THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH W. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Matthew 13:13-17
Devotional Reading: John 14:1-11

Son of God

Lesson for July 8, 1956

ONE thing the Christian church has believed from the beginning: Jesus is divine. Now the Bible never says that in those words. A more vivid and personal way of expressing it is the Bible says: There he is called Son of God. Theologians have written volumes on top of volumes to explain what the Son of God means. These volumes are pretty hard to understand. It is impossible to get into the Bible itself and see what Dr. Foreman says there. The letter to the Hebrews (one of those nine letters at the end of the New Testament), in the very first sentence, gives Jesus the title of Son; but does not finish the sentence before beginning to explain a little what it means by this.

God Speaks by a Son

The first thing we are told here is that God, who has been speaking to men for thousands of years in various ways, has at last spoken to us by a Son. Jesus Christ is God's answer to man's call for help. He is God calling to us. Men are spending a lot of money and so silent. They wish they could read the inscrutable mind of the most high God. Well, God has spoken. He has spoken in His best and best Word. And this Word is not in the form of a textbook, nor in the form of an answer-book for all the dilemmas of existence. God's message to man is not a creed, however good it may be. His message is a Word. He has spoken. He wants to know what His men, who we hear would say something, Well, God has said. . . and what he says is Jesus Christ.

Through Him, the World

The line that divides all things that exist into two different kinds of things, the first and most important line, is not the line dividing spirit from matter. The real dividing line is that which runs between Creator and Created, or to put it in another way, the line between God and everything else that is. When you take time to think about it, you can see that only God can be the creator of anything. He alone is the one that exists, because he is and not because something or somebody else made him. Every man must say to himself, "If it were not for such and such a person, or such and such an event, it would not be here." But God would not be here. He is here because He does not depend on something or someone else for his very existence, as we do. He is here because we that we are in the universe at all; it is by his will that the universe is here for us to be in. Now the writer to the Hebrews declares that Christ is God's active agent in creation. In the simple words of the writer, we read that through Christ, God created the universe. No wonder the early church soon saw that this puts Jesus on the God-side of that line-dividing line between God and man. This is part of what we mean when we say that Jesus Christ is divine.

Reflection and Stamp

Another part of what we mean is expressed in those two words "reflection" and "stamp." The Old Greeks had a story about a creature called a Gorgon, with snakes for hair, so horrible that the very sight of her turned the beholder to stone. Only when a brave man thought of going up to her, not looking directly at her but into a mirror, was any one able to enter her presence and live. In quite the opposite way, God is not too horrible, but too holy, for men to gaze at. We too need a mirror to reflect the unbearable glory of God; Christ is that reflection. He is like the image of God's nature. He is as it were God's signature, his handwriting, his personal seal.

"Therefore . . . Clear Attention"

The divinity of Christ, of which these sentences in Hebrew are only a few of the New Testament testimonies, was never thought of, as those men of the Hebrew God church, as a mere doctrine in a book. It meant and means something intensely practical. If Jesus is really divine, then we cannot just take him or leave him. If he is God's Son he is no more optional with God. He is deciding for or against him the most important decision in life. What he tells and teaches is not "one man's opinion" against him; it is the voice of God.

Keep Frozen Foods Frozen For Best Quality

To provide the highest quality, keep frozen foods frozen until they are defrosted for use, is the advice of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The process of thawing and refreezing does not in itself make fruits and vegetables unsafe, but thawed foods spoil more quickly than fresh ones, and may soon become unusable to use if they are not refrigerated.

Both fruits and vegetables may be refrozen if they have not completely thawed, or if they have been thawed for a short time and have been held in the refrigerator. However, the thawing and refreezing will usually cause poorer quality and loss of flavor, and refrozen vegetables may become soft and mushy.

If flavor and texture make refrozen fruits undesirable for fresh eating they may be satisfactorily cooked.

Low-acid foods, which include most of the vegetables,

spoil rapidly when their temperatures have risen to above 45 degrees, hence it's usually best not to refreeze them.

Watch Egg Cooling During Hot Months

Watch egg quality when daytime temperatures get in the 90's, say poultry specialists from the University of Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service.

Eggs must be cooled to maintain high quality. Keep coolers at a 55 degree F. optimum. Gather eggs more frequently in hot weather, generally three times. Market eggs twice or three times a week, to prevent quality loss.

