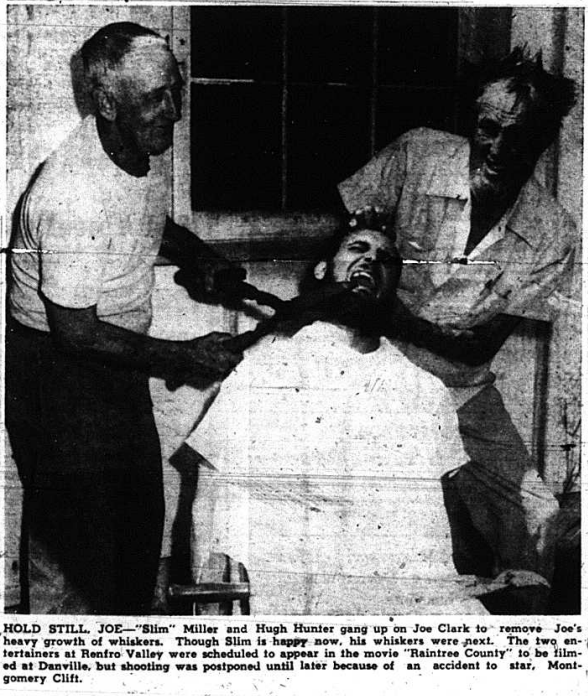

Maysville Officials Report Fluoride Cut Tooth Decay

D. M. F.'s and only 14 per cent had experienced decay of the teeth. The rate of D. M. F.'s was thus found to have been reduced by 87.4 per cent. The national percentage of reduction in D.M.F.'s in six-year-olds figures recently released by the Mason County Health Department. Similar results were also observed in comparing 1956 city to install fluoridation, is examined five years earlier. In 1951 all of the examined children had experienced dental decay and the average was 8.9 D.M.F.'s per child. In 1956, 94 per cent of the children in this group had some form of dental decay, but the overall average was 6.8 D. M. F.'s per child. These figures show that tooth ailments of this age group had been reduced by 32.4 per cent at the end of the five year period. If rugs and carpets are to wear well and stay attractive they must be kept clean. A bulletin from the New York State Extension Service emphasizes. Dirt on the surface dulls the color of the rug, embedded grit ages it from clothes moths and carpet beetles is less likely to get into it. Spraying rugs against these insects is after they have been thoroughly cleaned.

Where there is heavy traffic on a rug, daily cleaning with a vacuum cleaner or carpet sweeper will be needed. A light vacuuming will pick up much of the soil before it becomes embedded in the fibers. Less frequently give the rug a longer, more thorough vacuuming.

Anything spilled on the rug should be removed at once. Blot up as much as possible with a soft cloth or absorbent tissue. Then sponge the area with a mixture of the teaspoon of mild synthetic detergent to one cup lukewarm water.

Remove grease spots with a crease eraser or cleaning fluid. Rubbing with a mixture of one teaspoon of white vinegar and three teaspoons lukewarm water. Finish by sponging with a cloth dampened in lukewarm water.

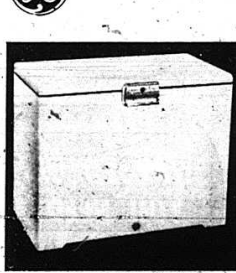

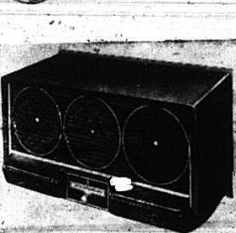

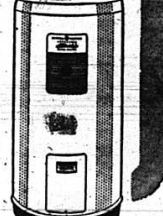

"Maysville's improvement is better than the national average probably because attention was paid to good oral hygiene and good diet as well as to fluoridation. The spectacular reduction in tooth decay is a tribute to Maysville dentists, the health department, teachers and civic leaders, who have worked since 1951 to establish and maintain a good dental health program." J. F. Owen, D. D. S., director of the Division of Dental Health, Kentucky State Department of Health, stated.

"Other factors which helped make the program so successful were the well organized dental program which existed in Maysville before fluoridation was instituted, and the awareness of the people of Mason County of the need for better dental care. Quite naturally, we are thrilled with the results and we know that Maysville will carry through with a good dental program to maintain this low decay rate." Dr. Owen added.

than 1955, according to a report issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Gross sales of the 1955 crop totaled 817,948,588 pounds, the Federal-State Market News Service reported. From this figure is deducted resales totaling about 5 percent of the crop which cuts the total to near the estimate for this year's crop. The burley crop in 1955 brought an all-time high average price of \$39.44 a hundred pounds.

HUNT SEASON DATES FOR STATE TOLD

Kentucky's squirrel hunters received good news during the week with the announcement that the first part of the State's divided hunting season opens Aug. 8 and extends to Oct. 15. Officials of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources in making the announcement said the second part of the season will open Nov. 19 and continue through Dec. 16. The shooting limit is six squirrels a day, with 12 permitted in possession after two or more hunting days.

Officials also announced a three-day deer hunting season for Nov. 8 through 10, in 27 counties. The limit is one deer during the season, with shooting restricted to buck deer with at least two points on one antler. A \$5 deer permit will be required. Hunting hours will be 7 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Rabbit, ruffed grouse and quail seasons open Nov. 19 and continue through Jan. 17. Limits are: rabbits, 8; quail, 10, and ruffed grouse, 2. Double the limit will be permitted in possession after two or more hunting days.

Bag limits and seasons for waterfowl and doves will be announced by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

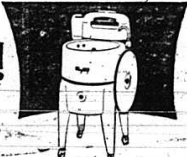

ENOUGH VACCINE FOR 3 POLIO SHOTS

As the nation reaches the peak of polio season, enough polio vaccine is now available in the state to give booster (third) doses to children under 20 and pregnant women, according to a report from Russell E. Teague, M. D., Commissioner of Health, Kentucky State Department of Health.

For better community-wide protection against a possible polio epidemic medical authorities recommend that wide-spread coverage with one injection be given to children under 20 and pregnant women the most susceptible groups. One injection gives protection through the polio season in the majority of cases.

The second builds up more immunity, and the booster provides long-lasting protection, perhaps for several years. Now
