Tell Fines By Courts For June

Fines in Rockcastle County Court during June totaled \$296, according to the records of County Judge Walter Sowder.

Broken down the fines (not including costs) are as follows: Sixteen were fined \$1 each on a charge of Breach of peace, and one \$10 for breach of peace. Polio Vaccine 'Goes Begging' In Rockcastle-- Health Official

Parents are being urged to have their children vaccinated at once before the polio season gets further under way. Most susceptible to polio are those under twenty years of age and pregnant women. Over 10,000,000 persons in this most susceptible group have received vaccine with a perfect safety record.

Vaccine is available through family physicians. Parents are being advised to check with their physicians and follow the plan which has been adopted in their localities for the administration of the vaccine. The State Health Department is shipping orders of vaccine to counties on a first-come, first-served basis. Rockcastle County parents have been asked to call for the vaccine so that this area will receive its proper allotment.

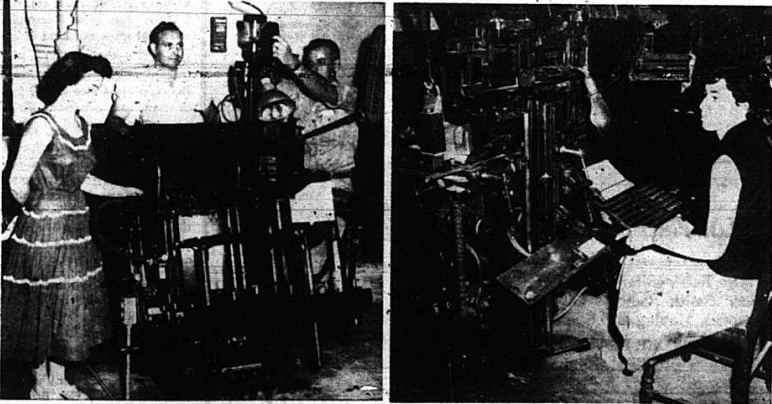