Remember that egg quality by heat cannot be replaced. Get the animal heat out of the egg in the shortest possible time and at the lowest cost. Low quality eggs hurt the pocketbook.

Chandlerites Take Walk At Demo Parley

Led by Lee Faulkner, Rockcastle highway boss, the administration Democrats walked out when Clell Pike, County Democratic Chairman, seated Dr. John D. Henderson, Mt. Vernon dentist, convention chairman, and John Allen, attorney, secretary.

After yells of protest, about 300 Democrats walked from the court house. About 75 remained. The some 75 remaining, under Doctor Henderson's chairmanship, chose the following delegates to the State Democratic Convention held this week at Louisville.

Junior Poynter, Clell Pike, Joe Henderson, Bill Stewart, Roscoe Norton, Millard Allen, and Louis Kelley, were chosen were: David Craig W. O'Yadon, Ed Patin, Forrest Norton, Kelly Shelton, James E. and Sherman Price.

The group also adopted the unit rule for voting at the State Convention, and voted to back Robert Humphreys, secretary, and Emerson "Doc" Beauchamp, secretary of the State Convention.

Chosen by the Chandlerites were the following delegates: W. H. Bray, G. D. Burton, Guy Roberts, Dave Nove, Ellis Marshall, and O. V. Smith. Alternates chosen were: Elmer Halcomb, Walter Hasty and Frank Dees.

The Chandlerites then adopted the unit rule and agreed to support Humphreys and Beauchamp. In a last resolution, the body passed a resolution lauding Governor Chandler's administration and called for his nomination as president at the National Democratic Convention to be held in August at Chicago, Ill.

The items were found after Blevins told local authorities where he sold them. No arrests were made.

Many of the items found earlier by police at Blevins' home in Garrard County have been claimed. Robert Ballard of Fayette County claimed tools; Evelyn D. Hulst of Jessamine County claimed jewelry and miscellaneous items; Mrs. William Deaton of Jessamine County claimed a steam iron and jewelry; Harold D. Phillips of Nicholasville claimed a lawnmower, record player, shotgun, two rifles and a box of bullets; Dollie Abney of Renfro Valley claimed a watch and market basket; Monroe Abney of Renfro Valley claimed a watch; Mrs. G. T. Norton of Jessamine County claimed jewelry, four hams and two sides of meat.

Many hundreds of items, including silverware, guns and an assortment of jewelry remains to be claimed. Sheriff Ballinger is giving receipts for all claimed articles.

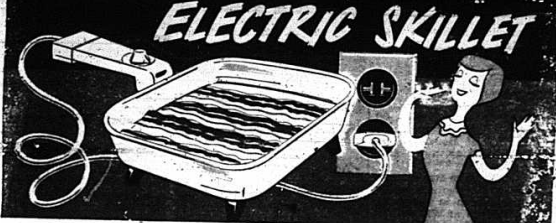

NEEDED IN STATE

A program designed to challenge Kentucky youths to seek careers in the field of medicine has been inaugurated by the Kentucky Medical Foundation.

According to J. Stephen Watkins, president of the foundation, the program was initiated with discussions with high school principals and class advisors at a recent meeting at the University of Kentucky.

Watkins said the program has as its objective the advising of the youths of the state of the "new opportunities for medical education which will be available upon the opening of the new medical, dental and nursing schools at the University."

"We feel many Kentucky students, when informed of the opportunities available, will want to concentrate their efforts on finding a rewarding career in this field of medicine," Watkins noted.

The foundation's president added that an "student graduating from high school this year who is interested in becoming a physician, dentist, pharmacist, nurse or medical technician will find that training is available at the University of Kentucky."

Interested parents and students were invited to contact the Kentucky Medical Foundation, 202 Radio Building, or the University of Kentucky registrar.

In stressing the need for encouraging medical careers, Watkins pointed out that the state's engineers have "for several years conducted an active program to encourage high school students with good scholastic records to enter the College of Engineering and seek a career in that field."

Much depends on the guidance and counseling of parents, he concluded, adding that students "should be guided by their parents to accept the challenge of good scholarship so they will be prepared to enter fields that require highly technical training."
