent's office.
Under present law farmers may apply for a refund of the tax paid on gasoline immediately after purchase or at any time during the calendar year. However, the application must be made no later than ninety days after the close of the calendar year in which such purchases were made. The information required from the farmer when he makes application for refund has been simplified.
Sudan Grass for Summer Pasture
Sudan grass is an excellent supplemental and emergency pasture crop for Kentucky in summer. Though Sudan grass is much more useful during droughty years than during seasons of normal rainfall there are few livestock farms in Kentucky that cannot use a small area of Sudan grass during the summer when permanent pasture grasses are more or less dormant.
To get the most out of Sudan grass pasture, two areas of it should be grazed alternately while the other is pastured, two or three head of cattle, or an equivalent number of other kinds of livestock, can be grazed per acre.
Sudan grass should be seeded anytime now up until the last of July, a field is ready for pasture four to six weeks after seeding.

Rabbits Profitable Association Says

Raising rabbits can be profitable. Such is the belief of the Rockcastle County Development Association directors.

The directors this week endorsed rabbit raising in Rockcastle.

President of the Development Association, R. H. Hamm, declared today he contacted O. K. Vessels, president of the Rabbit Processors Corp., of Louisville about raising rabbits. He was told by Mr. Vessels:

"The idea a rabbit is a rabbit or that they will develop overnight in large numbers, or that it does not take a lot of know-how to be successful in raising them is an erroneous impression."

After discussions with Mr. Vessels, Mr. Hamm said rabbits could be more profitable than cattle, and that the Rabbit Processor Corp. has stated they will purchase rabbits grown in Rockcastle. He suggested interested farmers who would like to breed rabbits form a small cooperative and take shows to Louisville for a year.

Mr. Hamm explained one doe averages about 25 babies a year. Rabbits sell at 32 cents a pound, and when sold weigh about four pounds. At this rate, one doe would bring about \$320 a year.

Mr. Vessels explained to Mr. Hamm that "good proper breeding stock in rabbits is all important. On this subject, you can get a lot of money unless you buy from dependable sources."

fed formula and is having it produced at a dependable mill, relating it to our breeders at greatly reduced prices. Proper feeding means success or failure of a rabbitry. For example, note the difference in price of corn fed and slop fed hogs and their meat value, he explained.

Mr. Vessels also explained that farmers could raise alfalfa hay which would have to be properly cured, which would save breeders a lot of money. He said alfalfa hay would supply at least 70 per cent of a rabbit's feed, supplemented with a good rabbit ration on the other 30 per cent.

Mr. Vessels urged that farmers start with only a few rabbits and build up. He suggested a look at rabbits raised by George Templeton director of the United States Rabbit Experiment Station, F o n t a n a , Calif.

Said Mr. Vessels: "Some people raise rabbits as a hobby. Other people do what we refer to as 'piddle' rabbits. Others go in for show purposes and have long skinny rabbits, all colors, and the majority of them are very poor meat type. The commercial rabbit should be comparable to the hereford or Angus cattle in type, blocky and with heavy meat of equal distribution over the entire body."

Mr. Vessels invited interested persons to inspect the RPC plant at Louisville.

Mr. Hamm said he would like to discuss the subject with farmers and others interested in raising rabbits.

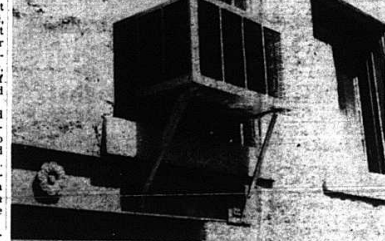

Hears 2 Sides From Visitors

Members of the Mt. Vernon City Council listened and asked questions about fluoride at their meeting Thursday night, then decided to postpone for further study a proposal to fluoridate the city's water supply.

As expected, Dr. Jack Henderson, Mt. Vernon dentist, asked the council to add fluoride to the city water supply as a tooth decay preventative. Also, as expected, Conrad Fey, Brodhead chiropractor, led the opposition to the proposal.

During the long session, interspersed occasionally with a loud voice, the council heard Dr. Henderson laud fluoride as one answer to many of the dental problems of youngsters.

(1) Fluoride has been tested and found to be beneficial. (2) It is not more dangerous than fluoride now used in city water. (3) Its greatest aid is to children too small to brush their teeth.

That most reputable organizations in the nation, including the U. S. Public Health Service and the American Dental Association have placed stamps of approval on the chemical.

To add weight to his argument for fluoride, he reported Dr. James Eckman, an administrative staff member of the Mayo Clinic, had telephoned him and requested that he tell the public its fears of fluoride are unfounded. Dr. Eckman advised the city to go ahead with fluoridation and said he knew of no staff member at the Mayo Clinic who is opposed to fluoride.

Dr. Henderson had written Henderson at the clinic after a letter appeared in the Signal written by E. E. Combs, Mt. Vernon, and Richmond, chiropractor, which quoted Dr. G. Pugh of the Mayo Clinic as saying fluoride. The quote was taken from a book by Dr. Pugh.

Dr. John D. Henderson, also at the meeting, asked the council to consider adding fluoride. "It is not a cure for tooth decay, but we are sure of some benefits. You may rest assured you will not cause dentists from practicing. We have found fluoride are weak spots in the human anatomy and teeth are one of the most important small organs we can help future generations to partially solve their teeth problems. Then we should 'by all means do it.'"

Mr. D. told the council, fluoridated public water supplies is mass chemo-therapy. He urged the council the best way to settle the issue is to call a referendum and let water users decide if they want fluoride in their water.

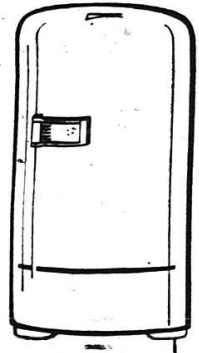
